Ed Narey, 74, Former Spirit Lake Banker, Dies Of Heart Ailment

First Year of Weed Enforcement Finds Task Too Big For Equal Handling of All Farmers

The eight township weed commissioners in the county report various methods of handling the destruction of weeds in their areas. In brief, the picture is as follows:

Jim Louis of Lloyd township reports that they have sprayed the weeds on about a dozen farms. They have not sent out any official notices. Those who were warned are taking care of their own.

Emil Hass of Excelsior township says the farmers are cooperating almost 100 percent in his township. They have issued one warning and that man got his weeds mowed before they had to take action officially.

Judd Zerfoss of Richland township has had to serve seven warnings and will have to serve two additional ones if the first informal notice isn't complied with. Three of the seven have already complied but the time is growing short for the other four.

Clarence Van Orsdale of Okoboji township has had to serve two le-

gal notices but hopes to get the two cases settled without any further action by the county.

H. U. Bruns, commissioner for Milford township, said he has served no official notices or had any weeds cut or sprayed by the county in his area.

E. Ewing, commissioner for Spirit Lake and Superior townships, said he has served no official notices.

Bert Waugh, Center Grove township commissioner, said he has served no official notices for weed clearance but that the county has sprayed for weeds on 17 farms in his area at the request of the farmers. Most of the land was in pasture he said, and the largest single area was four acres. Most of the weeds attacked were Canadian thistles.

Hans Jansen, commissioner for Diamond Lake, Silver Lake and the North half of Lakeville townships, said he has served six official notices taken action on one and will have to cut weeds in one 70-acre area for one farmer.

C. E. "Ed" Narey, Spirit Lake's former bank president, legislator, state tax commissioner and state grand commander of the Knight Templars of Iowa, passed away quietly last week to close a long and colorful career of service to this community.

Funeral services for Ed. Narey, who died in the Marcus Snyder Memorial hospital in Spirit Lake Friday afternoon, July 18, 1947, were held at the Harpole Funeral Home Sunday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock, conducted by Rev. R. E. Baker. Members of the Masonic order attended in a body.

"The Old Rugged Cross" and "Now the Day Is Over" were sung by Miss Ann Bergman, who was accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Ted Bergman, as accompanist. Flowers were in charge of members of the Eastern Star.

Interment was in Lakeview cemetery where Masonic gravesites were conducted by Past Grand Master Dr. Thomas Throckmorton of Des Moines.

FIND 22,465 ADULT WALLEYES IN SPIRIT LAKE

Biologist Earl T. Rose, in charge of walleye pike population studies at Spirit Lake, has set the number of adult walleyes in Spirit Lake at 22,500 during June. The estimate is based upon ratio studies of tagged and untagged walleyes. Of 556 tagged walleyes, a total of 122 have been reported taken by anglers, 4,951 unmarked fish being taken during this time.

May walleye population in this popular lake was 29,700.

The following tribute and sketch of his life, prepared by his nephew, Peter Narey, was read at the service:

Ed. Narey, as he was known to his host of friends and acquaintances throughout the state, needs no eulogist to elaborate upon his life and work. His friends are legion. He loved the companionship of people. Paraphrasing the words of Kipling "He could talk with crowds and keep his virtue, or walk with Kings—nor lose the common touch". During the last ten months in the local hospital he would go from room to room, when health permitted, to call upon friend and stranger alike, and in his natural and friendly manner he endeavored to leave some word of comfort and cheer.

He has made his own worthwhile record. His name, spirit, and achievements are indelibly engraved upon the hearts and minds of his many friends and acquaintances. Now he has answered the inexorable call. But such earthly passing does not take away the golden memories that we build around the lives and characters of our friends. There is much for all of us to remember and inherit from the rich and full life of Ed. Narey.

Charles Edward Narey, son of Peter Edward Narey and Emma F. Narey, was born on the 25th day of November, 1873, at Osage, Iowa. As a young boy he moved with the family to Kansas where they remained for a year and in 1879 moved to Spirit Lake, Iowa.

He attended public school and Young's Academy in Spirit Lake after which he enrolled in business college in Des Moines and later the law school at the State University of Iowa. He financed his schooling by clerking in the general stores of A. F. Bergman and Goodrich and Randall.

Upon completion of his education he taught school for a short time in Superior and then was employed by an insurance company in Des Moines. In 1897 he was elected assistant cashier of the First National Bank at Laurens, Iowa. In 1898, while at Laurens, he married Miss Anna Wiss, who passed away in 1932.

In 1903 he came to Spirit Lake to be cashier of the First National Bank, later becoming president of that institution. He was president of the Iowa State Banking Association during the year 1923-1924. He also served one term as representative from Dickinson county in the Iowa legislature. He retired from the banking business in 1930 and for several years thereafter was connected with the State Banking Department of Iowa. During the last six years he was director of personnel in the office of the state

tax commission, resigning in the fall of 1946 due to ill health.

In 1898 he became a member of the Order of the Ancient Free and Accepted Masons joining Grace Lodge 519 at Laurens, Iowa, later serving as Master of that lodge. In 1903 he affiliated with Twilight Lodge 329 at Spirit Lake, Iowa, where he continued an active member until his death. He was always an active and enthusiastic Mason and was a member of Royal Arch, Knights Templar Red Cross of Consistory and Shrine. He was elected Eminent Grand Commander of Knights Templar serving in that capacity during the year 1932-1933. He was a member of the Presbyterian church.

Since September, 1946, he had been in the hospital at Spirit Lake, ill with a serious heart ailment.

He is survived by a daughter, Charlotte Ann Narey; a brother, Judge Harry E. Narey; a sister, Mabel Narey Hartman; a nephew, Peter B. Narey, all of Spirit Lake; and a niece, Albert Henning, of Oak Park, Ill.; and Joe O'Hara, Washington, D. C.






