Mr. Mills had been in poor health for several years and had been confined to his home most of the time for several weeks before his death.

Mr. Mills had the distinction of being appointed postmaster by four presidents, Theodore Roosevelt, Taft, Harding and Coolidge. Besides these he served under three other presidents - Wilson. Hoover and Franklin Roosevelt.

Mr. Mills was a faithful public servant, always giving the best he had for the good of the greatest number of people. He was a kind and loving father; devoted to making his home life as comfortable and as happy as possible for those dependent upon him. He was a member of the Presbyterian church and gave of his time and substance unstintedly. His lifework is finished; he has served his country well and has now gone to be with his God. 
