### Former Legislator Died Here Monday

#### W. J. Sayers Served Long as Iowa Valley Canning Company Head

William Jefferson Sayers, prominent retired farmer and former state representative, passed away at his home in Marengo at 12:05 a. m., Oct. 6, 1930, at the age of 83. In 1920 Mr. Sayers suffered a severe attack of influenza and each year since that time he has been troubled with the sickness which gradually broke down his resistance and caused his death.

Mr. Sayers was born Jan. 11, 1847 in Athens county, Ohio, being the son of Ruel and Sarah Hixson Sayers. He came to Iowa county at the age of 21 and worked on a farm for his uncle Isaiah Hixson. In 1878 he was married to Ida M. Baugh of Washington township. To this union were born two sons and four daughters. Two of them have preceded their parents in death. Mrs. Charles Swartzabaw who died in November, 1927, and Leo Maureme who died in 1903. Mrs. William Sayers passed away in November, 1925. Mr. Sayers is survived by two daughters: Della S. Gray of Marengo, Mrs. Harry Hibbs of Greeley, Colo.; two sons, James William of Marengo and Jack Sayers of Cedar Rapids; two brothers, Ephriam, 85, and Amos, 86, both of West Unity, Ohio; and one sister, Mrs. John Hettinger, Eldorado Springs, Mo.; ten grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

In the days of his youth Mr. Sayers was active in rural Sunday school work six miles northwest of Marengo in the vicinity of his farm. He was elected a representative on the Democratic ticket from this district in 1919. Mr. Sayers was president for many years of the Iowa Valley Canning factory of Marengo, having retired from that office six years ago.

Mr. Sayers found much interest and satisfaction in that part of his farming operations which had to do with the buying and selling of stock. His ability and long years of experience enabled him to become an excellent judge of cattle. His life exemplified those worthy qualities of integrity, faithfulness and honor which won for him many friends to whom he always proved to be a loyal and trustworthy friend. True to the spirit of the early settlers who have laid the stalwart foundations of our nation, Mr. Sayers was conscientiously devoted to his home. His life has been a blessing and benediction to all who knew him.

Funeral services were held at the home at 2:30 p. m., Tuesday, in charge of the pastor of the Lutheran church. Burial was in the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

The 25th anniversary of Trinity Lutheran church was celebrated Sunday with two services. The German morning service was in charge of Rev. R. Kaberlitz of Fenton, Iowa, a former pastor. His text was "But it is good for me to draw near to God; I have put my trust in the Lord God, that I may declare all thy works." Psalms 73:28.

The afternoon service was conducted by two sons of the congregation. The German sermon was by Rev. J. Schwarting of Waubay, S. D., whose text was "Therefor my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, for as much as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord." 1 Cor. 15:58. Rev. G. Vogel of Des Moines preached the English sermon on "One thing have I desired of the Lord, that I will seek after, that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life to behold the beauty of the Lord and to inquire in His temple." ### Open Bear Creek Bridge Saturday

#### All Iowa County Detours on Road No. 32 Are Abandoned

The new Bear creek bridge west of Marengo was opened to traffic last Saturday and the last detour on No. 32 in Iowa county was there by abandoned. This bridge is on the relocation of No. 32. It is a 120 foot high truss bridge with six 40 foot I beam spans. It was built by the Minneapolis Bridge company at a contract cost of \$33,780.

With the exception of the construction area near West Liberty and a small detour at Colfax, No. 32 is open from Davenport to Des Moines. When projects which are now under way are completed No. 32 will be paved throughout its entire length, from the Mississippi river to the Missouri.

The last pier on the new \$62,000 bridge over the Iowa river north of Homestead was pushed into place last week. The bridge is now nearly close on the heels of the crew laying the piers and the sub-floor has been laid in 12 of the 14 sections but the surface coat is still lacking in six of the spans. Work on both of these bridges began around May 1.

### High School Classes Complete Election of Officers

#### Four Classes, Normal Training and Latin Clubs Choose Their Leaders

The selection of the class officers for the four high school classes, also the Normal Training club and the Latin Club were completed last week. The seniors were the first club to organize and held their election several days earlier.

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The last named, who was but four years of age when his parents established their home in this state, acquired his early education in the common schools of Iowa and was graduated from the Kirkville high school with the class of 1886. He then spent two years as a student in the State University of Iowa at Iowa City and subsequently learned the printer's trade while in the employ of the Ottumwa Courier for three or four years. Mr. Fullmer continued work as a printer until 1906 and then established the Victor Record of Victor, Iowa, publishing the sheet until 1911, when he sold out and came to Marengo. Here he began the publication of the Sentinel and has remained its editor to the present time. The paper is devoted to the dissemination of local and general news and is accorded a large subscription and advertising patronage.

On the 9th of January, 1894, Mr. Fullmer was united in marriage to Miss Bertha M. Letts, of Iowa City, Iowa, a daughter of Alvin and Hannah (Crandall) Letts, both of whom are deceased. Our subject and his wife have two children, Grace and Iowa Mae. Mr. Fullmer gives his political allegiance to the progressive party and is a Methodist in religious faith, while fraternally he is identified with the Independent Order of Odd Fellows and the Knights of Pythias. The principles that have actuated his life have been such as to win for him the highest esteem and goodwill of all who know him.

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#### WILLIAM J. SAYERS.

William J. Sayers, the owner of from six hundred to seven hundred acres of land in Iowa county and of the Iowa Valley Canning Factory, resides upon his place just outside Marengo and is well known in this county. He was born in Athens county, Ohio, on the 11th of January, 1847, of the marriage of Reuel and Sarah (Hixson) Sayers. Both parents passed their entire lives in the Buckeye state and are there laid to rest. The family name indicates the English lineage of our subject. He is one of nine children, as follows: Reuben, Amos, Ephraim, William J., Susan, deceased; Isaiah, Mary, Warren and one who died unnamed.

William J. Sayers was but six years of age when the family removed to Williams county, Ohio, and there he attended school. He also received much valuable instruction from his father, who taught him practical methods of tilling the soil and caring for stock. When twenty-one years of age our subject started out in life for himself and for two years was employed at farm work by others. In 1870 he located in Cono township, Iowa county, Iowa, and three years later, in connection with a brother, purchased one hundred and sixty acres of land in Benton county. They did not own that property long, however, and after selling it bought two hundred and forty acres of land in Cono township, this county. In 1876 William J. Sayers purchased his brother's interest in the place and for a number of years bought and sold farms, owning at one time thirteen hundred acres of land. He has disposed of much of that, but still holds title to between six hundred and seven hundred acres of highly improved and very valuable farming land. At one time he was also extensively interested in real estate, in Texas and Kansas, but has now disposed of his land in those states. He has bought and

shipped cattle and hogs and has been an extensive stock feeder. For a number of years he also engaged in breeding full blooded cattle but has now largely discontinued his stock-raising activities. He was for many years a director of the First National Bank at Marengo but is not now connected with that institution in an official capacity. He is the owner of the Iowa Valley Canning Company, making a specialty of canning corn, as he realizes the opportunity along that line that is offered in Iowa, whose soil and climate is so well adapted to the raising of fine sweet corn. The product of his factory is shipped all over the country, but principally to the western coast. He supervises carefully all phases of his business and as he is energetic and prudent his interests are well managed and he is one of the wealthy men of his county.

On the 18th of September, 1878, occurred the marriage of Mr. Sayers and Miss Addie M. Ball, a daughter of James and Angeline (Rudolph) Ball, pioneers of Ohio. Mr. and Mrs. Sayers have had six children: Della A., now Mrs. A. J. Gray, of Savannah, Illinois; Blanche C., the wife of E. W. Branch, of Marengo; Leo M., a daughter, who has passed away; J. William, living in Marengo; Margaret Ramona, who gave her hand in marriage to Harry Hibbs, of Greeley, Colorado; and Reuel M., of Marengo.

Mr. Sayers is a democrat and has taken considerable interest in public affairs. His wife is a member of the Presbyterian church, which he also attends. In 1900 he built a fine residence at the edge of town upon two hundred and forty-five acres of land which he owned, but has since sold some of that tract for town lots. He occupies a prominent position in his community and it is a source of satisfaction to him that he owes his success to his own ability, industry and good management. His prosperity is not used for his own interests alone, but he is ready to contribute to the support of worthy public enterprises, thus being a factor in the development of his city and county.

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#### J. C. WALKER.

Among the successful business men of Conroy is J. C. Walker, who is engaged in the lumber and grain business. He is a native of Hilton township, born August 12, 1863, and is a son of David and Jeannette (Sanders) Walker, both natives of Scotland. In 1852 they left that country and crossed the Atlantic to America, locating first in Allegheny county, Pennsylvania, whence they removed to Scott county, Iowa, where they lived for some time. Eventually the father took up his residence upon a farm of eighty acres in Hilton township, this county, where he built a good residence of native lumber and in other ways improved his place. Both he and his wife died in this county. They were the parents of six children, of whom our subject is the only one now living.

J. C. Walker remained at home until he was twenty-seven years of age and supplemented his public-school training by a course in a business college of Des Moines. He then began farming upon his own account and after devoting ten years to agricultural pursuits he removed to Marengo, where for two years he was engaged in the harness and implement business. At the end of that time he came to Conroy and turned his attention to dealing in lumber and grain. He

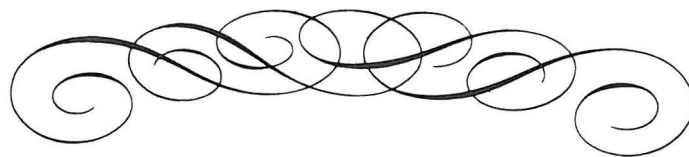

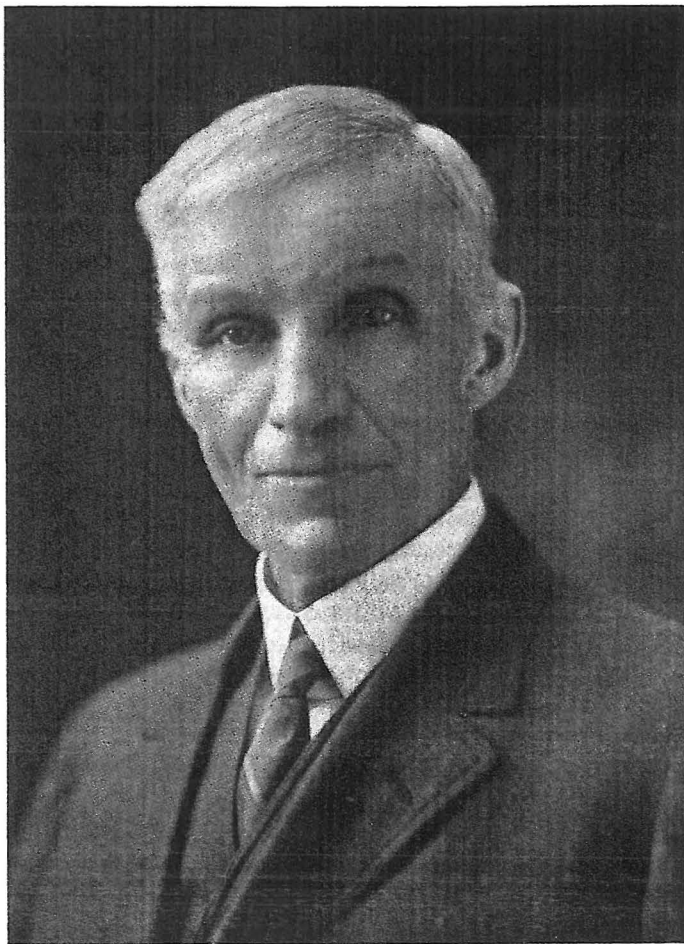

## WILLIAM J. SAYERS

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For many years he was a director of the First National Bank of Marengo. He was the owner of the Iowa Valley Canning Company, making a specialty of canning corn, as he realized the opportunity along that line that is offered in Iowa, whose soil and climate is so well adapted to the raising of fine sweet corn. Mr. Sayers married September 18, 1878, to Miss Addie M. Ball, daughter of James and Angeline (Rudolph) Ball, pioneers of Ohio. Mr. and Mrs. Sayers had six children: Della, now Mrs. A. J. Gray; Blanche C., wife of E. W. Branch of Marengo; Leo M., a daughter who passed away; J. William, living in Marengo; Margaret Ramona, who married Harry Hibbs of Greeley, Colorado; and Reuel M of Marengo.

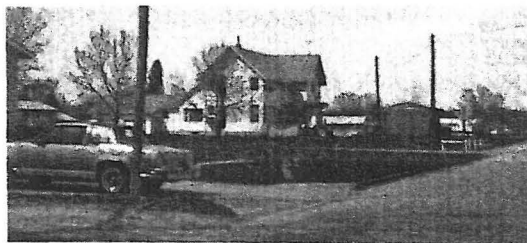
They were members of the Presbyterian Church. In 1900, they built a fine residence at the edge of town, upon two hundred and forty five acres of land which he owned. He sold the tracts for Town Lots. (Ia. Co. Hist. 1915)

In 1984 the Sayers are still contributing to the county in beneficial ways. Marengo Township lists Mac. J. Sayers, Trustee, living in Section 8, and Jim Sayers also Section 8. The families appear in 1874, in Marengo Township, of Sections 8 and 5 as E. and W. Sayers. In 1900, under Pleasant Valley, Cono Township (Marengo), as large landowners of W. J. Sayers. The cemetery appears on their land above the top hills. The old cemetery is where Chief Cono and his wife are buried. This road is one of the early Indian Trails that was north of the Iowa River, and was a state road going northwest. Today it is called F. 15.

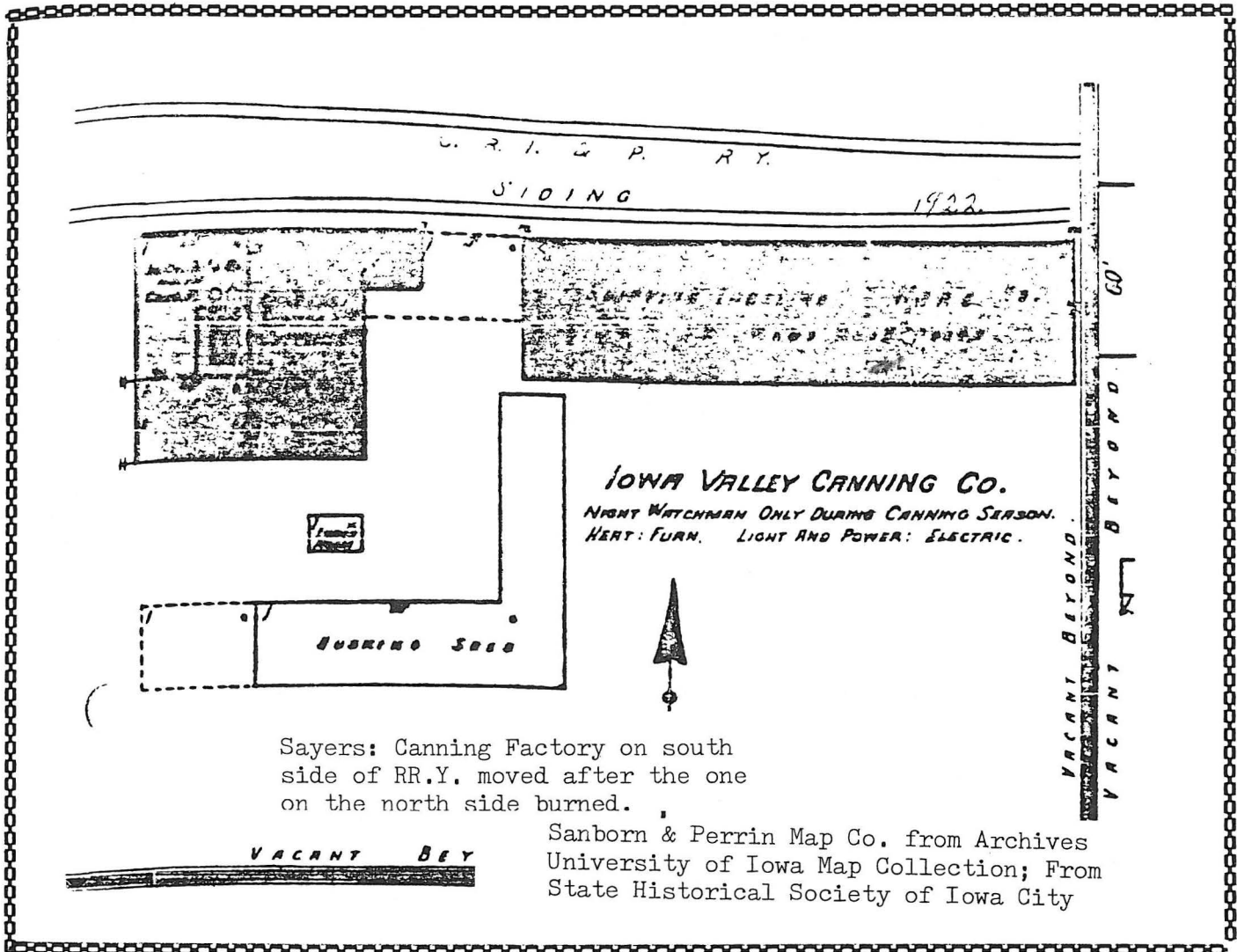
Buried in the Marengo I.O.O.F. Cemetery is: William J. 1847-1930 and Addie M. 1860-1926; with James 1886-1952 and Mabel Sayers 1895-1976; Leo Laurene 1883-1904; Della Sayers Gray 1879-1968 and Arthur J. Gray 1871-1917. There is a cross marker for James who died in 1945, age 21 years, in the cemetery on top of the hill on the family farm. A Veteran of World War II, he is buried in Holland.

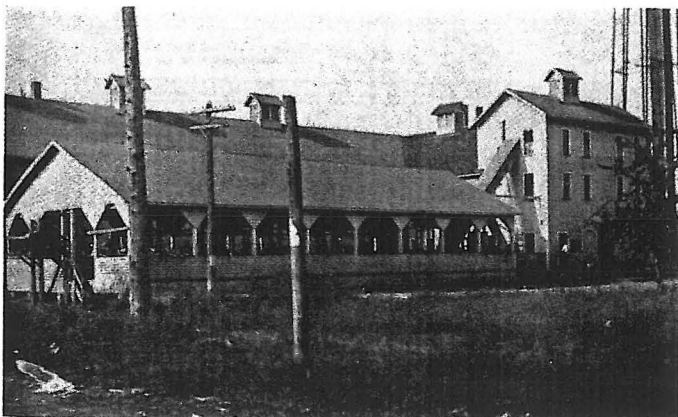

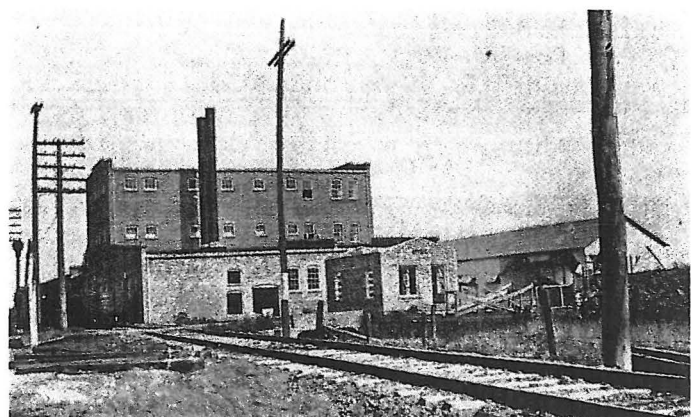

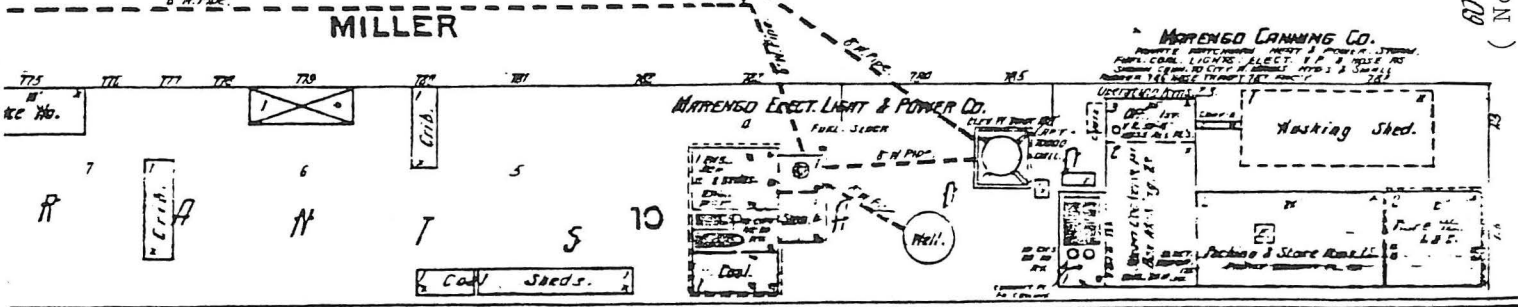
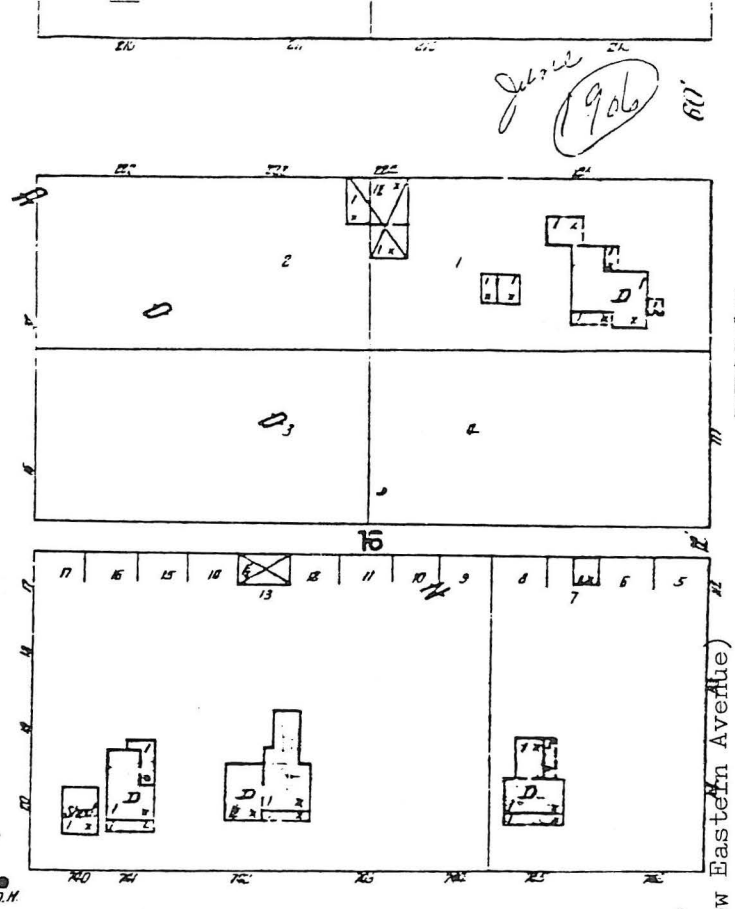
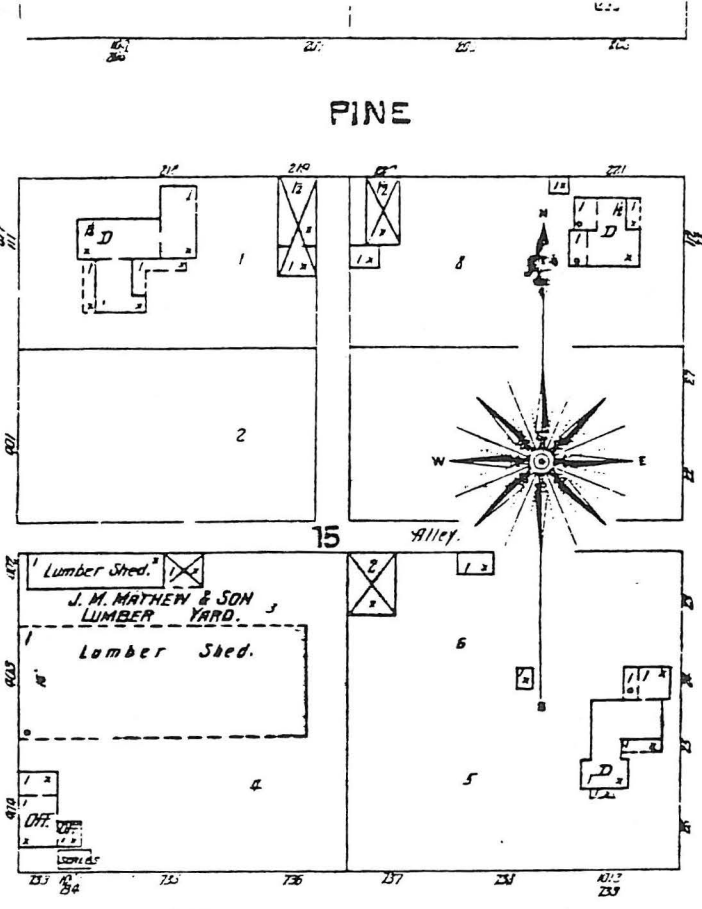
OLD CANNING FACTORY, MARENGO, DESTROYED BY FIRE

tice of medicine until his death. His first practice was in Chicago. In 1896 he removed to Estherville, Iowa, and later to Ottumwa where he practiced for twenty-five years. In 1911 he was elected representative and was twice re-elected, serving in the Thirty-sixth, Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth general assemblies. In 1925 he removed to Des Moines and practiced his profession principally in Beaverville.

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LEVI B. SHANNON was born in Warren County, Iowa, March 28, 1877, and died in Des Moines November 6, 1930. Burial was in Glendale Cemetery, Des Moines. His parents were James M. and Agnes Shannon. While still in his teens he entered the ministry. For twenty-five years he served the Methodist Episcopal church as a pastor, among his locations being Simpson Church, and Jordan Memorial Church, both in Des Moines, and churches at Brooks, Adams County; Cromwell, Union County; Wiota, Cass County; and Tingley, Ringgold County, being pastor at the latter place at the time of his death. In 1928 he was elected representative from Cass County and served in the Forty-third General Assembly.

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FRANK GILBERT was born at Clinton, Wisconsin, November 4, 1852, and died in Chicago, Illinois, April 15, 1922. Burial was at Monona, Clayton County, Iowa. His parents, Lovell B. and Lydia Gilbert, removed with their family to near Monona, in 1857. He was educated in rural schools and in Monona High School. During most of his active business life he was a grain and live stock dealer at Monona. He held several local positions of trust, among them being mayor of Monona, and postmaster at that place. In 1910 he was elected representative, running as a Democrat, and served in the Thirty-fourth General Assembly.

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WILLIAM J. SAYERS was born in Athens County, Ohio, January 11, 1847, and died in Marengo, Iowa, October 6, 1930. His parents were Ruel and Sarah Hixon Sayers. He removed to Iowa County in 1868, and during all his active life followed farming and stock raising and dealing in the vicinity of Marengo. He was successful in business and was a man of integrity. In 1919 he was elected representative as a Democrat, and served in the Thirty-eighth General Assembly. For several years he was president of the Iowa Valley Canning Company of Marengo.

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HENRY E. NICOLAUS was born in Wilton Junction February 29, 1860, and died in that town March 1, 1930. His parents were Henry Edward and Margaret Nicolaus. For many years he followed in his native town the business of a clothing merchant. He served in many public positions, was fire chief, member of the town council, president of the commercial club, was postmaster several years, and in 1899 was elected representative and served in the Twenty-eighth General Assembly. Politically he acted with the Democratic party.
