GEORGE WILSON, SR., EARLY SETTLER OF COUNTY, DEAD

Resident of Cherokee For 39 Years; Rites Set for Thursday

Cherokee lost another of its early settlers Tuesday night in the death of George Wilson, sr., who passed away at 10:30 p. m., after an illness extending over several weeks.

Mr. Wilson would have reached the ripe age of 90 next November



1 and for more than two-thirds of these many years he had been a resident of Cherokee county and for 39 years a resident of Cherokee city.

G. Wilson, sr. Born at Albany, N. Y., in 1853 he came west with his parents when a small boy locating in Benton county, Iowa, near Vinton. There he spent his young manhood, attending Tilford academy, then one of the outstanding educational institutions of that section of the state, and later teaching in the public schools of that county.

He was married Nov. 13, 1878, at Vinton to Miss Ellen Joyce. The following year they moved to Cherokee county, settling in Silver township, where Mr. Wilson took a homestead which he continued to own at the time of his death.

Served In Assembly

In 1904 the family moved to Cherokee. In 1906 Mr. Wilson was elected county auditor, which position he continued to fill until 1912. In 1915 he was chosen to represent Cherokee county in the Iowa general assembly and served

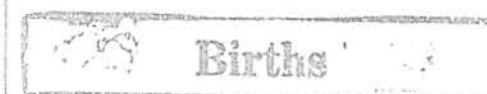
Letter Lost on Tragedy Liner Received Here

Mrs. W. G. Kullman, 229 south
7th street, received a letter Friday,
mailed December 14 by their son,
Russell Kullman, at Alhambra,
California. The letter was one of
those carried by the ill-fated plane,
which crashed December 15 near
Salt Lake City, Utah, and which
was just recently discovered.

The letter itself was not dam-
aged, but the envelope was very
badly torn and soiled from laying
out in the weather for those sever-
al months. A green clipping en-
closed had faded through the en-
velope which fortunately was ad-
dressed with a pencil and plainly
legible despite the wet snow on
which it undoubtedly laid. The
stamp had been neatly severed by
the exposure.

The letter was sent to Cherokee
in a government envelope, stamped
"This envelope contains mail re-
covered from plane wrecked near
Salt Lake City, Utah, December
15, 1936."

It is reported that Mrs. Rose
Melter of Cherokee also received
mail salvaged from the wreck of
this plane.

New Route Most Direct Across North Part State

Much Travel to Yellowstone National Park
And Black Hills Likely Over New System.

The most important highway development so far as Cherokee and others towns similarly located are concerned is the establishment of a short-cut primary highway eastward from primary No. 5, affording connection with primary No. 10 at Pocatontas.

This combination of highways will constitute the shortest and most direct primary across northern Iowa and is destined to become one of the most traveled routes in the state.

The accompanying map shows the route as it travels eastward from Akron on the western border to Dubuque on the east. At the latter place it connects with long established routes to Chicago and other eastern points. Completion of the new route will attract to it much travel to Yellowstone National park, the Black Hills and other points of interest in the west.

Establishment of the route in its completed form will give Cherokee all the advantages of a new trans-continental highway.

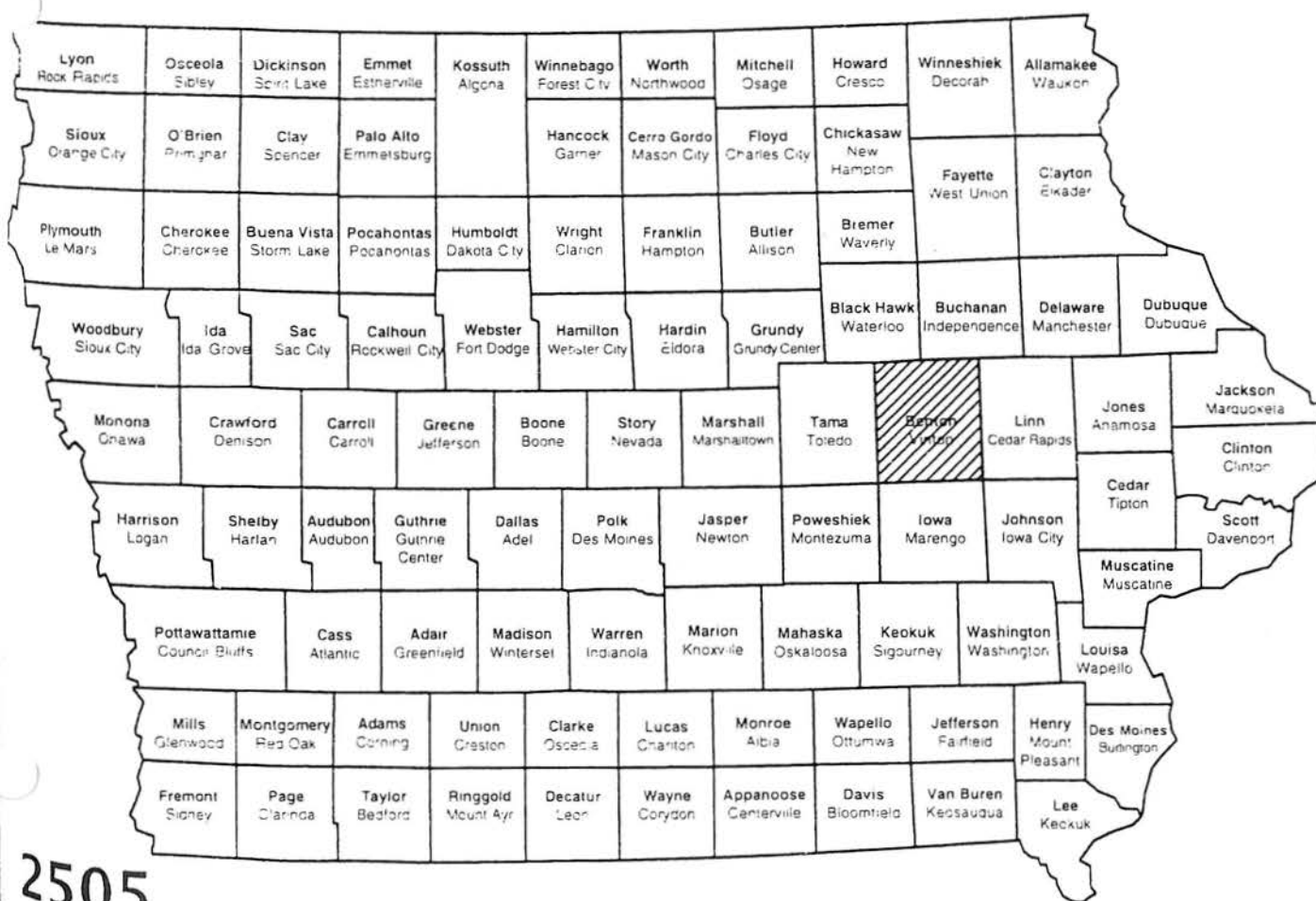

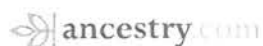
