The Rockford community lost one of its most highly regarded and popular citizens Saturday afternoon when the spirit of George Dunkelberg passed from scenes of earth, following an illness of several years and an acute illness of several months. All that medical skill could do was done for the patient by those near to him, but the character of his ailment was such that slight relief resulted. In the passing of Mr. Dunkelberg the community loses one who was kind and indulgent in his family and who was interested in the best things having for their object a betterment of the community life, and one who by his uniformly cheery and genial personality, did much to brighten the lives of those who came in contact with him.

George H. Dunkelberg was born in Niagara County, New York, in 1853, being 66 years, 2 months and 11 days old at the time of death. He was the son of Jeremiah and Matilda (Shook) Dunkelberg, both natives of Niagara County, N. Y. In 1867 this family moved to Ogle County, Illinois. George H. was the second child in this family of twelve children and grew to manhood on the home farm in Ogle County. He received a common school education and later attended Rock River seminary. He taught school for a period of 5 years in his home county, but abandoned this profession for farming. In 1882 Mr. Dunkelberg was married to Mary E. Hubbard, daughter of Wm. Hubbard of Ogle County, and this couple came directly to Rockford township and set up housekeeping on the farm. Six children were born to this union. They are: Mrs. D. J. Mitchell, Lincoln, Ill.; R. F. Dunkelberg, A. M. Dunkelberg and F. E. Dunkelberg of Rockford, Iowa; Wilbur E. Dunkelberg of Tientsin,

China, and Miss Irene Dunkelberg, who is attending school at Iowa City, all of whom were present except Wilbur. The mother of these children passed out of this life Feb. 1st, 1906. Mr. Dunkelberg subsequently married Minnie E. Gale of Ogle County, Illinois, who survives him.

Mr. Dunkelberg was one of the early leaders of the republican party in Floyd county and in 1916 was elected representative to the legislature where he made a commendable record, which was in every way satisfactory to his constituents and to all concerned. Fraternally, he belonged to the Masonic Order, including the consistory and the Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. He was also a member of the Knights of Pythias and the Ancient Order of United Workmen. He was a member of the Methodist church and belonged to the official board at the time of his demise.

The funeral was held from the home Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, being conducted by Rev. H. C. Culver of Clinton, a former pastor of the local Methodist church, who was assisted by Rev. C. E. Baker, the present pastor.
