

HON. W. H. WALRATH CALLED

Willie Hamilton Walrath, son of Isaac and Catherine (Zoller) Walrath, was born in Fayette county, Iowa, April 25, 1857, and died in

For many years he was a farmer and stock raiser in this community, and after disposing of his farm in 1902 he moved into town and engaged in the real estate and insurance business. He always took a lively interest in public affairs, serving several terms as assessor and township-trustee, and was a member of the board of education over twenty years, much of that time acting as its president. In 1902 he was elected a member of the county board of supervisors which office he held until January 1, 1916. He was elected and served as Representative from Fayette county in the 37th and 38th General Assemblies of Iowa. In all his public service he was faithful to the trust imposed upon him. and gave honest and conscientious attention to the duties he was called upon to perform.

He was married in 1879 to Miss Velma E. Doane, who died in 1882. On October 30, 1889, he was married to Miss Mary Grace Hutchison, who survives him. While Mr. and Mrs. Walrath had no children, Miss Emma Sherman, afterwards Mrs. John Schulte, came into their home as a child and remained with them as a daughter until her marriage.

Mr. Walrath was the youngest and last surviving member of an old and respected pioneer family that had a large part in making the early history of Favette county, and his passing is sadistingialos the the communit volu

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This represents an increased consumption of approximately 2.25 lbs. of butter per person in the county in 1931 as compared to two pears previous.

The amount of butter in cold storage on April 1 was 9,000,000 lbs. as compared to 15,000,000 lbs. March 1, and a five year average of 13,000,-000 lbs. as of April 1. There is however an increase in the number of dairy heifers being kept for production purposes which will have to be reckoned with when it comes to figuring production for the coming flush season. To offset this gain is the poor condition of most cattle as they go and have gone onto pasture which will require considerable feed to build up before there is any very material increase in the amount of butterfat produced.

Lime Ahead for Alfalfa

Looking ahead, and liming this year for a piece of alfalfa one, two or three years from now is just good business according to those who have had the best success in the growing of this valuable crop.

Limestone is nothing more or less than pulverized rock and is not very rapidly dissolved. It takes many good rains, plenty of soil moisture and lots of weathering to thoroughly dissolve the rock and correct the acid condition of the soil. Small amounts of limestone were used in the county as long as 12-15 years ago and these plots still are sweet. Some have used limestone without having the soil tested and there are instances where many tons have been applied to soils that were already sweet when there were other places nearby that were badly in need of limestone. A good practice that has been followed by many is to apply limestone on corn ground after the corn is planted and it will then be thoroughly worked into the surface during cultivation. This practice is more desirable than waiting until the corn is taken off in the fall.

The finer the limestone is pulverized the better, and there is no danger of getting too much on. The soil test shows the amount of 100 per cent limestone it needs to correct the acidity assuming that it is all available in a reasonable length of time. Few samples of limestone however will test 100 per cent and where there is coarse material in it, it will not be all available for a good many years. For these reasons it is always best to apply some more than the test shows, the amount of course depending an that teste clather limest societe in a used and its fineness as determined by a screen test.
