SENATOR SCHAFFTER. DIES MONDAY A. M.

Pernicious Anemia. Takes Life
of Eugene Schaffter—End
Not Unexpected.



Senator Eugene Schaffter died at his home in this city Monday at one o'clock a. m. For several weeks he was known to be a very sick man and that his strength would not be able to withstand the progress of disease, which was diagnosed as pernicious anemia. For the past two years senator knew he was afflicted with this dread disease but it did not develop seriously until last spring. He made several trips to Rochester, Minn., where the Mayos were consulted. Several blood transfusions were attempted but none with lasting results. The last one was attempted Sunday evening, in a vain effort to prolong his life. He was conscious but a half hour afterwards and passed away without suffering, about one o'clock Monday morning. Owing to the prominence of Senator Schaffter in lodge circles and his wide acquaintance in the state, the funeral services were held in the Methodist church in order to provide for those who wished to attend.

Born in Virginia
Eugene Schaffter was born in Lynchburg, Va., Sept. 3rd, 1864. He was the son of Chas. Albin and Lucy (Hall) Schaffter. Mr. Schaffter's

parents were natives of Switzerland, where the father followed the printer's and machinist's trades. When the family came to America, he followed the printing trade in Virginia, served as public printer, and finally moved to Paxton, Ill. He came to Eagle Grove two years later and bought the town newspaper, then called "The Telephone." He changed the name to Boone Valley Gazette, which he published until his death in 1894.

Eugene Schaffter received his education in the public schools and the Collegiate and Normal Institute of Paxton, Ill. He worked at newspaper reporting in Batavia, Ill., until 1882, when he came to Eagle Grove and secured a position as stenographer for Railroad Superintendent Burt. For a short time he was with Mr. Burt at Clinton and Boone and the same year returned to Eagle Grove as chief clerk for Mr. Hopkins, Supt. Burt's successor.

Goes to Europe
In 1890 he resigned and went to Europe, spending considerable time in that part of Switzerland where his parents were born and later entered the University of Berlin for one term. On his return to America, he again entered the employ of the Northwestern at Eagle Grove and in 1895 resigned and entered the law practice with D. C. Filkins. Two years later Mr. Filkins moved to Minneapolis and Mr. Schaffter continued the practice alone until ill health forced him to give up his work about two months ago.

Eugene Schaffter was united in marriage to Miss Hattie Heckert, of this city, who with two daughters, Miss Dorothy, teacher in the city schools, and Mrs. Wm. McComber, survive.

In 1918 Mr. Schaffter was elected to the state senate, representing the counties of Hamilton, Hardin and Wright, and served through two sessions of the legislature. His term would have expired January 1, 1922, and it was his intention to ask reelection. In Masonic circles Mr. Schaffter was very active. He was Past Grand High Priest of the Royal Arch Masons of Iowa and Grand Illustrious Master of the Council. He served as mayor of the city of Eagle Grove, and was president of the school board for a number of years, and a member of the library board. In 1908 he was delegate from the Third district of Iowa to the national Republican convention at Chicago.

In this universally felt to be untimely departure from this life of Mr. Schaffter the sense of loss extends beyond city and county limits, it is state-wide. And at home and

Since the closing of the inebriate asylum at Knoxville women afflicted with inebriacy from the use of either liquor or opiates are sent to Mount Pleasant. Men similarly afflicted are sent to the hospital for the insane at Independence where a ward is set aside for such persons and expert treatment is provided. Judge Utterback says the encouraging feature is that the number sent to these places is growing less each year.

The state board of health announces the appointment of Miss Anna M. Drake, registered nurse, for some time with the Iowa Tuberculosis association, to the position of director of public health nurses in Iowa. There has been a demand for some time both on the part of the nurses themselves and other people interested in public health work that public health nursing in the state of Iowa should receive direction within the state and from the state government. There are several groups of public health nurses including nurses employed by county boards of su-

SAFEGUARD HEALTH OF IOWA CHILDREN

Red Cross Nurses Reach One Child in Seven in Past Six Months.



ONE child out of every seven in the state of Iowa has been inspected for physical defects during the past six months by a Red Cross nurse. In the 5,650 schools visited by nurses connected with local Red Cross Chapters, a total of 65,340 children were given careful examination for defects of teeth, tonsils, vision or hearing, and 68.9 per cent were found to have some one of these defects.

That these children might have an opportunity to correct these defects, clinics, "Health Weeks" and other community projects have been carried on extensively in the Chapters. Dental clinics in many cities and towns have provided an opportunity for correcting defective teeth. In Oskaloosa, a most successful clinic was held last spring with the co-operation of local dentists. It has become a permanent part of the Junior program in the Chapter.

In Council Bluffs Chapter, necessity proved the "mother of invention," and three barber chairs were installed in a school room. So popular did the clinic prove that several of the children whose cards had not been signed by their parents asked to be allowed to have their teeth filled and pulled.

Good health movies have played no small part in arousing communities to the need of clinics and nutrition work. Red Cross films have been shown in the schools, in local motion picture theaters and churches. As 27.5 per cent of the 60,898 children weighed and measured were found to be more than 7 per cent underweight, the value of this visual teaching of health habits cannot be overestimated.

Valuable educational work has been carried on by health talks to both children and adults. Red Cross nurses have given 3,265 talks in the past six months to children and to adults.
