SAMUEL C. HERVEY PASSED AWAY MONDAY

Samuel C. Hervey, Sr. 85 and for more than 50 years a resident of Iowa, a greater part of which he has lived at Irwin and Harlan, passed away Monday afternoon in a hospital at Siloam, Ark.

The body was brought to Harlan and funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at the H. C. Pauley Funeral Home, conducted by Rev. Earl B. Clark, pastor of the Christian church. Interment was in the city cemetery.

For the past few years, Mr. Hervey had spent considerable time in travel. It was during one of these trips that his fatal illness overtook him.

The first indication of his serious condition was received in a telegram by relatives Saturday. In response to the message his son Samuel and Fred Sorensen a brother-in-law, motored to Siloam Springs, leaving here that night. They arrived in Siloam Springs Sunday, and on advice the patient was suffering with pneumonia was moved to a hospital. His death occurred Monday afternoon.

Samuel C. Hervey, son of David A. and Marguerite Christy Hervey, was born July 19, 1845 in Harrison County, Ohio, and passed away after a short illness.

THE DEATH OF JAMES W. BAILEY

PNEUMONIA FOLLOWING FLU, THE CAUSE

Funeral Services Will Be Held At
St. Michael's Catholic Church
Friday Morning at 9

Jas. W. Bailey, long identified with the civic and social life of Harlan passed away at his home at about 6:00 P. M. Tuesday evening.

The cause of death was pneumonia and complications following an attack of flu. His illness was of short duration. He had suffered an attack of flu just a short time before and he was away from the office for several days. His sickness rapidly grew worse and in his weakened condition, he was unable to withstand the ravages of the last attack.

A few days before Mr. Bailey's death, he joined the Catholic church and the Last Sacrament of the church was administered before he passed away.

He is survived by his wife and one son, Bernard, a lawyer of Harlan, and a host of relatives and a large circle of friends.

His age was just past 62 years. Most of his life was spent in Harlan and he had an active part in the political, civic and social life of the community.

He was born in Illinois and came to Harlan when a small boy and for many years made his home with Mr. and Mrs. O. P. Wyland. He was educated in the Des Moines schools and also attended Des Moines College for some time.

He was affiliated with the Democratic party and during his young manhood here, he served 2 terms in the state legislature as representative from this county; he also served two terms as deputy county clerk. For many years previous to his political service he was associated with O. P. Wyland and L. M. Kerr in the Shelby County Abstract Co., and as an abstractor he attained unusual success owing to his efficiency in this work.

Bailey has served the office of city clerk, a position which he held at the time of his death.

Mr. Bailey was a member of all the local Masonic Orders, the Blue Lodge, Chapter, Council, Knights Templar, and also an honorary member of Tangier Temple, Omaha. In the local Masonic lodges he had held all the principal offices. He took an most active part in the lodge degree work and in those sections of the work where the ritual lectures were given, he was always in demand for this part because of his most efficient and impressive manner in portraying the meaning.

Funeral services will be held at St. Michael's Catholic church tomorrow (Friday) morning at nine A. M., conducted by Father Chas. J. McAniff. Interment will be in city cemetery.
