CARROLL MEE'S FOES IN BOSTON

"Vanities" Producer, in Pulpit,
Assails Stage's Censors.

BOSTON (U.P.) — From the pulpit of Channing Unitarian here, Dorchester, Earl Carroll, Broadway show producer, Sunday bitterly assailed Boston for its methods of stage censorship.

Carroll, who addressed the congregation at the invitation of the Rev. William Lundell, pastor of the church, pointed out that although girls were forbidden to appear on the Boston stage, unless they wore stockings, they were permitted to go bare legged on the streets and at the beach without breaking the law.

"Present day censorship in Boston," the showman declared, "is threatening the very life of the theater. It is making Boston the object of ridicule throughout the country."

He charged that the city censors had "no sense of humor," and that they came to a theater in destructive, rather than a constructive mood.

Referring to the censors' ban of stockingless dancers, Carroll said stockings spoil their dancing.

"Girls must wear something to cover their stockings, and this makes their limbs and makes dancing awkward and difficult," he explained.

SAMUEL GARTON IS DEAD AT 83

Pioneer Business Man Here Ill Eight Days.

Samuel B. Garton, a resident of East Des Moines for nearly three-quarters of a century and prominent as a pioneer business man, died at his home at 1817 East Twelfth street Sunday afternoon after an illness of eight days. He was 83.

His death occurred on what was formerly a part of the old Thompson estate which seventy-four years ago he helped farm with his father. During the scores of years he had resided in Polk county he observed Des Moines grow from a hamlet to a city and aided in its progress until he was known as the oldest active business man in the city.

Funeral services are to be held at Dunn's funeral home at 2 p. m. Tuesday. Burial will be in the family lot at Woodland cemetery.

Born in England.

Born in Surrey, England, Garton came with his family to the United States when he was 8. He spent one year in Centerville, Ind., and then began his long residence in Polk county in 1856. For a short time he lived at Carlisle where he worked in a flour mill.

In 1868 when he was 21, Garton first established the bakery business, with which he has since been associated, with his brother, the late W. T. Garton, on Walnut street. In 1872 the brothers moved to East Fifth and Locust streets, then to 331 East Fifth street.

Built Building.

Several years later Garton built the building at 523 East Locust street where the business was conducted for more than forty years. The last twelve years the firm has been located at 212 Locust street.

Garton was active in business up until eight days ago when he was confined to his home.

He served as representative from Polk county in the thirty-sixth general assembly. Mrs. Garton died two years ago.

He was a member of the First Baptist church, the Pioneer club, and the Ancient Order of United Workmen.

Three Daughters.

Surviving are three daughters, Mrs. Harriet G. Cartwright, New York City; Mrs. Mabel G. Sherriff, and Mrs. Florence Buck, of Des Moines; two sons, George L. Garton, secretary and business manager of the Des Moines school board, and Samuel B. Garton, Jr., of Rome, Italy.

There are also four grandchildren: Lieut. George G. Garton, San Antonio, Tex.; Mary Garton, a student at Iowa State college; Donald G. Buck, San Diego, and Roger G. Cartwright of New York City.

Mrs. Cartwright is to arrive in Des Moines today.

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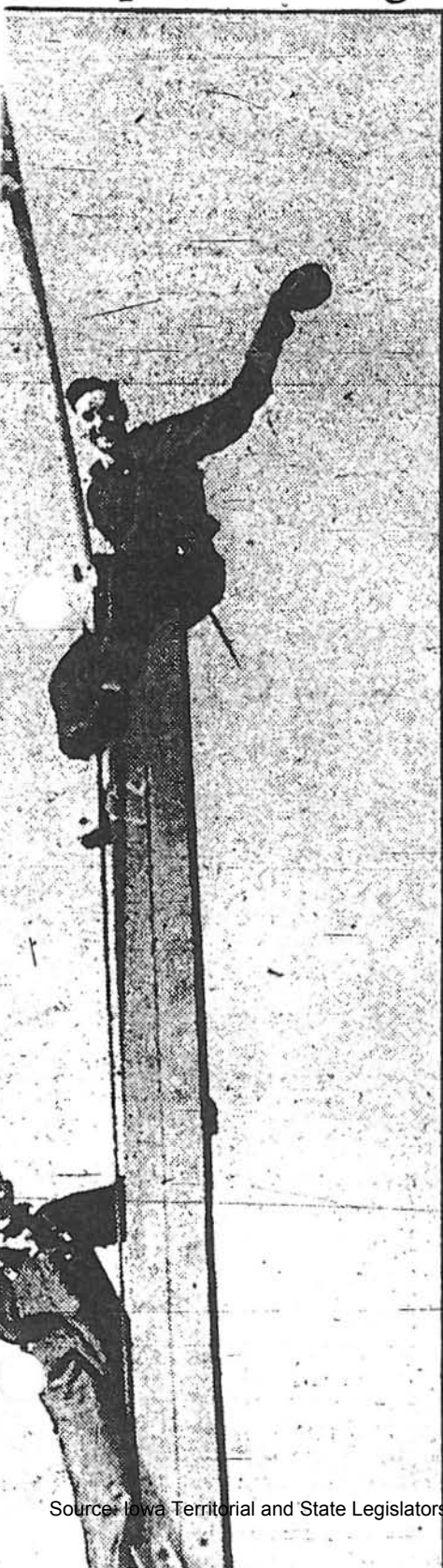

East Des Moines Baker Was Polk Resident Since 1856.

Funeral services for Samuel B. Garton, 83, pioneer East Des Moines business man, will be held at Dunn's funeral home at 2 p. m. Tuesday. Burial will be in Woodland cemetery.

He died Sunday at his home, 1817 East Twelfth street, after an illness of eight days.

Garton came to the United States with his parents from Surrey, England, when he was 8 years old. He lived one year at Centerville, Ind., before coming to Polk county in 1856. He worked in a flour mill at Carlisle for a short while.

Established Bakery Here.

When he was 21, he established the bakery business with which he had since been associated in Des Moines. With his brother, W. T. Garton, he built a bakery on Walnut street in 1868.

In 1872 the establishment was moved to East Fifth and Locust streets and later to 331 East Fifth street.

Several years later the firm built the structure at 523 East Locust street, where the affairs of the business were conducted for nearly forty years. During the last twelve years the firm has been located at 212 Locust street.

Once State Representative.

Garton was a representative from Polk county in the thirty-sixth general assembly. He was a member of the First Baptist church, the Pioneer club and the Ancient Order of United Workmen.

Surviving him are three daughters, Mrs. Harriet G. Cartwright of New York City, Mrs. Mabel G. Sherriff and Mrs. Florence Buck of Des Moines; two sons, George L. Garton, secretary of the Des Moines school board and Samuel B. Garton, Jr., of Rome, Italy.

Mrs. Garton died two years ago.
