(Continued from Page 1.) when he took a homestead in Western Kansas, engaging temper arily in the land and loan business at Gurden City. For a short time, he was with a land, loan and law firm at Indge City, Kansas, where he began the study of law, a life-long ambition.

Survived By Widow

On his return to Union county. he made arrangements to continue studying law but abandoned idea and re-entered business Cromwell, a daughter of the late married Miss Jemima 1. Brown, Cromwell a daughter of the late John H. Brown, a Douglas town ship pioneer. Mrs. Thomas survives him.

They were parents of four child ren, of whom Hobart M., Mary I and Carnot H., all of Creston, are living. An older daugnter, Mrs. Grace E. Pounds, died more than two years ago.

Mr. Thomas first went to school at Monmouth, Ill., attending classes in the winter mouths. He completed the public school course Cromwell.

While a resident of Kent, lie served as president of the school board, as a member of the town council, as trustee and steward of the Methodist church, of which he was a member, and as superintendent of the Sunday school. He was a charter member of the Odd Fellow lodge at Kent, a Modern Woodman and a Woodman of the World.

Members Of Fraternity

For a number of years Thomas belonged to the Elks lodge here but dropped his membership because ill health prevented his regular attendance. For the same reason, he left the Kiwanis club of Creston, of which he was a charter member. A few years ago, he became an honorary member of Theta Zi, national college fraternity. He had served as secretary of the county central republican committee, was a frequent delegate to state conventions and was chairman of the congressional convention held in Osceola in 1894.

He continued in active business in Hardin county until 1894, when he disposed of his interests there and removed to Madison county, where he resumed agricultural pursuits, purchasing an For several years he improved farm of two hundred acres near Lorimor. there tilled the fields and carried on farm work with good success and in 1904, putting aside the active work of the farm and renting his land, he removed to Lorimor, where he has since lived retired, for the financial accumulation of his earlier years makes possible his present rest.

As the years passed three children were added to the family of Mr. and Mrs. Green: Elwin O., now a business man of Dodge City, Kansas; Wilbur B., who is living on the Green farm in Madison county; and Helen A., a young lady at home. They also lost two daughters: Emma died in Hardin county when about forty years of age. She was married and left two daughters. Mamie was the wife of Charlton Reed, of Lorimor.

CHARLES H. THOMAS.

Among the men of broad public spirit and marked enterprise and achievement whose labors have resulted beneficially to the community in which they live, and who in the direction of both private and public interests have won the success which is the merited reward of all persistent and honorable endeavor, is numbered Charles H. Thomas of the firm of C. H. Thomas & Company, at Kent, the leading mercantile establishment in the county outside of the county seat.

Mr. Thomas was born in a log cabin near Roseville, Warren county, Illinois, September 29, 1860, his parents being Mathew and Emaline (Raybourn) Thomas, both of whom were natives of Jackson county, Indiana. The name is Welsh, the family tracing its lineage back through Kentucky and Virginia

to the arrival in that colony of five Thomas brothers from Wales. The maiden name on the maternal grandmother's side was Taylor and she was a mear relative of President Zachary Taylor. Mathew Thomas was a volunteer soldier in the Mexican war, and his brother tills a soldier's grave near the city of Mexico. Returning from the war, he was married and emigrated to Warren county, Illinois, in 1851, where the subject of this sketch was born. After twenty-five years' residence there the family, including five brothers and five sisters, came to Cromwell in this county, March 4, 1876.

Charles H. Thomas attended his first school at Monmouth, Illinois. lowing the usual course of a farmer boy, he helped his father on the farm, attending the village school only in the winter until he had completed the course in the Cromwell school. A college education and the law was his ambition, but unexpected financial reverses wiped out his father's resources and the son was compelled to seek employment. On August 20, 1880, he accepted a position with W. M. Sparr, the lumber and hardware merchant of Cromwell, and began a business career which he has since followed, being connected with the above firm for ten years. In 1886 he took up a homestead in western Kansas, engaging temporarily in the land and loan business at In a few months he accepted a position with Crumbaugh & Garden city. Fitzgerald, a law, land and loan firm of Dodge City, Kansas, the senior member of which held the position of probate judge and under whom he commenced to read law. Mr. Fitzgerald is the present lieutenant governor of that state. Returning to Iowa in the fall of the same year, he arranged to continue the study of law with Judge Wilson of the superior court of Creston, but deciding to get married, he abandoned this plan and re-entered business In January, 1902, the firm of Thomas & Dougherty opened a at Cromwell. retail hardware store at No. 114 Maple street in Creston and was succeded later by Thomas Brothers. In the spring of 1895 this firm opened a branch business at Kent, and in the fall they built a brick store room there and removed their entire business to that point, where the firm of C. II. Thomas & Company now conduct one of the largest mercantile establishments in Union county, handling a complete line of lumber, hardware, harness and paints. Grant M. Thomas, the brother died in 1899. In 1901 the firm erected a brick store room, thirty-six by eighty feet, two stories and basement, one of the best business buildings in the county.

Mr. Thomas is president of the board of education, a member of the city council and a trustee and steward of the Methodist church, of which both he and his wife are active, loyal members. Mr. Thomas is also superintendent of the Sunday school. He is a charter member of Kent Lodge, No. 666, L.O.O.F., belongs to the Modern Woodmen and was a charter member and first consul commander of Cosmopolitan Camp. Woodmen of the World, at Creston, where he still holds his membership. He is a leading spirit in all public enterprises for the upbuilding of his home community and county, giving liberally of his purse as well as of his time and talent. A republican in polities, he has served as secretary of the county central committee and frequently a delegate to the state conventions. CHARLES H. THOMAS

MR. PRESIDENT: Your committee which was appointed to prepare resolutions commemorating the life, character, and public services of Senator Charles H. Thomas, late of Union county, Iowa, begs leave to submit the following report:

Charles H. Thomas was born near Roseville, Warren county, Illinois, he 29th day of September, 1860. His parents, Matthew and Emaline Inomas, were of Welsh and Scotch descent and with them he removed to Union county, Iowa, when he was fifteen years of age.

In 1876 the family moved to Cromwell, Iowa, where he completed his

education in the public school, after which he engaged in the lumber and hardware business, first as a clerk and later as a member of the firm.

In 1891 Mr. Thomas opened a hardware store in Creston, and four years later removed to Kent to engage in the lumber and hardware business. He was vice president of the Kent Savings Bank and president of the "Blue Grass Road," crossing Iowa from Burlington to Council Bluffs, having both originated and named this highway.

Mr. Thomas was active in republican politics of his district for many years. He was elected to the state Senate in 1913 and was a member of the Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth General Assemblies. He was appointed by Governor Kendall as a member of the state board of education, ably serving in the capacity of vice president of this organization. Three years ago he was appointed postmaster of Creston, Iowa.

Charles Thomas was a great student. He had an indomitable determination to do well, that which he undertook. He was fair, straightforward and always upon the right side in every moral and economic question. He was a tireless worker, a faithful friend, an upright and respected citizen in the community in which he lived. No one can fill his place. He speaks in lives made better—in works done that will stand out as time goes on. It may be truly said of him as Watt put it

What I saved I had. What I had I lost. What I gave I have.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, By the Senate of the Forty-second General Assembly of Iowa, that the Senate takes this occasion to express its high appreciation of his lofty character and faithful public service and adopt this memorial in the name of the public of Iowa, as a tribute to his name and memory.

President Clem F. Kimball spoke as follows in closing:

In closing this memorial service I have a few words to say in connection with the Senators that I have known who have been members of this Senate.

I thought many times as I have sat here before the Senate this winter how time flits by, and we must agree with Lincoln when he said time was a vapor mist, and that as the years go by a new Senate constantly comes and goes.

I have newer known a better body of men than the present Senate of Iowa or one, that worked more faithfully for the welfare of all persons concerned. Those that have gone before are but like those that stay. Lincoln with his greatness was great because he was so much like the men of his cown type. He was a typical man of his time. So it is with the Senators of this body. They were typical men of their time. They were given greatly to the doctrine of service, and I am reminded tonight that, "A desstiny makes us all brothers. None may go his way alone and what we bring to the lives of others must come back again to our own."

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

Charles H. Thomas married Jemima I. Brown.

Member of the State Board of Education , was born in Warren county, Illinois, September 29, 1860, of Welsh and Scotch parentage. The father served in the Mexican war under General Zachary Taylor, a blood relative of the mother of this sketch. Mathew and Emaline Thomas moved to Union county, Iowa, in 1876 and the son completed his education in the Cromwell public school. A twenty he left the farm to enter business and has been actively engaged in mercantile life since, twenty-one years of it in lumber, hardware and banking at Kent, where he served ten years on the local school board. He first proposed the name and the route of the "Blue Grass Trail" across Iowa from Burlington to Coucil Bluffs. Represented Union, Ringgold and Decatur counties in the state senate 1913 to 1917. Author of the original Iowa "blue sky law," "teachers' minimum wage law," the prohibitory amendment voted on in 1918. In an extremely close three-cornered contest in the primary in 1916 he barely missed the republican nomination for state treasurer. Removed to Creston in 1916, where he is the senior member of the Creston Hardware Co. and one of the leading business men of the city. Married in 1886 to Miss Jemima I. Brown. Four children, Grace E., Hobart M., Mary I. and Carnot H., make up the family circle. A Methodist in church affiliation and an active republican in politics.

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




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
