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DAVID S. FLECK, 73, DIES AT HOME IN NEWTON TODAY

**Prominent Resident of City,
County Succumbs After
Long Illness.**

Served as State Senator Under
Governor Harding; Prominent in
Political, Religious Circles.

David S. Fleck, 73, prominent resident of Newton and Jasper county for approximately 35 years, died at his home in Newton at 304 East Fourth street North at 6:00 o'clock this morning, following a lingering illness of several years.

Mr. Fleck had been in failing health for the past 10 years, and was an invalid for the last three. He had not been feeling well since Monday of this week, but his condition was not thought serious.

Although details of the funeral services had not been decided this morning pending the arrival of a daughter from Guthrie Center, rites will be held Saturday afternoon from the Murdoch Funeral home, with Dr. L. B. Logan of the Methodist Episcopal church in charge.

Was State Senator

The deceased was prominent in business, political and religious circles while in Newton. He served as state senator under the term of Governor W. L. Harding from 1915-17, and was a member of the Jasper county board of supervisors for a number of terms beginning in 1905. As such, he played a prominent part in the building of the new county courthouse, serving as a member of the building committee. He also was a member of the building committee in charge of the

**HOOVER SIGNS
INJUNCTION LAW**

Washington, March 24.—AP—
President Hoover has signed and
made law the Norris-La Guardia
bill to limit use of injunctions
against labor and to outlaw the
"yellow dog" contracts by which
workers are prevented from or-
ganizing. His action was based on
recommendation of Attorney Gen-
eral Mitchell.

Forty vacant lots, included in the division owned by the Methodist Protestant church and located in the southeastern part of the city, are being offered as garden plots to needy families in Newton. It was announced today by Rev. C. R. Green, pastor of the church. Rev. Green was authorized by a special meeting of the conference board of the Methodist Protestant church of this district, held Tuesday, to make this offer.

The lots are 50 feet wide, and vary from 125 feet to 170 feet in depth. They are to be turned over to those families in Newton needing aid, to be used in raising gardens during the coming summer. No rental charge will be made.

Applications for a garden are to be made to Rev. Green. It was said, who will confer with the local welfare office to determine whether or not the applicant is needing such support. The first 40 making application, which application is decided to be needy, will be given the gardens, Rev. Green declared.

The lots are free of all incumbrances and some of the land is still being sod.

Strips of land four feet wide are being laid off between the lots as neutral ground and as space to travel in caring for the plots.
