DES MOINES, (A)—lowa candidates fired final campaign potshots Monday in hopes of getting in some last minute licks with the "crucial 100,000" voters who may decide Tuesday's election. * * *

For the republicans, Tuesday's goal calls for a change of around 750 votes to a county from the 1936 election. For the democrats, the idea is to hold as large a share of that '36 edge as possible.

President Roosevelt captured the President Roosevelt captured the state by 133,779 votes in 1936. His margin over Alfred M. Landon was about 1,350 votes to the county. Thus, the republicans theoretically would have to change an average of 675 votes to the county this time to pull up even with the new deal chief in this state.

A change of that size pales by comparison with the Iowa upheaval between 1928 and 1932. Herbert Honvey, the GOP 284 Winney, led Al Smith by 244,259. In 1932, however, he lost the state to Roosevelt by 183,586.

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Mr. Cochrane was chairman of the Montgomery County good roads commission, when the bond issue for the first pavement was voted.

He took a deep interest in politics, being a Republican all of his life. He believed it to be the duty of every citizen not only to vote, but also to work for the political principles in which he believed. He was selected presidential elector for the Ninth Congressional District in 1912 and for the Seventh Congressional District in 1940 on the Republican ticket. He was a delegate to the Republican National Convention in Cleveland in 1936.

He was elected State Senator from Mills and Montgomery counties to the 42nd extra session, and re-elected to the 43rd and 44th sessions. He resigned from the 44th session because of ill health.

Mr. Cochrane was chairman of the official board of the First Methodist Church, and for 25 years taught in the Sunday School. He was a Rotarian, Shriner and a member of the Masonic bodies.

He is survived by his widow and three daughters, Mrs. Malcolm D. Lomas, Mrs. J. Lyman Turner and Mrs. John L. Crofts; four grand-daughters, Mary Joe, Louise and Margaret Lomas, and Joanna Turner, and one grandson, William Cochrane Turner; two brothers, James H. Cochrane of Des Moines, and L. W. Cochrane of Joplin, Missouri; one sister, Mrs. John Gray of Maryville, Missouri. A nephew, Thomas C. Murphy, son of his life-long business partner. Thos. D. Murphy, also survives, as do several other nices, and nephews.

The record of his life above shows a man true in character, democratic in spirit, and an honor to his community state and nation.

ARTHUR L. RULE

Arthur L. Rule was born in Mason City, Iowa, January 4, 1876, and was a resident of that city his entire life where he was identified with umerous enterprises connected with the growth of the community. He was a member of the law firm of Blythe, Markley and Rule from 1903 until his death

As a young man Mr. Rule attended Shattuck Military Academy at

Faribault, Minnesota, and Northwestern University and was a graduate of the State University of Iowa, where he received his law degree. On June 5, 1901, he was married to Miss Edith Brady of Cedar Rapids, who preceded him in death, and from this union two daughters were born, Mrs. Edith Rule Carrington and Miss Margaret B. Rule.

Mr. Rule was a veteran of the Spanish-American War where he became a personal friend of General Rush Lincoln, a relative of Abraham Lincoln. He was a Lieutenant Colonel in the Iowa National Guard. Being a profound student of Lincoln, Mr. Rule was always delighted to speak on the life of the Great Emancipator at the annual observance of Lincoln's birthday and on February 12, 1931, he gave an address on Lincoln before a joint session of the Iowa legislature. In 1916 Mr. Rule was elected to the Iowa Senate, where he served for four years.

Arthur Rule came as near as anyone could to being everyone's friend and counsellor and he was always happy to converse with people interested in history and the theatre. During his lifetime he made a wide acquaintance among the leading theatrical people of our country and many a time was host to theatrical and circus people when they visited his home town of Mason City.

Mr. Rule passed away on November 4, 1940, at his home in Mason City.
