VOTERS DECIDE ON PROPOSED CONTRACT WITH POWER CO.

WHICH INTEREST IN THIS PROPOSITION

Some Reasons Given Why Contract Should Not Be Accepted By The Voters

On Tuesday of next week, June 3, the people of Paullina will go to the polling place and vote upon the proposed contract between the town of Paullina and the Western Iowa Power Co., Peterson. This election is one of great importance to this town, and the voters should all go to the polls and express their wish in the matter.

In this matter as in most matters, different people have different opinions, and it is an assured fact that every individual has a right to his opinion without anyone else harboring any ill will toward him or her. We are very frank to say that we are opposed to the acceptance of the proposed contract for reasons that we will endeavor to set forth in this article. In the first place we are of the opinion that it is a lopsided contract in that it requires of the people of Paullina to pay an exorbitant price for service they receive. This is shown on the face of the contract which requires that the town of Paullina pay 10 cents per kilowatt for the juice furnished. According to the information we gather the full end load of our electricity, which is to be furnished in the morning, will run to about 300 to \$1,200 per year. This we will

Charles C. Cannon was born June 28, 1862 at Philadelphia, Tennessee and died Monday, May 19, 1924, thus having attained the age of sixty-one years, ten months and twenty-two days at the time of his death. His early life was spent at the family home in Tennessee, receiving his schooling there, graduating from the University of Tennessee in 1885. In 1886 he came to Paullina where he located, taking up the grain business for a life's vocation. As years past his business activities expanded. On June 16, 1896 he was united in marriage to Grace Jennings. He is survived by his widow and three daughters, Susan, Margaret and Catherine; two brothers Arthur Cannon of Philadelphia, Tenn. Harry Cannon of Paullina, Ia; two sisters, Mrs. Joe Logan of Knoxville, Tenn. and Mrs. H. L. Lenoir, of Philadelphia, Tenn.

Funeral services were held Sunday, May 25th and interment was at Prairie View cemetery in Paullina.
