Receivership Asked For Hilsinger Bank

A receivership has been asked for the J. Hilsinger & Son bank, of this city, which has been closed since the death of its president, G. E. Hilsinger and the court has appointed W. G. Newsome, of Sabula, and Attorney L. F. Sutton, of Clinton, as receivers.

The application for receivership was made by Mrs. Mary Hilsinger, of this city, and Mrs. Margaret Boyden, of Chicago, co-partners in the bank. The petition, filed by Mrs. Boyden, states that the bank has been in the actual possession of and under the exclusive management of the son, G. E. Hilsinger, and that no one else can continue its business and asks that the partnership be dissolved, that an accounting be had in order to close up its affairs and that a receiver be appointed to look after its business. The petition further states that there is owing to depositors between \$275,000 and \$300,000.

The petition was granted by Judge Ely on Monday and the receivers named above were appointed with receiver's bond fixed at \$75,000.

As stated above, the bank was a co-partnership, in which the mother and sister had a minority interest, but the management of affairs was assumed exclusively by Mr. Hilsinger and he confided neither in them nor in the cashier of the bank.

Mr. Newsome informed the Gazette that every effort would be made to conduct the receivership at a minimum of expense and to realize every dollar possible for the depositors of the bank.

Sabula's Oldest Resident Dies

G. E. Hilsinger's Death Shock to Community

The death of G. E. Hilsinger, local banker, which occurred at 1:30 o'clock last Friday morning in a Chicago hospital, came as a great shock to this community. While it was known to the family and intimate friends of Mr. Hilsinger that he had been in poor health for several months, the seriousness of his condition was not realized. On Thanksgiving Day he was stricken with a very severe attack and his brother-in-law, Dr. Boyden, who is a professor of anatomy in the College of Medicine of the University of Illinois, was notified and accompanied him to Chicago. He was admitted to the Presbyterian hospital and placed under the care of the senior members of the staff, but before more than preliminary treatment could be administered, he passed into the coma from which he died. Death was due to complete blockage of the kidneys by stones.
