Brockway, 64, Is Dead Here

James M. Brockway, 64, of 4110 Lincoln Place drive, president of the Iowa Motor Truck association, an organization of Iowa truckers, died early Saturday morning at Mercy hospital of peritonitis which set in after he suffered an acute abdominal ailment Wednesday morning.

Brockway's most recent public appearance was last Tuesday when he appeared at an office of defense transportation meeting at the Iowa state-house.

Active in Iowa Republican politics, Brockway was representative from Louisa county in 1911 and 1913. He campaigned for more liberal tax and other laws regarding the trucking industry in recent legislative sessions.

In 1934 Brockway organized the Independent Truckers of Iowa, Inc., at Muscatine. The organization of Iowa truckers was moved later to Cedar Rapids and then to Des Moines in 1939. It became the Iowa Motor Truck association in 1942.

Born in Ainsworth, Ia., Brockway attended schools in Washington county. He was graduated in 1901 from the University of Iowa where he was a member of the famous 1900 football team.

Brockway was a member of the Masonic lodge and the "I" club of the university. He was a member of the Central Presbyterian church.

Brockway in January, 1942, charged before the senate interstate commerce committee in Washington, D. C., that Peter S. Peterson, Underwood, Ia., while president of another truckers' organization, tried to sabotage the trucking industry.

Brockway testified before the senate committee that Peterson was set up as a "fifth columnist" by Joseph H. Hays, Chicago, Ill., counsel for the Western Association of Railway Executives, "to carry on a campaign of sabotage against the trucking industry."

Officers of the Iowa Citizen Road and Highway association of which Peterson was executive secretary, later gave Peterson a unanimous vote of confidence.
