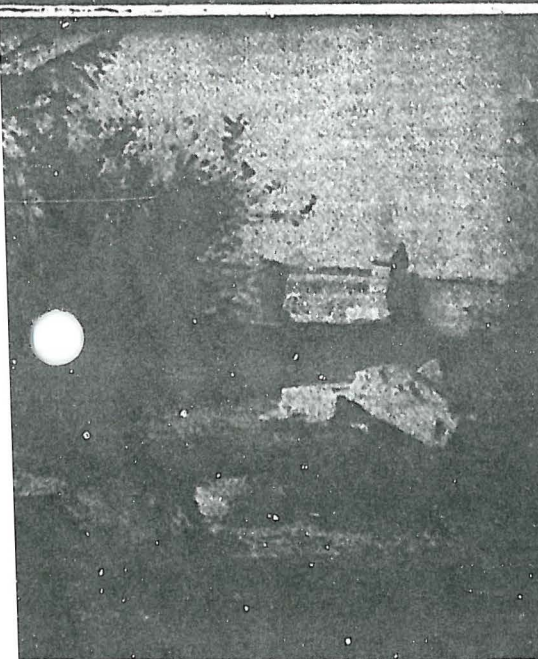
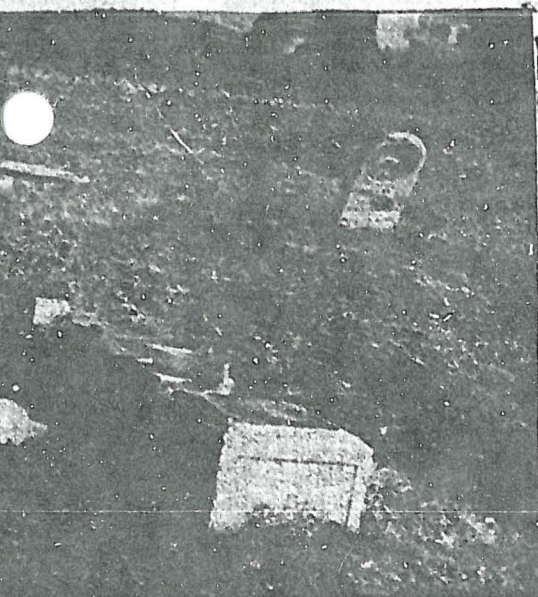

'G.G.' Supply May Halt '53 Epidemic

WASHINGTON (P) — Gamma globulin, a new aid in the polio fight, may be in sufficient supply by next summer to help control any particularly heavy outbreaks of the disease in certain areas.

But it's doubtful there would be enough to attempt giving all the nation's 30 million children the temporary protection believed possible with the substance.

That's the prospect held out Tuesday by Dr. Hart E. Van Riper, medical director of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. He said the National Research council and other government agencies are working on plans to procure and allocate present limited supplies of the material—and increase them as much as possible.

Dr. Van Riper told about the supply situation in a copyrighted interview with "U.S. News & World Report," a weekly news magazine published in Washington.

In the same interview, Van Riper said that despite recent advances in the quest for a practical vaccine against polio—a material that might afford lasting protection in contrast to the temporary protection of G. G.—"there's little chance of one being available for the 1953 polio season.

School Rated As Class AA

Webster City, ranked as one of the 40 largest schools in the state, is now rated as a Class AA school, the latest bulletin issued by the Iowa High School Athletic association showed today.

The October bulletin of the IHSAA has Webster City in the Class AA classification of the central district with an average high school attendance of 464.33.

Other Class AA schools in the district include Ames, Boone, Des Moines East, Lincoln, North, Roosevelt and Tech High, Fort Dodge, Marshalltown and Newton.

Webster City is rated 36th among the 40 largest high schools in Iowa, Davenport being the largest on an average attendance of 1,805.46. Webster City rates slightly higher in attendance than Charles City, Wilson High of Cedar Rapids, Centerville and Cedar Falls—the last four in the list of 40.

Assignment of this city as a Class AA school will make a material difference in this city's assignment in the annual basketball tournament. Class AA schools the past several years have not had to compete in sectional tournaments.

Rube McFerren Dies in City At Age of 83

Funeral Rites Here Wednesday for Pioneer Lawyer and Writer

Rube McFerren, 83, widely known pioneer Webster City resident died at 3:30 p.m. yesterday at the Hamilton county hospital where he had been a patient the past three and one-half weeks.

Funeral services will be at 2 p.m. Wednesday at the Foster funeral home with the Rev. J. J. Share officiating. Burial will be at Graceland cemetery.

Born Near City—

Rube McFerren, who represented one of the pioneer families of Hamilton county, was born Jan. 31, 1868, about one mile north of Webster City. He was the son of William D. and Emma A. Bennett McFerren, who came from Ohio to Webster City, then known as New castle, in 1855.

He was educated in the public schools of Webster City, in the State Normal school at Cedar Falls and at Iowa State University at Iowa City. He was admitted to the bar by the supreme court of Iowa in 1890, at which time he entered upon the active work of the legal profession.

He served as city attorney of Webster City from 1907 to 1909 and as state representative from Hamilton county for two terms from 1915 to 1917.

Mr. McFerren was also an ordained minister, having served at Duncombe and surrounding vicinity.

Married in 1885—

He was united in marriage August 3, 1885 to Minnie A. Clockman, and to this union were born three sons and one daughter—Donald, Robert, Maynard and June. Mrs. McFerren preceded him in death July 9, 1927, and Maynard McFerren was killed in Germany in 1942, during World War II action. He was also preceded in death by his parents, one brother and two sisters.

Surviving are two sons and one daughter, Donald and Robert, both of Webster City, and Mrs. Ralph (June) McClure of Iowa Falls. Also surviving are three grandchildren, Terry Ann McFerren of Britt and Peter and Mary McClure of Iowa Falls.

Mr. McFerren was author of the book, "Distribution," published in 1940, and also had written a book of poems. A champion of the cause of the farmer in the days of the 1920's, he organized the National Farm League. He was always interested in matters of progressive citizenship, and his public spirit was often manifested in many ways.

Fire Sweeps Timber Area At Stratford

STRATFORD — Fire was smouldering in a 40-acre timberland area near Stratford Tuesday after an all-day battle by Stratford town and rural residents in a sector along the Des Moines river.

The timberland is located in portions of two farms, owned by Grover Iles and Carl Soder. Iles was picking corn yesterday morning about 10 o'clock when he noticed smoke coming up from along the river. He and his two sons, Donald and Kenneth, investigated and found the fire well under way.

They battled the blaze which kept spreading east, fanned by high wind, and then sent for help with Soder coming down to aid in the difficult task of beating out the flames and sparks.

A large group of volunteers came from Stratford in the evening and had to beat the fire out as there was no way of getting a fire truck into the wooded and hilly area. After several hours work, the group had the situation well in hand and apparently in danger was over.

Fred Fry, living north of the area, noticed late at night that the fire had started up again at a place called Harold Westrum, who farm was near the scene. Fry, Harold and Eldon Westrum all took up the fight again and once again brought the flames under control.

At one time during the day, it was feared that the Iles home might be endangered by the spreading flames, but the danger was averted and no damage was done to the residence.

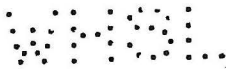

RUBE McFERREREN.

Rube McFerren needs no introduction to the readers of this volume, for he has been a lifelong resident of Hamilton county save for a brief period of two years. Determining to devote his life to the practice of law, he has made continuous progress in his profession through close application, thorough preparation and devotion to his clients' interests. He was born January 31, 1868, about a mile north of Webster City, representing one of the old families of the county. His father, W. D. McFerren, came from Ohio to Iowa in 1855, settling in Hamilton county, where he secured a tract of land and began farming. For about two years, from 1907 until 1909, he served as city attorney.

W. F. HUNTER.

W. F. Hunter, secretary and treasurer of the Freeman-Tribune Publishing Company, was born in Eldorah, Iowa, June 9, 1863, a son of J. D. and Sarah A. (Gates) Hunter, both of whom were natives of Ohio. His paternal grandfather was a newspaper man in Angola, Steuben county, Indiana, and was a very prominent advocate of the abolition cause, utilizing his paper as a factor in advocating his belief. He was a candidate for congress in Indiana on the abolition ticket, and he gave direct evidence of his opposition to slavery by making his home a station on the famous underground railroad, whereby many a slave was assisted on his way to freedom in the north. After some years' residence in Indiana he returned to Ohio. His son, J. D. Hunter, became a resident of Iowa in 1857, at which time he settled in Eldorah and purchased the Eldorah Ledger. In 1866 he came to Webster City and purchased the Hamilton Freeman. He was, thereafter, identified with newspaper interests here until his death and in 1900 he consolidated the Freeman with the Tribune, which has since been published under the name of the Freeman-Tribune. 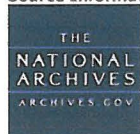
