#### Frank Kelley Died Suddenly Friday of Heart Disease

Frank Kelley died suddenly at his home last Friday afternoon from an attack of heart disease. He was working in his garden when stricken and passed away soon after being taken into his home.

Benjamin Franklin Kelley was born at St. Joseph, Mo., Sept. 20, 1875, and passed away at his home in Osage on June 5, 1942, at the age of 66 years and 9 months.

He came to Iowa with his parents at the age of two and the family settled here in Osage, and which has since been his home.

On March 8 he was married to Ellen Bohl, of Elma. To this union two sons were born. Mr. Kelley had devoted the greater part of his life to his orchestra business, but during late years engaged in truck gardening at his acreage east of Osage, and with his sons, also operated a fruit and vegetable store. He and his brother, Sidney, had been associated for nearly fifty years in the orchestra work and were inseparable companions.

There remain to cherish his memory his wife; two sons, Merrill and Maurice, both of Osage; four brothers, Sidney, Silas, William and Thomas, all of Osage; and one sister, Mrs. Stella Bohl, of Thunderhawk, S. D. There are also many other relatives and friends to mourn his passing.

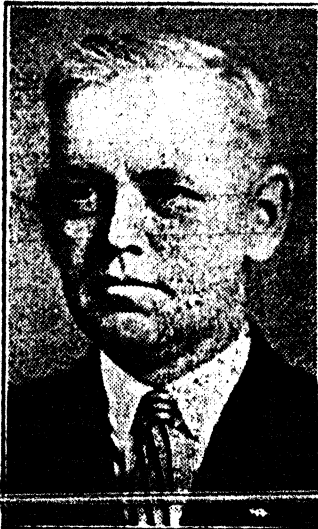

Stanley Rulief Smith was the third son of James A. and Mary Alice (Crego) Smith, born at Osage, Iowa, on Jan. 5, 1881. After completing his education at the Osage high school and the Cedar Valley seminary, he attended Grinnell college during the years 1900-1901, and then for the following two years studied law at Iowa University, and was a member of the Sigma-Nu fraternity.

Upon the completion of this work he entered the services of the Jas. A. Smith Lumber company, being very active in the establishment of new yards in South Dakota until 1909, when he purchased a lumber business for himself at Tripoli, Iowa, later on adding a business at Oran, giving these his personal attention until 1919 when he removed to Osage to take the active management of his father's estate.

During the years his ability as a keen business man has been universally recognized, and he has held important official positions in the various lumber com-

The 35 men who left for Des Moines Tuesday for induction were given a fitting farewell by the community, and the boys must know that their hearts were in the event as Osagers arose at 4:30 to be at the bus station as requested, by 5:00 a. m., and those coming from a distance must have been up and about an hour or two before that.

While a good parade was assembled under the direction of Cliff Jewett, plans did not go off according to schedule because of a misunderstanding concerning the special bus. The crowd waited from 5:00 a. m. until 6:30 a. m. when it was announced that the draftees would leave at 11:30. That meant another long wait for the boys' relatives and friends.

The parade was a very-well managed one. Bill Dorsey, deputy sheriff, led, mounted on his horse, "Onion." The Legion color guard followed; then the high school band, the several boy and girl scout troops, and the draftees, the latter of whom were of course the center of attraction.

About 6:30 the draftees were given breakfast at a local cafe, and a dinner was served them before they left at 11:30. The breakfast was paid for by the American Legion while Uncle Sam furnished the wherewithal for dinner. Fred Smith presented each boy with a package of cigars.

to light at the graduation exer-  
cises of Iowa State college  
Friday night, when Dr. George Har-  
risan Schull of Princeton Uni-  
versity, where he is professor of bot-  
any and genetics, was awarded  
an honorary degree. Dr. Schull  
outlined the scientific principles  
of modern high-bred corn breed-  
ing in 1910, and it was not until  
ten years later that the ideas of  
a white-bearded, old gentleman  
were picked up and the great,  
high-bred corn industry started  
on its way.

honor bestowed on Dr. Schull at

panies, which his father had been  
instrumental in establishing.

His business ability was again  
recognized when in 1934, after  
the death of its president, F. W.  
Annis, he was called to the presi-  
dency of the Home Trust and  
Savings bank of Osage, and after  
two years, failing health compell-  
ed him to relinquish this position  
to other hands, and he was elect-  
ed vice president of the bank. A  
position he held at the time of  
his death. His business ability,  
especially along banking lines,  
has long been recognized, and his  
advice was eagerly sought after,  
and will long be cherished and  
remembered.

On Feb. 14, 1912, he was mar-  
ried to Sadie Marie Messenger at  
Waverly, and they immediately  
established a home at Tripoli.  
Here were born their two daugh-  
ters, Jean Ellen, now Mrs. Elbert  
L. Willson of Charles City, and  
Ruth Marie of Osage, and here it  
was that many happy years were  
spent—happy in the service, not  
alone in the home life, but in the  
community life as well.

His business ability, and his  
desire to be of service, soon gain-  
ed for him other recognitions. He  
was chosen to represent Bremer  
county as state representative  
for 1917-1918. After his removal  
to Osage, he was elected its  
mayor for the term of 1921-1923,  
exercising these responsibilities  
to the entire satisfaction of the  
communities which he served. He  
was at one time a member of the  
Republican State Central Com-  
mittee from the 4th District, and  
state treasurer of the Republican  
organization for the years 1932-  
1936.

During his life time, Mr. Smith  
has taken an active interest in the  
lodge life of the community, be-  
ing a member of the Modern  
Woodmen of America, Order of  
Eastern Star, A. F. & A. M., 102,  
Coeur de Leon Commandery No.  
19, R. A. M., No. 36, El Kahir.

brief illness, on June 9th, 1942,

ter, Sarah Jean; his mother, Mrs.  
Mary Alice Smith; his brothers—  
Fred Crego Smith and Leland A.  
Smith; his sisters—Mrs. Mabel

of Los Angeles, Calif.; Merrill G.  
Smith of Charles City—and one  
sister, Mrs. Robert L. Leach of

Former Representative from  
Bremer County Died of  
Heart Attack Tuesday.

Funeral services for Stanley R. Smith, 61, of Osage, a former Bremer county representative who died unexpectedly of a heart attack Tuesday evening in Osage are to be this Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock in the Osage Congregational church.

Mr. Smith, a former mayor of Osage, with his brothers managed a lumber company founded by his father, the late James A. Smith. He had been active in Republican circles for years, serving as representative while he lived in Tripoli and being treasurer of the Republican state central committee in 1936.

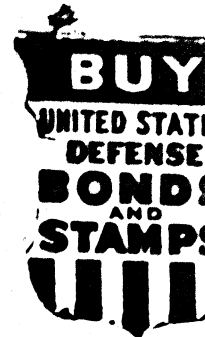
He was born in Osage, Jan. 5, 1881, attended Osage high school, Grinnell college and the State University, came to Tripoli in 1900 and operated his own lumber yard there, later returning to his home town of Osage. He was married to Sade Messenger of Waverly Feb. 15, 1912.

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STANLEY RULIEF SMITH

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare a suitable resolution commemorating the life, character and public services of the Honorable Stanley R. Smith, a former member of the General Assembly of Iowa, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Stanley Rulief Smith was the third son of James A. and Mary Alice (Crego) Smith, born at Osage, Iowa, on January 5, 1881. After completing his education at the Osage high school and the Cedar Valley Seminary, he attended Grinnell College during the years 1900-1901, and then for the following two years studied law at Iowa University, and was a member of the Sigma Nu fraternity.

Upon completion of this work, he entered the services of the James A. Smith Lumber Company, being very active in the establishment of new yards in South Dakota, until 1909, when he purchased a lumber business at Tripoli, Iowa, later on adding a business at Oran, giving these his personal attention until 1919 when he removed to Osage to take the active management of his father's estate.

His business ability was again recognized when in 1934, after the death of its president, F. W. Annis, he was called to the presidency of the Home Trust and Savings Bank of Osage, and after two years failing health compelled him to relinquish this position to other hands, and he was elected vice president of the bank, a position he held at the time of his death. His business ability, especially along banking lines, has long been recognized and his advice was eagerly sought and will long be cherished and remembered.

His desire to be of service soon gained for him other recognitions. He was chosen to represent Bremer county as State Representative for 1917-1918. After his removal to Osage, he was elected its mayor for the term of 1921-1923, exercising these responsibilities to the entire satisfaction of the communities which he served. He was at one time a member of the

Republican State Central Committee for the 4th district and state treasurer for the Republican organization for the years 1932-1936.

On February 14, 1912, he was married to Sadie Marie Messenger at Waverly, and they immediately established a home at Tripoli. Here were born their two daughters, Jean Ellen, now Mrs. Elbert L. Willson of Charles City, Iowa, and Ruth Marie of Osage, Iowa, and here it was that many happy years were spent—happy in the service, not alone in the home life, but in the community life as well.

During his lifetime Mr. Smith took an active interest in the lodge life of the community, being a member of the Modern Woodmen of America, Order of Eastern Star, A.F. & A.M. No. 36; and El Kahir Shrine, Cedar Rapids.

During his youth he attended the Sunday school of the Congregational church and later identified himself with that church and was at all times interested in all its activities.

Mr. Smith passed away, after a very brief illness, on June 9, 1942, leaving to mourn his passing his wife; two daughters, Jean Ellen and Ruth; a granddaughter, Sarah Jean; his mother, Mrs. Mary Alice Smith; his brothers, Fred Crego Smith, and Leland A. Smith of Osage, Lloyd C. Smith of Spirit Lake, Richard G. Smith of Los Angeles, California, and Merrill G. Smith of Charles City; and one sister, Mrs. Robert L. Leach of Chicago, besides a host of other relatives and friends.

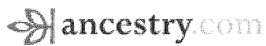
