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ARNOLD A. BROWN RESPECTED OSAGE ATTORNEY IS DEAD

Succumbed to Heart Disease And Complications at Home Monday.

Arnold E. Brown, for many years an attorney and a prominent worker for the public good in Osage, passed away at his home here at about 6 o'clock Monday morning, having lost a six-month fight against heart disease and other complications.

Always in vigorous health, his loss of flesh and color during the summer gave friends their first intimation that anything was wrong. He assured them it was nothing. . . "Just a little heart trouble and loss of appetite; I'm getting over it now."

He did not improve, however, and in October spent some time in the Park hospital at Mason City. Returning to his home a month ago, he was very hopeful of a steady recovery. Monday morning he passed suddenly and quietly away.

Obituary

Arnold Elmer Brown was born in Conyers, Georgia, March 19, 1875, and passed away at his home in Osage Nov. 25, 1935, at the age of 60 years and 8 months.

He was the eldest of the five children of Loren S. and Elizabeth Tupper Brown. When less than a year old, he came with his parents to Mitchell county, and after a few years in West Lincoln they bought the farm northwest of Osage now owned by John Eckford.

After the father's death in 1907, the family moved to Osage. Arnold had attended the Cedar Valley seminary, being graduated with the class of 1892. He then spent a few years at home on the farm before attending the University of Iowa law school, being graduated with the class of 1902.

Following his term of office he entered into partnership with Herbert L. Stoughton for the practice of law, but withdrew when he was elected county attorney, an office he held for two terms. Then in the fall of 1918 he was elected Mitchell county's representative in the state legislature.

He was always prominent in the local community, serving as city attorney and as a member of the school board. At the time of his death he was president of the board, having served on the body for more than ten years.

He was an active member of the Osage Congregational church, ever ready to answer any call.

He married Maude R. Naden on Dec. 11, 1911. Besides Mrs. Brown he leaves a daughter, Mrs. Kathryn Wormley, of Waterloo, a son, Loren, now doing graduate work in high school; and four sisters: Mrs. Nell Cohen, Chicago; Mrs. Cordelia Whitney, Greeley, Colo.; Mrs. Janet Cruickshank, Santa Ana, Calif.; and Mrs. Ruth Chase, Los Angeles, Calif.

Funeral services are being held at the Congregational church on Wednesday afternoon at 3:30, in charge of his pastor, Rev. Stiles Lessly.

Only one of Mr. Brown's sisters was able to come for the funeral, Mrs. Harry Cohen.

The Mitchell County Bar association, several of the district judges and their reporters, were present in a body, and the association will hold a memorial service in the courtroom the first of the week for its much-loved and respected member.
