Hitler Assaults Russia

(By UNITED PRESS)

Adolf Hitler is believed to have launched a do-or-die assault against Russia. London quarters are inclined to believe the Nazi armies are gaining an attempt to take Moscow.

The German high command is following the line laid down in Hitler's speech yesterday that great operations are in progress.

London hears that the Germans are nearing Kursk, south of Moscow, and getting set for another drive in the Smolensk sector.

The Russians, however, have continued and successful attacks against the Nazi and their Rumanian allies. A motorized force is said to have been severely defeated in a named sector. The Russian command claims that 500 armored cars and 250 men were destroyed.

Various other local victories have been claimed on the Ukrainian front. And the earlier Russian intelligence reported that the Germans had suffered 15,000 casualties and that 12,000 Rumanians had been wiped in one 10-day battle.

Authoritative British reports indicate that the soviet army has a large counter-attack drive that cut off the German forces from the Crimean front. The Russian drive is said to have started from the Melitopol area near the sea of Azov and is running across the rim of the Isthmus of Bosphorus. Both sides claim sea victories. Moscow asserts that the

An invasion of Britain is believed an unlikely contingency while the Nazis are engaged with Russia on the eastern front. They conclude that America's defense effort would fall off only in event of a German collapse and capitulation. Then, they insist, it would taper rather than stop suddenly.

Mr. Foskett was a prominent member of the First Baptist church here. As vice-president of the Shenandoah National Bank, he was for years active in the Iowa Bankers Association, serving on the legislative committee as chairman of the southwest Iowa group.

He represented Page and Fremont Counties in the Iowa Senate from 1913 to 1921 and was chairman of the senate appropriations committee three sessions.

Born at Monmouth, Ill., 79 years ago, Mr. Foskett came to Iowa in 1877 and lived in Shenandoah until 1927, when he moved to California because of ill health. Mr. and Mrs. Foskett were here for an extended visit last year.

He is survived by Mrs. Foskett and a son, Horace W. Foskett, Des Moines, assistant vice-president of Equitable Life Insurance Company of Iowa, and two daughters, Mrs. R. M. Armstrong of El Centro, California, and Mrs. F. W. Armitage of Menominee, Michigan. A brother, W. H. Foskett, lives at Orange, California. Miss Blanche Alden, children's librarian here is a cousin and W. E. Irwin, a brother-in-law.

The C. E. Buntz home is the former residence of the Foskett family.

The funeral will be held at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the Harding Funeral Home, conducted by Rev. Donald Duncan, pastor of the Baptist Church.
