WALLACE TELLS NEW DEAL PLAN TO AID FARMERS

Secretary Says Ever-Normal
Granary Will Be Economic
Balance Wheel.

Indianapolis, Ind., Nov. 8.—The proposed ever-normal granary plan, Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace today told farm delegations from 13 mid-western states today, is an "economic balance wheel" that will assure prosperity for America's corn belt farmers.

In a nationally broadcast address considered especially significant because it is only one week before congress convenes to enact a permanent farm program, Wallace gave a detailed explanation of the administration's aims and desires on farm legislation.

The secretary announced one new phase of the program — compulsory marketing control during storage periods to force non-cooperating farmers to keep a designated portion of their crop under seal.

Can Control Market.

The government can control marketing through a lower corn loan to non-cooperators, and a "penalty tax on each bushel marketed or fed in excess of the marketed quota," Wallace said.

In case the granary "should overflow," he suggested loans to the cooperators and they might thing like 70 per cent as high as to the cooperators and they might be required to hold a certain percentage of their corn off the market until the granary is no longer overflowing.

Wallace described the ever-normal granary plan as a system of storing surplus grain during abundant crop years and saving the surplus for lean years. The farmers would be financed during the storage periods by government loans similar to the corn loans which have been issued in past years.

"Farmers want this program to be self-financing," Wallace said. (Continued on Page Two)

Suicide Squad Wiped Out by Spanish Reds

Hendaye, France-Spanish Frontier, Nov. 8.—A Spanish nationalist "suicide squad" was reported today to have been killed by loyalists near Biescas, in the Tenedera mountains close to the French frontier.

Mighty nationalist customs guards were surrounded in a tiny village near Biescas. They took refuge in the village's thick, stone-walled houses, forcing the loyalists to take each house separately. In three days their ranks were diminished gradually, and when the loyalists arrived in the last house only two remained. They killed themselves rather than surrender.

Violent engagements were reported from all sectors of the Aragon front where nationalist Generalissimo Francisco Franco is expected to open an offensive soon.

BRITAIN AND REBELS TO EXCHANGE AGENTS

London, Nov. 8.—Great Britain has agreed to exchange of agents with Spanish insurgents to safeguard British interests in Spain. Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden told the house of commons today, but it is in no way recognizing the insurgents as a legally constituted government.

"Agents of Gen. Francisco Franco will be received in London but this does not constitute recognition," Eden said. "Neither party will accord or expect to receive diplomatic status for their agents." Eden's statement was received with strong opposition dissent. Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain acceded to a request of Clement R. DAVID E. MACKIE DIES; LONG HEAD OF VINTON FIRM

Former Banker Succumbs at
Home After Long Illness;
Funeral Tuesday.

DAVID E. MACKIE DIES

David Edward Mackie, 67, former Benton county state representative, ex-councilman of Vinton, one-time banker, charter member of the Greater Vinton club, and prominent retired business man, died at his Vinton home at seven o'clock Sunday morning following a protracted period of ill health. Immediate cause of Mr. Mackie's death was a stroke of apoplexy suffered but a few hours before the end.

Mr. Mackie was a son of Robert and Mary Mackie, Benton county pioneers. He was born June 2, 1870, on the Mackie farm two and three-fourths miles west and one and a quarter miles south of Mt. Auburn.

Moved to Vinton.

On Aug. 10, 1898, he was married to Olive L. Graham on the old Will Graham farm five miles northwest of Vinton. He farmed on the place of his birth until 1920 when he moved his family to Vinton to engage in the implement business.

For 23 years Mr. Mackie was president of the Mt. Auburn Savings bank. From 1914 to 1916 he was a member of the state legislature. While in the legislature he fought for and ultimately obtained a state law that anticipated the federal corn sealing act. As a result of his activities at that time Iowa was not forced to pass special legislation to enable farmers to qualify for federal corn loans. He served one term on the Vinton city council—from 1929 to 1930—standing out as a stalwart advocate of municipal ownership and development of Vinton's water and power plant. He was a charter member of the Greater Vinton club, giving freely of his energies and talents to help put the organization on a firm and lasting basis.

In 1921 Mr. Mackie spent a summer in France where he negotiated for the purchase of large quantities of machinery and army goods which he and his partners established.

Funeral on Tuesday.

At that time he brought 58 new army caterpillar tractors and large consignments of unused blankets, harness, shoes and numerous other.

'GIRL FRIEND' OF DUKE IS HERE

Woman Who Shot Count
Paris Detained by U. S.

New York, Nov. 8.—Magda Fontanges, French girl who shot Count Charles de Chambrun, claimed to be the mistress of Benito Mussolini, was detained by immigration authorities today upon her arrival on the Normandie.

Her arrival was marked by a tumultuous reception on the Normandie during which Normandie officials sought to keep her secluded and finally used a flying wedge of stewards to drive off reporters. Chief Inspector John Ostrum of the immigration department refused to enlarge upon details of detention but admitted that woman who nearly provoked a crisis in European political circles would have to spend the night on Ellis Island.

Hoover spoke at Colby college on the one-hundredth anniversary of the death of Elijah Parish Lovejoy, a Colby graduate who became an abolitionist editor and minister and was killed by a mob which attacked his newspaper plant at Alton, Ill.

Minds Are Confused.

"In the last 15 years," Hoover said, "increasing darkness has descended upon free expression and free criticism in the world. That light has been put out in more than half the so-called civilized earth."

Dictators, he asserted, climbed to power "on the ladder of free speech and free press" and then immediately "suppressed all free speech" except their own. Under dictatorships, Hoover added, "propaganda confused the minds and soiled the spirits of men. The news was colored and facts were distorted. . . Untruth once triumphant could not tolerate debate and free criticism."

In this country, he said, the publishers are the free press's "first line of defense."

"They deserve the gratitude of the country for the zeal with which they have driven back every attempt at legal restrictions," Hoover stated, "but there is a problem of free speech and free press in America wider than sporadic attempts to control it."

Analize All "Isms."

The processes of propaganda, he said, were perfected during the war and are now employed to "promote subtle ambitions, opinions, and a wide variety of 'isms'."

"Propaganda 'has been applied to politics. . . If you don't like an argument on currency or the budget or labor relations or what not, you put out slims and if possible anonymous propaganda reflecting upon your opponent's grandmother or the fact that his cousin is employed in Wall Street' or is a communist or a reactionary," Hoover charged.

"You switch the premise and set up straw men and then attack them with fierce courage."

Hoover said he did not suggest any extension of legal or governmental control over speech and press in order "to suppress this improved form of corruption."

M WORKER FATALLY IT IN CRASH

CHICAGO SLAYER GIVEN 14 YEARS

Help to Police Cuts Term
Of Death Accomplish.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—Leonard Doney, 31, pleaded guilty to complicity in the "moonlight rendezvous" slaying of Herbert F. Lee, Evanston butcher, today and was sentenced to 14 years imprisonment. It was the lightest penalty possible under the murder indictment.

Judge Robert Jerome Dunne of criminal court granted leniency at the request of Assistant State's Attorney Emmett Moynihan and Lieut. Thomas Kelly of the state's attorney's police. Lee was slain the morning of Aug. 22 as he strolled through Grant park with Miss Lucille Buehler, buxom blonde party girl whom police claim formerly contributed to Doney's support.

Given 99-Year Term.

Anthony ("Saps") Saplenza, confessed "trigger man" in the robbery-slaying, was sentenced to 99 years imprisonment by Judge Dunne last Friday. Albert Minella, third member of the holdup gang, pleaded guilty with Saplenza and was sentenced to 30 years.

Doney, granted a severance from the other defendants when he pleaded not guilty, was brought into court to change the plea in a surprise move today. He confessed he drove the car in which the slayers escaped and pleaded for a light sentence. "What sentence do you think you should get," asked Judge Dunne.

Lawyer Makes Plea.

Attorney Frank Ferlich, appearing as public defender for the prisoner, suggested that the driver of an automobile in such cases customarily is sentenced to 14 years. Moynihan and Kelly both agreed on the sentence, pointing out that Doney had cooperated with them in the search for Saplenza, captured last week while hiding out in Lord's prayer on penitents at a Shreveport, La., street fair.
