# Funeral Held Saturday For John M. Lindly

## Death Follows Illness of Year, Was 86 Years Old

Funeral services were conducted Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock at the Winfield Presbyterian church for John M. Lindly, 86, who passed away last week Tuesday at Memorial hospital at Mount Pleasant.

Death, following more than a year's illness, came at the age of 86 years, eight months and 20 days.

The Rev. C. E. Chandler officiated at the services.

Mrs. Marvin Lambert sang "The Lord's Prayer", accompanied by Mrs. Keith Crawford.

Burial was in the Winfield-Scott Township cemetery. Pallbearers were Ray Carden, Carl Carden, Chester Haight, Charles Van Dyke, Ellis Hill and Lloyd Lindell.

John Milton Lindly, son of Baynard B. and Clarriet Hanna Lindly, was born November 17, 1864 at Washington, Pennsylvania. He came to Winfield with his parents in April 1866, and maintained his residence here throughout the remainder of his life.

He attended local schools and was graduated from the State University of Iowa in 1889 and from the National Institute of Pharmacy of Chicago in 1892; from the Chautauqua Literary and Scientific Circle in 1898. He taught at the Round Grove school near Winfield and completed one year's teaching in Louisiana in 1894.

Mr. Lindly engaged in pharmacy and banking for many years, and was active in many civic, community and church activities throughout the time he lived here.

~~He was widely known in banking~~ circles as well as in the field of pharmacy. He was quite well known as an historian, and contributed many articles to the State Historical Society of Iowa.

Mr. Lindly practiced pharmacy in Winfield from 1888. He was a member of the Iowa State Pharmaceutical Association for 62 years, serving as its secretary for six years and as treasurer for 37 years. He was secretary of the Winfield school board for 38 years, during which time the present building was erected. He was a member of the Henry County Board of Education for 20 years. He served as mayor of Winfield in 1900, was town clerk 1904-06 and a council member from 1920 to 1928 when the sanitary sewer system was installed.

He represented Henry and Washington counties as state senator for a term of four years, beginning in 1915.

He was cashier of the Bank of Winfield from 1900 to 1933, and was the first president of the Peoples State Bank. In 1935 he was appointed by Governor Clyde L. Herring to serve as pharmacist at the state school at Glenwood, which position he held until his illness in March 1950.

Mr. Lindy was a member of the Presbyterian church of Winfield since 1883. He served as clerk and treasurer of the board of trustees for 30 years, during which time the present building was constructed. He was treasurer of the Sabbath School and taught a Bible class of men. He was a member of a quartet and sang in the church choir for 20 years.
