CONVICT TRIO DIE IN FLIGHT

Hidden Machine Guns Kill Three in Illinois.

JOLIET, ILL. (AP)—Two convicts were killed and a third fatally wounded as they were lowering themselves to freedom over the 20-foot wall of the Illinois State penitentiary just before dawn Sunday.

All three were serving sentences from Cook county. Two were killed by the first blast of guns in the hands of guards warned in advance of the break and ambushed for it. They were Joseph Norkiewicz, 31, and Julio Chileno, 39, both convicted on a confidence game charge.

Alvin J. Killman, 34, serving for robbery, died several hours later in the prison hospital.

Warned three weeks ago of the attempted break, penitentiary officials had placed extra guard details around the outside walls. The three men never had a chance to get away. They were focused in the huge prison searchlight and made a certain target for the guards as they tried frantically to get away from the hall of death.

Desert Freedom

FLORENCE, ARIZ. (AP)—Scaling a 20-foot wall while a guard's back was turned, 15 convicts, three of them life termers, fled the state prison here late Sunday into the surrounding desert.

A steel girder intended for use in constructing a new building in the prison yard was leaned against the wall. The convicts climbed up the girder one at a time and dropped to the ground outside.

Guards and bloodhounds searched the territory surrounding the prison during the night.

Relationship Had Extended to Weekly Foursomes.

When relatives of Frank J. Koch, 60, secretary-treasurer of Koch brothers, telephoned the home of Arthur C. Savage, 61, vice president and assistant treasurer of the Royal Union Life Insurance company, to transmit the news of Mr. Koch's death, they learned Mr. Savage had been dead but a short time.

Three Hours Difference.

Mr. Koch died at noon and Mr. Savage died at 3 p. m. Friends recalled the regular Saturday afternoon foursome at Hyperion club when Mr. Savage, Mr. Koch, his brother, William Koch, and Harry Gross played golf.

Mr. Savage had been ill for the last year, but his condition was not serious until the last few days. Death was caused by a complication of heart and lung diseases. He lived at 1721 Pleasant st.

Born in Linn County.

Arthur C. Savage Died Sunday At Des Moines Home

It was indeed with a great deal of sadness that the many Adair friends learned that Arthur C. Savage had passed away Sunday afternoon at his home in Des Moines. It had been known for some time that Mr. Savage was not enjoying the best of health but very few of his Adair friends realized that his condition was so serious.

Mr. Savage was a resident of Adair for a number of years, having come here in 1895, at which time he engaged in the banking business. During his residence in Adair he was one of the most active men in the community in building up the town, and it was due to his untiring efforts, and the assistance of the late Judge George B. Lynch and Dr. Powel, that many worth while improvements were made in Adair in the days following Adair's destructive fire of 1894. He was a good citizen, a true friend, and his passing is sincerely mourned by all who enjoyed his acquaintance.

He was a member of the Senate from the Black Hawk-Grundy Senatorial District in the Twenty-ninth, Thirtieth, and Thirty-first General Assemblies. He was considered a safe legislator and was responsible for several important desirable changes in the Iowa statutes.

In 1919 Senator Courtright was appointed by the Governor to serve as one of the judges of the Municipal Court of the city of Waterloo, in which position he continued until 1924, after which he re-entered the practice of law.

At the time of Senator Courtright's death he had been engaged as a practicing lawyer, a State Senator, and a judge of the Municipal Court for the total period of fifty-three years—probably longer than any other Iowan.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the Senate of the Forty-fourth General Assembly of Iowa, That in the death of Orlando B. Courtright, the people of the Thirty-eighth Senatorial District and the people of the entire state of Iowa have sustained a great loss. Everywhere he was known as a man honored and trusted, a man of sterling quality and irreproachable character.

MR. PRESIDENT AND SENATORS: It was my privilege to have been acquainted with Senator Courtright for about twenty-five years of the time during which he was engaged in the practice of law in Waterloo.

I always admired him for his ability as a lawyer and for his sterling manhood. He was straightforward and when he believed in a certain principle he had the moral courage to advocate and defend it. He was uniformly courteous and kind, a good husband and father. He was considerate of the views of those with whom he could not agree, according to them the same honesty of purpose that always guided his actions. I feel a personal loss in his passing.

ARTHUR C. SAVAGE

Arthur C. Savage was born in Prairieburg, Linn county, Iowa, January 2, 1870, and died February 22, 1931.

He moved with his parents to Stuart, Iowa, and later resided in Dexter, Iowa. He attended the schools of Stuart and Dexter, and later attended college at Grinnell, Iowa. He took up his business career in Adair in 1893 and resided there until his removal to Des Moines, upon his appointment as insurance commissioner of the state of Iowa, and at the time of his death was vice president and assistant treasurer of the Royal Union

Life Insurance Company. He was elected to the State Senate in 1908 and was re-elected in 1912.

Arthur C. Savage was a typical product of his day and generation, representing the best type of the sons and daughters of the early pioneers, who made the history of Iowa in the last decade. Of unimpeachable character, unassuming, painstaking and industrious in the part that he played in the history of politics, legislation and business of the state, he has left a record that his family and friends will always be proud of. He was one of the builders and not underminers of the commonwealth, its welfare and all that was for the best in our history. He will be remembered by his friends and those who affectionately called him "Art" as long as memory and affection survive throughout the years.

the Fourth District, defeating J. H. Sweeney, served in the Fifty-second Congress, ran again in 1892, but was defeated by Thomas Updegraff. He removed to Des Moines in 1897, and was in insurance business, but in 1907 went to Kansas City, where he was in real estate business for a time, but in his later life was a bank employee.

ARTHUR CRAIG SAVAGE was born at Prairieburg, Linn County, Iowa, January 2, 1870, and died in Des Moines February 22, 1931, interment being at Stuart. His parents were Allen Heil and Jennie Elizabeth (Craig) Savage. Arthur obtained his education in public school at Dexter and Stuart and at Grinnell College until in his junior college year. From 1892 to 1894 he was a bank bookkeeper at Stuart and Dexter, following which he was a bank cashier at Adair until 1914, and also conducted a fire insurance business there. In 1908 he was elected senator from the Adair-Madison district and was re-elected in 1912, serving from the Thirty-third to the Thirty-sixth General Assembly inclusively. He was president pro tem of the Senate in the Thirty-fifth, and chairman of the Appropriations Committee in the Thirty-sixth. In 1914 he was an unsuccessful candidate against Senator Cummins for the Republican nomination of United States senator. From May, 1917, until February, 1919, he was cashier in the office of State Treasurer Hoyt. In 1919 he was appointed state commissioner of insurance by Governor Harding and served until 1923. From February, 1924, until his death he was vice president of the Royal Union Life Insurance Company. He was popular in fraternity activities, and was grand chancellor of Iowa Grand Lodge, Knights of Pythias, for the year 1912-13.

CHRISTIAN MILLER was born in Bern, Switzerland, December 21, 1847, and died at Rapid City, South Dakota, August 25, 1927. Burial was at Clermont. He came with his parents to Fayette County, near where Elgin now is, in 1856. He continued to reside on the old family homestead after the deaths of his parents until 1906 when he removed to Clermont. He acquired several hundred acres of land in Fayette and Allamakee counties. In 1897 he was elected representative and was re-elected in 1899, serving in the Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth general assemblies. In 1906 because of his business interests at Clermont he removed to that town where he owned a hardware store, a brick-making plant, became president of the Farmers Savings Bank, and acquired the mill property formerly owned by Governor Larrabee, which he and his sons developed into an extensive water electric power company. He was a man of industry and ability and was useful to his community and state.

JOHN G. LEGEL was born in Saint Louis, Missouri, May 26, 1859, and died in Charles City, Iowa, December 17, 1930. Burial was in Riverside Cemetery, Charles City. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. John G. Legel,

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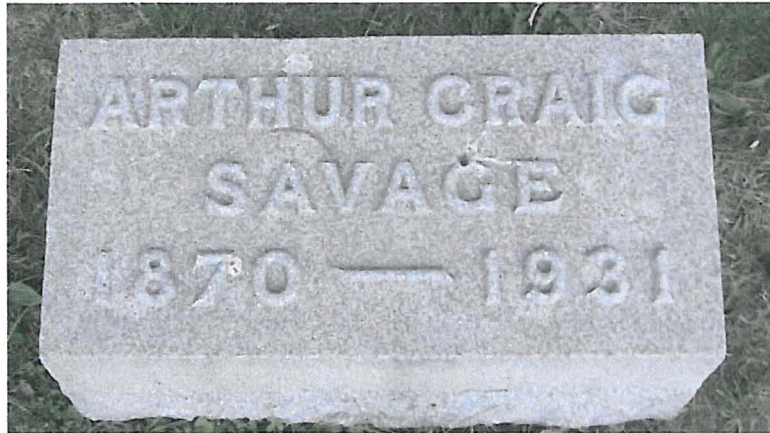
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
