HON. CHARLES E. KELLOGG

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life and services of the Hon. Charles E. Kellogg, of Adams county, member of the House of Representatives in the Thirty-eighth General Assembly, beg leave to submit the following memorial:

Charles E. Kellogg was born in Berlin Heights, Ohio, February 13, 1873. He came with his parents to Iowa when a child. He received his early education at Greenfield, Iowa, and later attended Simpson College at Indianola, Iowa.

After completing his college work, he was a teacher in rural schools and later engaged in farming in Adair and Adams counties. He also served as justice of peace at Nevinville, Iowa, and for several years was in the implement business at Corning, Iowa. He represented Adams county in the Thirty-eighth General Assembly.

He was married to Sarah Van Vleet at Orient, Iowa, September 28, 1898, and to this union were born eight children. Those living are Wellington E., Doris A., Gladys A., Charles Philip, and Helen L. The dead are Mary E., Bessie A., and Sarah L.

He was a member of the Masonic lodge, the I. O. O. F., and the Modern Woodmen of America.

He died August 17, 1925, at Waterloo, Iowa.

He gave to his community, state and nation, largely of his time, his talents and his love. He sought no greater reward than the reward of faithful friends, which he gained in large measures.

Be It Resolved, By the House of Representatives of the Forty-second General Assembly, that in the passing of Hon. Charles E. Kellogg, this assembly express its realization of the loss of a man of strong character and sterling worth, and the House would by this resolution tender sympathy to the family who survives.

Friends were grieved to learn that Charles E. Kellogg, formerly a resident of Corning, but late of Waterloo, had passed from this life the early part of this week, following an operation for gallstones. The body was brought to Corning Tuesday on train No. 3 and the funeral services were held in the Federated church at 2:30 this afternoon, conducted by Rev. E. S. Menoher, pastor of the M. E. church, and the body was laid to rest in Walnut Grove cemetery.

Charles E. Kellogg was born at Berlin Heights, Ohio, February 13, 1872, and died Monday, August 7, 1925, at 10:30 a. m., being aged 53 years, 6 months and 4 days. He came to Iowa in 1881 and located in Adair county. His high school education was received at Greenfield and he attended Simpson college.

Mr. Kellogg was married to Sarah Van Vleet, of Adair county, in 1898, and soon after came to Adams county, which was the family home until recent years, when they moved to Waterloo, which is their home at present.

For some time Corning was the home of Mr. Kellogg and his family and during his residence he was active in business circles and in the public life of the community. He was a member of the school board, was representative from Adams county, in the state legislature, and was a member of the Masonic, I. O. O. F. and M. W. A. orders.

Mr. Kellogg is survived by his wife, and the following children: Welling-

ton E., Dorris A., Philip and Helen Kellogg, and Mrs. Gladys Anderson, of Corning. Three children, Bessie, Mary and Sarah, preceded their father in death. Beside the relatives mentioned Mr. Kellogg leaves three sisters and four brothers. They are E. J. Kellogg, of Rocky Ford, Colo.; L. J., of Santa Barbara, Cal.; J. L., of Mesa, Arizona; S. O., of Kansas City; Miss Carrie Kellogg and Mrs. Bessie Lee Jones, of Washington; Mrs. Joe Yazel, of Purdin, Mo.; also two grandchildren, Richard and John Anderson, of Corning.
