In order to spare Kate, Frank attempts to steal the formula back from the professor's study and is caught as a burglar. In the final scene, Rosie and he work up a plot in which Frank shoots himself in order to make

Ralph confess. Ralph duly explains everything and Frank keeps up the dying farce until Kate is united with him in marriage. Rosie prevents Frank from committing violence on Ralph and thereby brings that young man to her.

Miss Datesman and Mr. Baker had very difficult parts to play in the leading roles but carried them off in fine shape. Baker's voice was not all it might have been but Miss Datesman put her songs over very well.

Of the choruses, the Golf and society cast was probably the best. A good song, coupled with ability to sing and dance, enabled the Golf chorus to send "Monkey Business" off to a flying start. The Convict chorus, appearing before the final scene of the second act, took well with the crowd. Dressed in black and white striped suits and led by one of their number carrying a ball and chain and a sledge hammer, the convicts danced in lock-step to a peppy tune.

The ballet, held each year in connection with the night show, was led by Miss Adella Bigler and Robert Ingalls, both of whom displayed grace and rhythm in their dancing. They were supported by an excellent group of dancers.

The Rainbow chorus appeared in very beautiful costumes and performed well in their dancing.

The costuming of the night show from the Convict chorus to the ballet Sun was a credit to Miss Florence Stewart and Miss Pauline Peacock. A great deal of originality and attention to detail was evident in the work.

Much of the credit for the success of "Monkey Business" is due to Charles T. Cownie, dramatic director. His choruses and individual parts were all finished to the right point and showed neither over-playing or lack of attention.

U. S. ALDERMAN DIES SUDDENLY

Drops Dead at Home Last Night.

NEVADA, May 15.—U. S. Alderman, prominent Story county citizen and former representative from Story county in the thirty-eighth Iowa general assembly, dropped dead here at his home about 8:40 last night. Death was caused by a ruptured coronary artery. He was 61 years old.

According to his family, Mr. Alderman had been playing golf in the evening after he had eaten an unusually heavy meal. Returning home about 8 p. m. he had pain down for a while. After resting a short time he got up to go into the kitchen. He was in the act of turning on the kitchen light when he dropped dead.

Mr. Alderman, a graduate of Iowa university, had been a member of the Story County Bar association for many years. He was a prominent member of the Masonic and Knights of Pythias lodges and took an active part in Lutheran church affairs, being financial secretary of the Lutheran council and a member of the Iowa synod at the time of his death.

He was born in Nevada where he resided practically all of his life. He is survived by his wife, one son, Ralph Alderman of Oak Park, Ill.; a brother, E. T. Alderman, and one sister, Mrs. J. A. Mills, both of Nevada. Mr. Alderman was the son of the late P. E. Alderman, early Story county pioneer.

Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Lutheran church with the Rev. C. N. Swilart in charge.
