THREE DIED IN TRAILER HOME FIRE SUNDAY

Fire in the early hours of Sunday morning at the trailer home of William Yanda, claimed the lives of his three children, Marilyn, 6, Robert Allen 8, and Joyce Delphino 11, and sent his wife, Thora, to the hospital burned critically.

The fire is supposed to have started from an explosion of the oil stove with which the trailer was heated.

The Yandas had been to the midnight show, and the heater seemed to be working perfectly when they retired about 1:30 o'clock. Shortly after three o'clock Mr. Yanda said he was awakened from sound sleep by loud screams. He arose hurriedly, and tried to grasp what was the matter.

Two closet doors of the trailer when opened partitioned off a separate room at the rear of the trailer. This room was the sleeping quarters of the parents.

Opening these doors, or rather closing them, he came face to face with a mass of flames. Instinctively he made for the door, fell out when he got it opened. His wife followed him a moment later her night clothes a-flame. The flames followed them out of the door.

Yanda said he went to the other side of the trailer and broke a window in a frantic effort to get to the children, but blaze met him there.

Nothing was heard from them after their first terrible screams, and it is believed they suffocated, before the blaze could have caused much suffering.

Their bed was not far from the stove, and it is doubtful if all the help in the world could have saved them after the explosion had once occurred.

Neighbors heard the children scream and were soon on the scene to give aid. An alarm clock in the trailer stopped at 3:30. It was 3:45 when the alarm reached the fire department. The chief didn't wait to attach to a hydrant when told that children were in the burning trailer, but immediately started water from the booster tanks playing on the burning mass. The roof was being off the trailer as the fire trucks arrived.

The charred bodies of the children were not on their bed. A hole was cut in the trailer side where the bed was and a burning mass of clothing was pulled out. It had fallen from a closet. The children's bodies were found later on the floor nearby.

H. M. Hows, who drove one of the fire trucks, helped to take out two of the charred bodies.

Roy W. Murray, 70, Died Monday After A Brief Illness

Roy William Murray, a resident of Marion from 1928 to 1941, died Monday, January 24, 1944, at his late home in Atkins, following a brief illness.

Mr. Murray was born April 1, 1873 at Vernon, Ill., the son of the Rev. William M. and Annie Green Murray, and on January 17, 1900, was married in Illinois to Louise Ethel Keyes. She survives together with their six children, Mrs. Greydon P. Forrest, of Hopkinton, Mrs. H. P. Schultz, of Alexandria, Va., Mrs. Owen E. Scott, of Cedar Rapids, Mrs. Lylal H. Neas, of Atkins, Tech. Sgt. Billy K. Murray, of Fort Dix, N. J., Mrs. Hugh B. Kuhn, of San Francisco, Calif.

Surviving besides the children are two sisters, Mrs. Theodore Harman, of Manchester and Mrs. John A. Smith, of Lincoln, Ill., and seven grandchildren.

Mr. Murray was a member of the Marion Methodist church, Crescent lodge, No. 22, A. F. & A. M., and Iowa Consistory, No. 2, of Cedar Rapids and Shrine Temple, of Cedar Rapids.

He was educated in public schools and business college in Illinois and at Purdue University and lived in Storm Lake and Cedar Rapids before coming to Marion, served as representative in the legislature, 1914-1918 from Buena Vista county, was a member of the state bar association and the state historical society, and was on the road many years for the Metropolitan Supply company.

Funeral services will be held in the Yocom chapel Sunday at 2:30 with the Rev. A. W. Henke, and Crescent lodge in charge. Burial will be made in the Ratzel cemetery at Atkins.

Letters to Chinese Children Suggested

Mayor John C. Mullin, who, in promoting the Chinese relief drive, recently conducted a prize essay contest in our public schools, has further expanded the idea. He has suggested that the prize winning students each write letters to children of similar age in China, and write to United Chinese Relief headquarters, asking if they could furnish names of children to receive such letters.

This they could not do, but they in a letter to Mayor Mullin, thanked him for the idea, and it may be developed later all over the country, as a means of stimulating better understanding and greater good will between the two great nations.

In a second letter which was received by the mayor, it was suggested that the letters be written by the winning eleven, addressed merely "Dear Friend," and that these will be forwarded to the Nankai school in Chungking, China, in care of the president, Chang Po-lin, with instructions to please deliver the letters to children of like ages there. That school has pupils from kindergarten to university age.

The Marion young folk are busy getting their letters ready, and Mayor Mullin will start them on their way to China. Copies of the winning essays have been forwarded to Washington D. C., and experts may be used in a promotion newspaper, and thus help scatter Marion's fair name abroad.

MUSIC CONTEST PLANNED HERE LAST OF MARCH

Marion will be host to the WAMaC conference music contest for larger groups—band, glee clubs, and the choruses—on March 31st, it was announced Thursday. All eight schools of the conference have agreed to participate in this innovation.

Only soloists and smaller groups will go in for the district and state contests this year, because of the difficulties with transportation.

Plans for the music contest here were decided Wednesday night at a meeting of WAMaC officers held Wednesday evening in Monticello. Marion representatives at the confab were Supt. C. B. Vernon, A. W. Salisbury, high school principal, Coaches Scherich and Hulin, and G. L. Lyman, instrumental music instructor.

Also discussed at the meeting were details for other coming conference events.

HONOR ROLL IS NEARLY READY

The honor roll of service men enlivened in World War II which Marion Post, No. 298, American Legion, is having erected in the northwest corner of the city park, is partially completed, and last Friday the Seventh avenue side of the Y-shaped stand was given over to the public eye.

It contains eight rows of names. Each row containing 38 names of the young men from Marion and its immediate vicinity who have entered some branch of our country's service. Some of those listed are known to have already paid the supreme price of war. Others are known to have been wounded, others are known to be missing and several are prisoners. These are all neatly printed in gothic capital letters, and are splendidly legible.

This is not the complete list. Other names are being painted. A panel at a time. The Legion committee has been working on this job for several months. It has been difficult to get workmen. Other names are being painted on panels which will eventually fill the Tenth street side of the stand.

Each month there are new enlistments, and no doubt there are many names who belong on this honor roll that have not been turned into the Legion. They are anxious that every service man shall be enrolled. They ask your help.

The Legion has spent several hundred dollars on this project and want it complete. The stand will hold over 600 names. Over 300 are already up. Later the stand will carry a banner line telling what it represents.

Rural Teachers Are Taking Examinations

This is an important week for rural school teachers at least for those who lack uniform teaching certificates, and desire same. Examinations started Wednesday, and the subjects concerned include school management, orthography, reading, geography, U. S. history, home economics. Thursday's subjects were arithmetic, psychology, agriculture, music, grammar, penmanship, civics, constitution and civil government. On Friday the exams call for knowledge of algebra, English composition, elementary school methods, and general science.

Oxley and Edwin D. Blinks, all of Marion.

COMMUNITY'S WAR BOND SALE LAGGING SO FAR

The Fourth War Bond drive in Marion has not been such a hot success. At the end of the first week, January 22, Marion and Marion township, with a goal of \$300,000 to meet, is considerably behind schedule, with its total of \$46,609.

Of course it is too early to draw conclusions. The bond-buyers may think there is plenty of time. And there is. It looks like there will always be time to buy bonds. But Marion bond sale workers would like to see this sterling community go over the top early and be an inspiration to others.

A number of the township workers have not yet made reports and that may swell the totals.

One thing is certain. The American people will have to buy bonds and more bonds. There must be money forthcoming to pay our soldiers and our terrific war expenses. Let us hope the people will put up this money voluntarily, and that force methods will not have to be adopted. Do you remember how that during World War I, how many people were compelled to buy bonds—how the people who were thought to be doing less than their share, were waited upon by angry neighbors, and compelled to dig up? Houses were painted yellow and emittes and hard feelings were engendered that lasted for years. It is certainly to be hoped that a repetition of such measures will be avoided. And the way to do this is for all the people who are able to invest heavily in bonds. Some are not able. Others must make up the difference. For the government must have money with which to pay its bills.

Nine of the 17-year-old boys who successfully passed the mental examination and were accepted as reserve army air corps cadets at Cedar Rapids Tuesday were from Marion. They will soon be called to Des Moines for their physical. ROY W. MURRAY Representative from Buena Vista county, was born in Vernon, Marion county, Illinois, April 12, 1873. His father was the late Rev. William Morgan Murray, a noted preacher in the Cumberland Presbyterian Church of Illinois, who served in the Civil War with Company B 61st, Illinois Volunteers. His mother Annie E. (Green) Murray was born at Chapel Hill, Tennessee. The ancestors originally came from the Perthshire Hills of Scotland and the north of Ireland to Virginia as early as 1736. From Virginia they immigrated to Tennessee and Kentucky and in 1832 to Bond county, Illinois. He attended public schools at Fairfield, Illinois. High School at Owensville, Indiana. Dixon Business College, Dixon, Illinois; Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana. Moved from Owensville, Indiana to Logan county, Illinois in May 1897, where he was married the 27th day of June, 1900, to Miss Louie Ethel Keys, daughter of the late John James Keys of that county. They have five children, known as "The Murray Stairsteps, namely: Ida, Estella, Grace, Virginia and William Keys. Moved to Storm Lake, Iowa, October 19, 1908 but lived the year of 1911 in Park Rapids, Minnesota. Has followed farming and merchandising but for several years has been successfully engaged in the real estate business. Is a member of the Storm Lake board of education, a member of the Grant Club, Des Moines, a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church, a Knight Templar, a thirty-second degree Mason, a Shriner and a member of the I.O.O.F. and Knights of Pythias. Elected representative 78th, district in 1914. Re-elected in 1916. A republican in politics.

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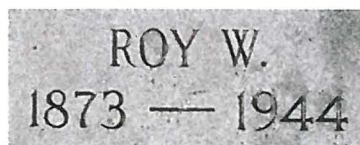

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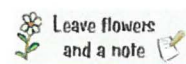

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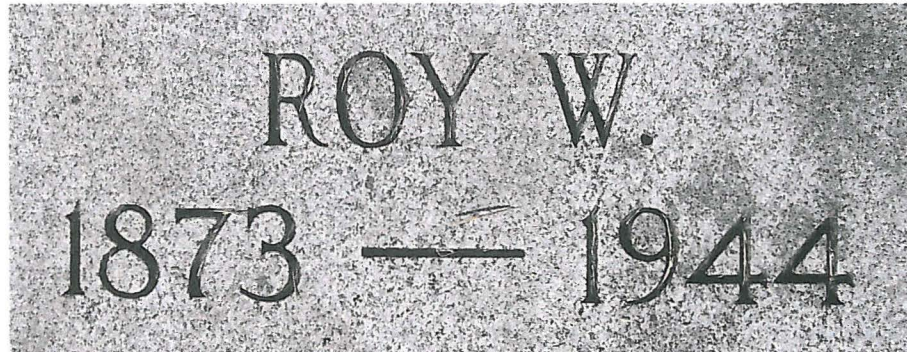
