The plan for improving the south well contemplates drilling a 6-inch test hole outside the pump house and about 15 feet from the hole now in use. If water is encountered in enough quantity, the new hole will be drilled at the bottom with the old one by one of several methods, the new hole plugged and the old one left producing from itself and also from its neighbor with the present pumping equipment.

The biggest puzzle to the council, the well drillers, and the state geologist, is what caused the sudden failure of the well a year ago last spring. No investigations have given any logical solution to the puzzle thus far.

To take a show horse figuratively apart to see what makes it win will be one of the features of the first exclusive National Percheron Horse Show (and National Dairy Show) to be held at Columbus, Ohio, October 9 to 16. D. R. MUNRO VICTIM OF HEART ATTACK

BODY FOUND IN FIELD NEAR HIS HOME FRIDAY NOON— FUNERAL SUNDAY

David R. Munro, 84 years of age, prominent Washington county farmer living six miles southeast of Keota, died suddenly Friday morning of a heart attack. He had not been feeling well but there was no suspicion of a heart ailment. He had left his farm home to inspect one of his fields and when he did not return at noon a search was made and his body found where he had fallen and doubtless passed away instantly. His physician, Dr. F. O. Pershing, was called and gave the cause of death as a heart attack.

Funeral services were held at the home Sunday afternoon at 3:00, conducted by the Rev. J. B. Pollock of the West Chester United Presbyterian church which Mr. Munro attended. Pall bearers were I. E. Coffey, Howard E. Stewart, A. A. Clendenning, C. I. Davis, Marion Wells and Sam DeLong. Interment was in the family plot in the Keota cemetery.

David Reed Munro was born Oct. 13, 1852, at Wilkesbarre, Pa., a son of William and Margaret (Reed) Munro. As a youth he assisted his father who was a coal mine operator and in 1866 came with his parents to Iowa. Returning shortly to Pennsylvania he attended Kingston seminary there. Returning to Iowa he was married Nov. 28, 1876, to Mary A. Pierson and they began housekeeping on the farm which was their home the rest of their lives. Mrs. Munro predeceased him May 4, 1929. Surviving children are William S., of near West Chester, Ralph H., an attorney of Fairfield, and Miss Olive who lived with her father. Two sons, Arch and John, are deceased. There are also five grandchildren, Marion of Sioux City, Roberta and Dorothy of Fairfield, and David and Rosalie of West Chester. There are also two sisters and a brother, Mrs. Mary Eastman of Santa Ana, Cal., Mrs. Jessie Brock of Omaha, and John L. Munro of Spokane, Wash.

Mr. Munro was one of the best known and most progressive farmers of the Keota community and of Washington county. He was a prosperous farmer and cattle feeder and large land owner and his business judgment was generally regarded as practically infallible. He was a leader in many ways and a supporter of every forward-looking movement. He served in the state legislature as Republican representative of his county from 1912 to 1915, was township clerk and president of the West Chester Telephone company.

Riverside War Veteran Died Saturday; Was 96

John F. Younkin, 96-year-old bachelor farmer and Civil war veteran, of Riverside, died Saturday evening in Mercy hospital at Iowa City. Mr. Younkin was born in Ohio in 1840 and came with his parents at the age of 4, to the Riverside community and made his home there as a farmer for 92 years, excepting only 3 years when he was a soldier in the Civil war. He retired from farming 30 years ago. A sister with whom he made his home died 15 years ago, and he had lived alone since that time, doing his own cooking and housekeeping. He was a popular citizen of Riverside. The funeral services was held Tuesday morning at the Riverside M. E. church with burial in the cemetery there.

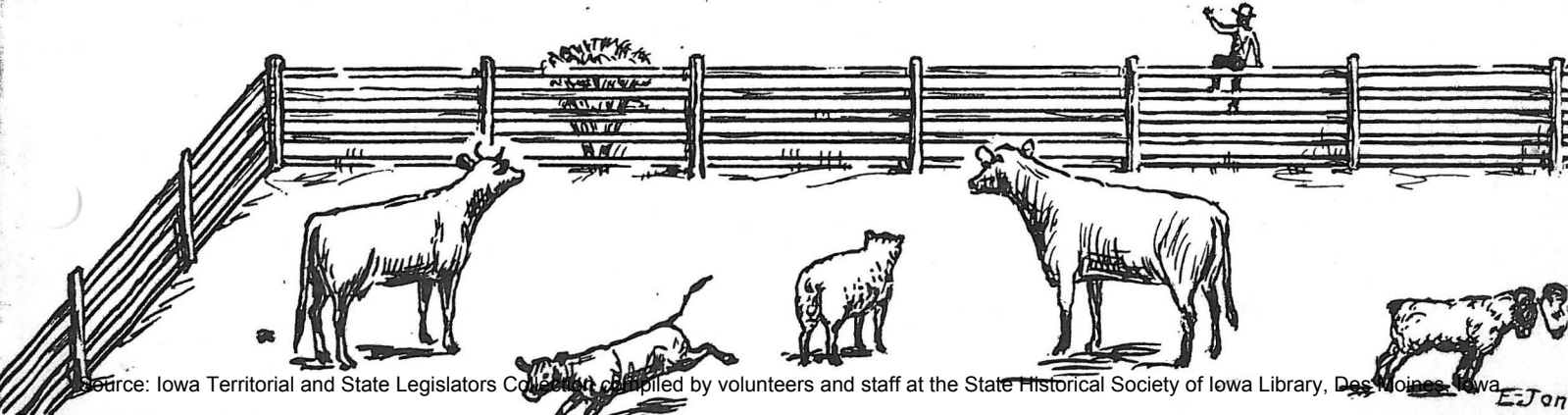

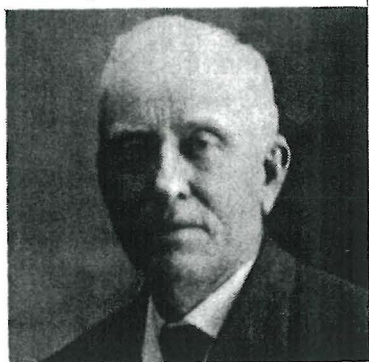

Several days so everyone could visit their exhibits — sea shells, wax figures, exotic animals. The “photographer’s studio car” drew local gents and maidens eager to have their pictures taken. “The ladies,” a local correspondent wrote, “walk miles to the picture car when they can’t get to church on Sunday.” In 1912 there was a “Seed Corn Special” train, where farmers brought their seed corn for germination tests. Experts from Ames gave talks in two large audience coaches.

The town on the prairie didn’t grow very much, but there was a great deal of activity nevertheless. Properties changed hands, new businesses started up, partnerships were formed. The grain dealers, the stock buyers and the lumber yard brought people to shop in the general stores. Business was good. In 1880, 433 car loads were shipped out: corn 229, oats 53, wheat 3, rye 1, hogs 98, cattle 21, hay 22 and miscellaneous 6. In ’82, incoming freight included corn for seed from Nebraska, because the local ’81 crop germinated poorly.

Munro, Fisher, Boyer and Al Augustine were the four big shippers of grain and livestock who turned Chester into a “boom” town in the early days.

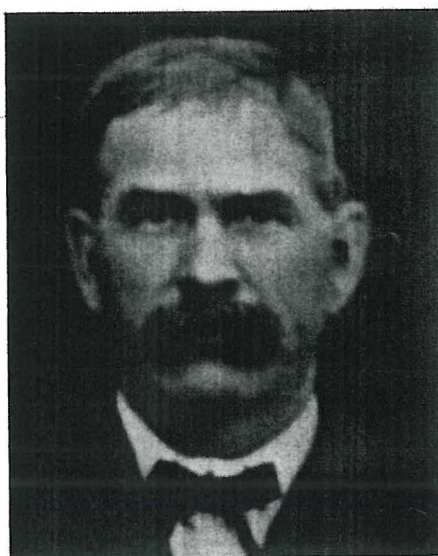
People rode the passenger cars — there were four daily, one each direction morning and evening. (Old Mr. Harding liked to hurry aboard for a drink of ice water while the train discharged passengers.) It was something of a holiday to take the CRI&P cars to Washington. High school and academy students rode the train into the county seat on Monday morning and home on Friday evening. People took the cars to visit relatives or to attend to business matters. It was much faster to ride the cars because the roads often were

impassable. You might have to go through Washington to get to Wellman or through Brighton to get to Washington if the roads were muddy. In 1901 it took a double team 8 hours to haul a load of hogs to Chester from Valley 11 miles away.

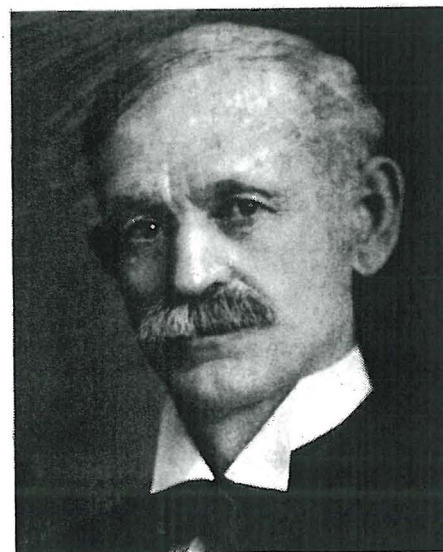
So everybody rode the cars. Once the Baptists were expecting a new preacher on the morning passenger train, but got a letter instead, telling them that he couldn’t come. Boys would wait until the train started to leave and then throw snowballs at the conductor or brakeman. Once the engine couldn’t (or didn’t) start
