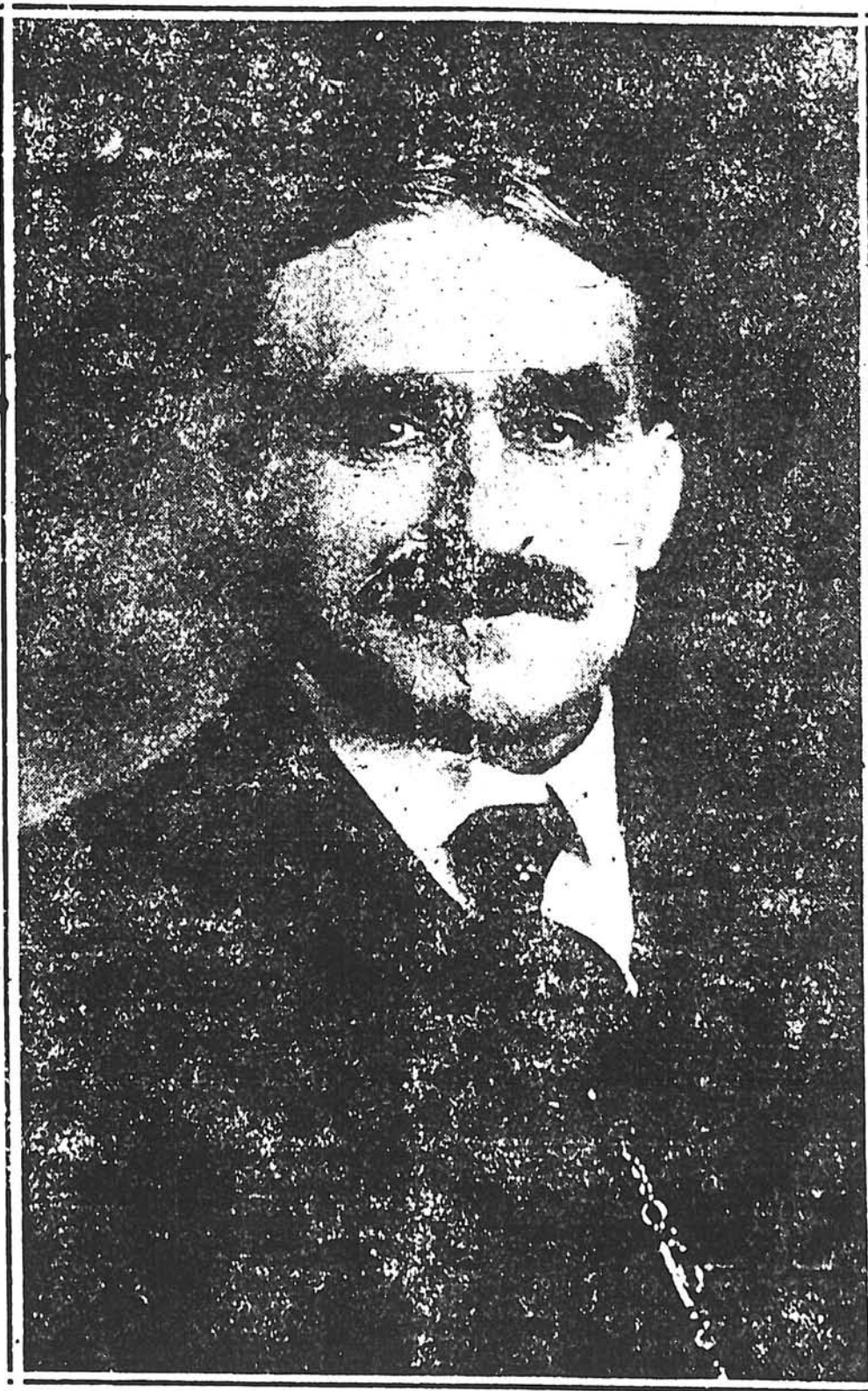

Harvey W. Flenniken was born in
 Millville, Clayton county, Iowa, Feb-
 ruary 7, 1859, and died at Iowa City,
 Iowa, November 12, 1923, aged 64
 years, 9 months and 5 days.

He was the older son of Wallace W.
 and Gertrude Harvey Flenniken, his
 father dying while he was just a lad,
 much responsibility rested upon him.

After seven years of successful
 business he sold out to the other
 of the firm and
 in 1899 and established the Citizens
 Savings Bank of which he has been
 the trusted and discreet cashier.

In 1898 he was married to Miss
 Minnie Donley of Delmar, Iowa, and
 to this union two sons were given,
 John Calvin of Dekalb, Illinois, and
 and Donald Arthur of Cedar Rapids.

In public life he held the office of
 mayor, justice of the peace and a
 member of the lower house of the
 state assembly during the years of
 1917-1921—two terms.

He was a member of Ancient Land-
 mark No. 200, A.F.&A.M., also of
 Aurora, Illinois, and Olin order of
 Eastern Star, and at the time of his
 death was president of the Jones
 county Bankers' Association.

He was interested in all that per-
 tained to the general welfare and his
 cooperation was given to many
 measures calculated to promote the
 material and political interests of the
 town and community.

Several years ago his health began
 to fail and after consulting the best
 medical skill an operation was advis-
 ed.

He went to Iowa City to have the
 advantage of the best in the state and
 passed through a very serious opera-
 tion upon the stomach from which he
 seemed to rally and was making a
 good recovery until peritonitis de-
 veloped over which medical skill had
 no effect and he passed away on the
 above date.

He leaves besides his dear wife and

 friends to mourn his going away.
