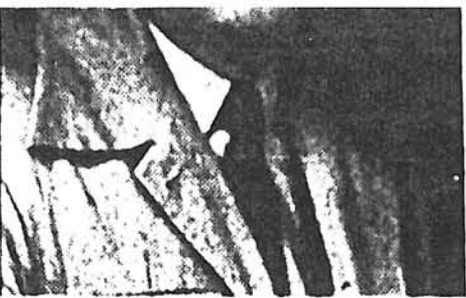

 Setting up the laboratory Mr. Bayes pointed out that milk, when improperly handled, often becomes contaminated with disease carrying bacteria. "No other food is so perishable and so easily contaminated," Bayes stated. The purpose of the inspection program is to protect the public against milk-borne disease. Because of the increase in the number of cases of Malta fever or Brucellosis throughout south central Iowa, considerable interest is manifest in other communities in joining such a unit.

Other such inspection units are now in operation in central and northern Iowa. Each community, by working with such units, saves financially according to a report, it was said.

Expect Increase
 It is anticipated that several other communities in this area will be added to the district. Cooperation is on a voluntary basis, but the great benefit and protection derived from the service is expected to add new members to the list.

At the present time, there are 25 producers of milk. Hayes announced Wednesday that one man can take care of milk inspections in a community populated by about 30,000 people.

State Commissioner John Clarkson Dead

John T. Clarkson died in Des Moines Tuesday after an illness of a year. The former state senator was 82 years old.

Born in Johnstown, Pa., he came to Albia as a boy. Most of his life was spent here, and during his lifetime he served as senator, general counsel for the United Mine Workers of America here, and more recently as state industrial commissioner for six years.



Though he retained his residence in Albia, he spent the last six years in Des Moines. He was a member of the Shrine and other organizations.

Surviving are his second wife, the former Helen Anderson Reece of Des Moines; a daughter, Mrs. Theodore Perry of Albia; two sons, John L. Clarkson and Clyde, both of Nashville, Ill.; three sisters, three grandchildren, two great-grandchildren, several nieces and nephews.

The body was taken to the Hummelston funeral home and services will be held from there Friday at 2:30 p. m. Burial will be in Oak View cemetery.

Only 2,008 ballots were cast in the entire county, with Mrs. Herbert Larson polling the highest vote with 1,577 for the office of county clerk. Mrs. Larson was closely followed by County Auditor Isabella Hope with 1,569, and County Treasurer W. H. Peterson with 1,554. All three were unopposed.

Gilliland Wins

Closest battle on either ticket was in the race for the 1945 term of county board member, with H. R. Gilliland winning with a margin of only forty votes over E. E. Agans. In a nip and tuck fight that was not decided until the last two precincts reported, Gilliland polled 644 votes against 604 for Agans. Derby, the third man in the race, had 392 votes.

Establishing an early lead, K. E. Evans took the decision from Hugh Lundy and Hunt in the race for the Lieut.-Governor nomination. Lundy finished in second place in the race.

Lundy piled up an overwhelming victory in Monroe county over his two opponents, although the light vote cast failed to give him enough votes to change the state verdict.

Robert Blue decisively defeated Henry Burma for the Governor's spot on the November ticket. Burma conceded defeat in an announcement by his campaign manager at approximately midnight.

Gibb Victor

Back in the county race, on the GOP ballot, T. J. Gibb ran steadily in all precincts to win the verdict over his two opponents, Ralph Walker and A. A. Robinson. Gibb polled 951 votes to 391 for Robinson and 328 for Walker.

On the state ticket, the only tussle that might be considered close was the contest for state senator between Templeton and Teter. With the Marion county ballots added to those of this county, Teter took a close decision, 1,463 to 1,208.

On a very light Democratic ticket, Sheriff John Goodwin took the honors for high vote with 402. Mitchell, the candidate for governor, racked up 309 votes.

Gillette-Doughman

Only two positions were in contest; Guy Gillette beating Seaman for the United States senator nomination, and Curran taking the measure of Doughman for state treasurer.
