**MAN CHARGED WITH SCREWDRIVER THEFT HELD TO GRAND JURY**

Albert Vaughn, 22, Thursday was bound over to the district court on an amended charge of larceny from a building in the daytime of property worth less than \$20 following hearing in municipal court before Judge Ben G. Howrey.

Vaughn was arrested on information signed by Ralph Dickerson, 115 South street, charging him with stealing a number of screwdrivers worth more than \$20.

Dickerson, in his testimony, stated Vaughn had been given a consignment of screwdrivers over a year ago to sell on commission. The next day Vaughn came to Dickerson's residence and took "between 20 and 40 more screwdrivers," which Vaughn was alleged to have taken without permission, and which he was asserted not to have paid for.

Vaughn admitted taking some screwdrivers, but said he took only 10. He said that he and a partner were going to Iowa Falls, and that he wanted more screwdrivers to sell on the road. He said he could not find Dickerson at the time he wished more of the tools.

Ralph W. Travis defended Vaughn and Burr C. Towne, assistant county attorney, appeared for the state.

**MANY PAY HONOR IN FUNERAL RITES FOR HENRY GROUT**

**Pastor Praises Idealism and Devotion of Former State Senator.**

Hundreds of persons gathered Thursday afternoon at First Baptist church to pay final tribute to Henry W. Grout, respected Waterloo citizen and former state senator, who died suddenly Tuesday.

The packed church, abundance of floral offerings, and words of praise and commendation with which the officiating pastors reviewed his life, bore testimony to the high respect his fellow men bore toward him. The service at the church followed a prayer service at the home, 204 Logan avenue.

"Henry Grout was a successful man," said Rev. Earl R. Riney. "He was interested in many worthwhile things, of which his avocation of collecting relics and fossils is an instance. He was a man who could make money and remain true to his high ideals."

**Praises Character.**

The pastor especially praised Mr. Grout's character for his "supreme attitude," his conscientiousness, devotion and idealism; his "supreme spirit," the manner in which he executed every undertaking; and his "supreme goal," the perfection of his accomplishments.

As his text Rev. Mr. Riney took I Corinthians xiii:12.

"For now we see thru a glass, darkly; but then face to face: now I know in part; but then shall I know even as also I am known."

Rev. Edna Bruner, pastor of Universalist church, assisted Rev. Mr. Riney in the service.

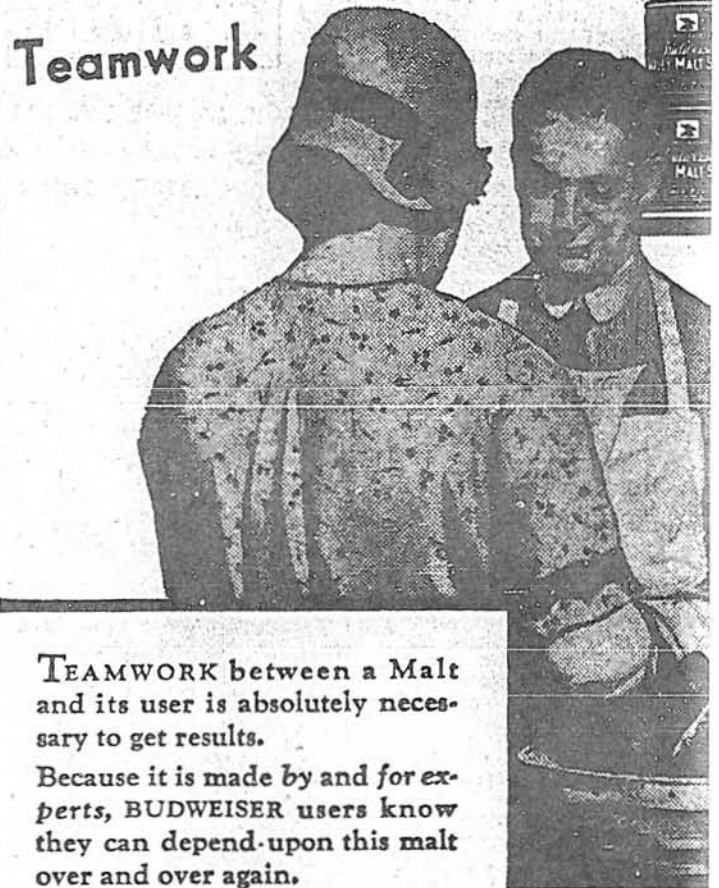
**CHARGED WITH THEFT OF WASHING MACHINE**
