FRED W. YEAR DIES AT HOME NEAR MELVIN

A Progressive Citizen, He Furthered Education in County

Fred W. Year, long prominent in the affairs of Osceola and O'Brien counties, died at his home near Melvin Friday of cancer of the stomach after a long illness. He was buried from the Lutheran church at Melvin Monday afternoon.

Since his arrival in Osceola county in 1901 Mr. Year interested himself in the stock business and

for years carried on that business at Melvin. He was also connected with the Melvin bank.

A Progressive Citizen

He was one of Osceola county's most progressive citizens. He believed in education and was largely instrumental as president of the Melvin school board in building the modern consolidated school building.

He ably served his constituency as representative from Osceola county in the state legislature and declined a second term. For a number of years he served as chairman

Granville Man's Arm Is Amputated

Sideswipe of Cars Makes Operation Necessary

First Half of 1935 Brings 2.975 Millions to Farmers
 Continued increase during June showed total cash income to farmers to 2,975 million dollars during the first 6 months of 1935, according to figures compiled by Iowa State College extension economists. Including rental and benefit payments, this figure represents an increase of 14 per cent over the first half of last year. Rental and benefit payments were during the first half of this year were 305 million dollars, or more than double the amount received from that source in the same period last year. For June total farm income this year amounted to 487 million dollars—8 per cent greater than the corresponding month of last year. Cash income from farm earnings was 438 million dollars in June while benefit payments made the other 49 million—the latter representing 69 per cent increase over June a year ago. For Iowa the total increase in farm income during the first half of 1935 mounted to 36 per cent and was surpassed by only 3 states.

It is said that he could judge within ten pounds of the weight of a steer and could remember cattle that he had sold six months or a year previously. He interested himself for a long time in the breeding of Duroc Jersey hogs.

He was born at Prairie du Chien, Wis., March 26, 1869. When two years of age he moved with his parents to O'Brien county. He homesteaded with his father south of Hartley.

He is survived by his wife and four children, George, Ralph, Fred and Mrs. Ream Remmers.

The largest check received this year was by Wheeler brothers who were paid \$605.58. They also received most last year. Of contracts applied for 51 were refused.

The payment is made for each acre of corn retired from production on the basis of 35 cents per bushel on the adjusted estimated corn yield. It comes in two installments the first of 15 cents per bushel after acceptance of contracts and the rest on or about January 1, 1936.

For hogs the payment is \$75 per head on 10 per cent of the hog base. The first payment of \$7.50 per head is upon acceptance of the contract and the rest on or after January 1.

Mr. Wiese was a member of the Lutheran church, and also belonged to the Fraternal Order of Eagles, the Elks, and the Masons. He was also a member of the Northwest Turner Society and of the American Legion, having served in the army in the World War.

In the early part of his life, Mr. Wiese was engaged in mercantile business. He had lived in Davenport prior to his election to the State Legislature, which election occurred in 1932. He served in the Forty-fifth General Assembly and also the Extra Session, and was re-elected in November, 1934, and served in the session of the Legislature in 1935. He was active in legislation and rendered excellent service to his constituents in Scott county. He was an honest, conscientious man and a gentleman. He gained many friends in his contact with members of the Legislature while serving as a member.

He was especially active in assisting in clarifying laws governing drugs and pharmacists, being chairman of that committee during one of the sessions.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Forty-seventh General Assembly of the State of Iowa, That in the passing of the Honorable Louis H. Wiese, the state has lost an honored and valuable citizen, a man of high ideals in brotherly living and useful citizenship.

HONORABLE FRED W. YEAR

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare resolutions commemorative of the life, character and public service of the late Honorable Fred W. Year, of Osecola county, Iowa, beg leave to submit the following report:

Fred W. Year was born in Prairie Du Chien, Wisconsin, March 26, 1869. When two years of age he moved with his parents to O'Brien county, Iowa. He homesteaded with his father south of Hartley, Iowa. On March 1, 1902, he moved to a farm adjoining Melvin, Iowa, where he lived up to the time of his death, August 16, 1935. During his residence there he contributed to the upbuilding of this community. He was progressive in politics and was always active in the support of the beliefs which he considered right.

He represented Osecola county in the Thirty-ninth General Assembly and for a number of years was the republican county chairman. Always interested in education, he was director of the Melvin Consolidated

Schools and was instrumental in doing his part in erecting the fine building that they now have in Melvin.

He was a very successful stockman and handled large numbers of livestock for feeding and raising purposes. For a long time he interested himself in the breeding of Duroc Jersey hogs.

He was united in marriage to Miss Minnie Huster, March 8, 1898. She preceded him in death February 19, 1928, and on May 15, 1933, he was again united in marriage to Mrs. Clara Newton, of White, South Dakota. He is survived by his four children, George, Ralph, Fred and Mrs. Ream Remmers all of Melvin, Iowa.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Forty-seventh General Assembly, That in the passing of the Honorable Fred W. Year, the state of Iowa has lost a valued and honored citizen, a man of great character and worth, and the House of Representatives of Iowa, by this resolution, tenders its sympathy to the family of the deceased.
