was with me we visited the Niagara Falls and enjoyed the sight of that great cataract, as it is in winter with its fringe of snow and ice.

Our second trip across the Yankee state was more pleasant and we were able to appreciate the scenery and points of interest on our way. Our road led through the Mohawk Valley and took us by many large manufacturing plants including the Remington Arms Works, Atlas Cement Plant, The Beechnut Products, Flat Auto factory and many others. About eighty miles was all we were allowed to make in one day and we would generally make that by two or three o'clock in the afternoon. The drivers would then go over their trucks and have them all gased and oiled ready to start at six o'clock the next morning. A few things of interest to us was to stay over night in Albany where we parked our trucks close to the capitol building and in Poughkeepsie to be treated in Smith Bros. restaurant the manufactures of Smith Bros. caught drops. In Philadelphia we lodged in the city hall. I made my bed in the council room close to his honors chair but I didn't see any difference in sleeping than in my humble tent, while we were here a third Liberty Loan parade passed with the Liberty bell on a large truck and guarded by soldiers and sailors. We had swell treatment all along the way when ever we stoped for the night there was always a bunch of people down to the armory asking for soldiers to go out to their homes for meals . . . not casting any reflections but that seldom happens in the South. We reached Baltimore on Friday afternoon and stayed there until Sunday afternoon when orders came to take the train for Jacksonville again where we are at this time.

It is now time for this to be mailed but before I close I want to say for the benefit of those that are to come in the service never try to give any advice to your superior officers for they won't appreciate it. The army is the best cure for the smart guy that is always shooting off his mouth but if you mind your own business, keep your mouth shut and do what you are told you will never have any trouble and plenty of friends.

SOMEWHERE OVER THERE

April 6, 1918.

Dear Bill:

I often think of the people in the old "hum" town and wonder what they are doing. It is now nearing summer, and I can remember the very hot afternoons and how quit everything is there at that time. Sometimes I feel that the old home days are only a dream, but after all, I hear from folks and friends from there often enough to remind me that they were a reality. And I receive the Home Town paper regularly, but about three or four weeks late.

I have written to you, while still in the States but the Lisbon people are more or less familiar with conditions in Penn. However, very few of them familiar with the conditions of this country, and especially at this particular time.

I have traveled by auto (Ford) a distance of 1500 kens or over 900 miles. I have been in many cities and countless villages of France and can only say that the French have something to fight for. They are not sad and are always in high spirits, and as one travels through the country you are welcome every place.

I have visited Paris where only a few of our townfolks have been and where very few American soldiers are permitted to go. I visited the historic places of the city and truly enjoyed it all, but a few days later I had the opportunity of looking upon L'Etoile, Tour Eiffel, Des Invalides, The Senate, Notre Dome and all Paris from 2000 meters in the air. I stayed up over the city, in a new French Areoplane for about 30 minutes. I could see the clouds below and it gave me great pleasure as I enjoyed it very much.

You have been reading the progress of the war and know more about it perhaps than I do so I need not speak of it at all. We are on the front but I can sleep very well even tho' it sounds like rain. The food is good and we are all well, I must close not knowing when you will receive this letter. I can only say that the fellow who stays at home cannot realize the immensity of his misfortune from a sight seeing, thrilling, and educational point of view.

...duties gone. A life full of education striving and accomplishing. He was a student practically all his life, associated with various schools and the University to learn direction and then sufficiently master of himself to remain a student in the large university of life, and this placed him in line of honors with out the seeking. These sought him because of worth and worthiness; ability and integrity. So his name stands as a proficient Grand Master of the grand lodge of I. O. O. F. of Iowa. That is why he was chairman of the late Layman's Missionary Council of this district. Quality and leadership selected and elected him as state representative. Another honor was his, but remains ungathered; delegate to the General Conference of the United Evangelical church to be held in Pennsylvania this fall. He was also a representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the I. O. O. F. held in Lousville and trustees of Le Mars College. Another monument that stands to his memory is the Orphan's Home erected by the I. O. O. F. in Mason City. He was chairman of the Building Committee of the new building and was influential in the erection of the beautiful structure that calls to the stricken of that benevolent order, "come unto me all ye that are heavy laden and I will give you rest," and in a large way this was the expression of his individual life.

Mr. Randall was born May 17, 1872 in Hartland, Iowa. Was a resident of Nebraska for several years in childhood. Then moved to Manly where he attained young manhood. From here, after finishing the town school, he went to college at Decorah. This was followed by a course in a school in Berlin, Penn, afterwards he knew the Halls of Iowa State college at Ames, Cornell, at Mt. Vernon; and the university at Iowa City. He graduated from Cornell and the State University.

He was actively engaged in the ministry for several years and this brought him to Lisbon in April of 1896. He was strength itself in this profession, being deep and ready in the pulpit and tactful and sympathetic in the pastorate. Feb. 27, 1897 he was married to Miss Katherine Stahl. Two boys came to bless this union: John, still in the home and Milo who died nine years ago.

While in the ministry here he was attracted to the law and was admitted to the bar. He entered this profession here, but ten years ago located in Cedar Rapids, where he enjoyed a large practice and his circle of influence was ever widening. He was senior member of the Iowa Certificate & Abstract Co., with offices in Cedar Rapids and Marion.

The funeral services will be conducted from the home Sunday afternoon. Interment in the Lisbon ceme-

wegian Luther College" to its present form, "Luther College."

Dr. Olson has been a popular platform speaker, lecturing especially on topics of educational and denominational interest. He has published a number of articles in religious and academic publications, and a full-length work, "Literary Treasures of the Bible."

Dr. Olson has been a member of the Modern Languages Association of America and the Association of University Professors. During the period of his professorship at Luther College, he attended many educators' meetings and convocations on college administration. On May 17, 1943, the title of President Emeritus was conferred on Dr. Olson. He has continued to give courses on philosophy, English, and the Bible, among them a unique one entitled "Literary Treasures of the Bible."

On July 8, 1897, Dr. Oscar L. Olson married Clara Elizabeth Gullixson of Bode, Iowa who attended Lutheran Normal School (now Augustana College) in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, and Bode Academy. She is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Gullixson. To this marriage have been born two sons: 1. Walter Andrew, who graduated from Luther College in 1924 and from Luther Theological Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota in 1929. He is now pastor of the Lutheran Church of the Good Shepherd in Des Moines. He married Liv Kvamme and has a son and a daughter at Luther College. 2. Paul Frederick, who graduated from Luther College in 1926 and the University of Chicago Medical School in 1932. He was appointed to fellowship at the Mayo Clinic, where he remained four years, and is now a surgeon practicing in North Hollywood, California. He served four years and four months in the Navy in World War II, and attained to the office of commander. He is married to Janis Rutten.

**JOHN D. RANDALL**—As a prominent attorney of Cedar Rapids, John D. Randall has been identified with the professional coterie of this city since 1923. He began his law career in this city immediately after receiving his degree of Bachelor of Laws from the State University of Iowa.

Born in Lisbon, Linn County, November 30, 1899, John D. Randall is a son of Mac J. and Katharine (Stahl) Randall. His father was born in Worth County, Iowa, on May 9, 1872. He attended Cornell College at Mount Vernon, Iowa, and the Iowa State College at Ames, Iowa, and graduated from the State University of Iowa with a Bachelor of Laws degree in 1901. He started to practice in Lisbon, Linn County, Iowa, and moved to Cedar Rapids, Iowa, in 1906 and continued to practice in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, from that time until his death on May 9, 1918. Mac J. Randall was active during his years of practice in civic and public affairs. A Republican, he served his fellow citizens of Linn County as a member of the Iowa State Legislature. He was active in lodge affairs of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, and was Grand Master of Iowa in 1914-1915. For many years he was active in the work of the Young Men's Christian Association, serving on its board of directors and as president of the board during 1917-1918. In his religious affiliations, Mac J. Randall was a member of the Evangelical Church. He was a son of John Randall, who was a native of Scotland and among the early settlers of Worth County, where he became a

substantial farmer. John Randall served in the Union Army during the Civil War. He married Almeda Overholt, who was born in Eastwood, in the Province of Ontario, Canada, and died in Worth County. Katharine (Stahl) Randall, mother of John D. Randall, was born in Pottsville, Pennsylvania, daughter of Daniel and Rebecca (Bast) Stahl, both of whom were born in Pennsylvania. Daniel Stahl served in the Union Army during the Civil War as a member of Company G, 96th Regiment, Pennsylvania Volunteers. Daniel and Rebecca (Bast) Stahl moved from Pennsylvania to Lisbon, Iowa, in 1875, and there spent the remainder of their lives. Rebecca (Bast) Stahl died in 1913 and Daniel Stahl in 1926.

John D. Randall was graduated from Washington High School in Cedar Rapids, class of 1917, after which he attended Coe College and Iowa State College. Determined upon a career in the law, he entered the Law School of Iowa State University, graduating in the class of 1923, with the degree of Bachelor of Laws. Admitted to the Iowa bar in 1923, he began practice the same year in Cedar Rapids. He has since carried on a successful private practice of law in that city.


John D. Randall is a member of the Linn County, Iowa State and American bar associations. He has been active in bar association work. He is a past president of the Linn County Bar Association. He is now a member of the House of Delegates of the American Bar Association, representing the lawyers of the state of Iowa as a state delegate, and is also chairman of the standing committee on Unauthorized Practice of the Law of the American Bar Association, as well as representing the American Bar Association on the National Conference Group of Lawyers and Public Accountants, National Conference of Lawyers and Representatives of American Bankers Association, Trust Division, National Conference of Lawyers and Life Underwriters, and Conference Committee on Adjusters. Mr. Randall is also a member of the American Law Institute, the American Judicature Society, the International Association of Insurance Counsel, and the Association of Insurance Attorneys of which he is vice president.

During World War I, Mr. Randall served in the Armed Forces and is a member of Hanford Post No. 5 of the American Legion. Prominent in civic, social and fraternal affairs, Mr. Randall is a member of the Cedar Rapids Chamber of Commerce; the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, Lodge No. 251; and the Executives Club, Pickwick Club, Embassy Club, Cedar Rapids Country Club, and the Union League Club of Chicago. In Masonic affairs, he is Worshipful Master of Crescent Lodge No. 25, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons; the Iowa Consistory, Thirty-second degree, Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite; and belongs to El Kahir Temple, Ancient Arabic Order of Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. His college fraternities are Sigma Phi Epsilon, social fraternity, and Phi Alpha Delta, legal fraternity. He is a Republican in political faith and is a member of the Westminster Presbyterian Church.

On June 20, 1925, John D. Randall married Margaret Graham, who was born in Phoenix, Arizona, daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth (Utterson) Graham. Joseph Graham, now deceased, was a merchant in Des Moines, Iowa. His widow now resides in Appleton, Wisconsin. Mrs. Randall was educated in the public schools of Quincy, Illinois, and the University of Missouri. She is a member of Gamma Phi Beta sorority; the Young Women's Christian Association,

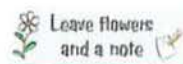
