He was one of the real pioneers of this county, coming here from Illinois with his brother, Lewis Finch, in 1882, when this entire territory was largely a virgin prairie. He purchased a tract of fine land in Corwin township, northwest of Ida Grove, and improved this land and made it one of the most productive tracts in the county. He not only became a successful farmer, but he engaged in the raising and feedind of livestock and was one of the prominent feeders and shippers, of which there were several very large similar operators on farms in the immediate Ida Grove territory.



A number of years ago he was elected as a member of the lower house of the Iowa legislature, and served Ida county in that capacity for two terms. 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
