"Modern medicine has made impressive strides in developing new rehabilitation techniques in recent years," Francis said. "Pilot surveys already undertaken show that there are thousands of poliohandicapped in the United States who have not yet had an opportunity for medical evaluation to determine if they might benefit from these new techniques.
"Some of the techniques employed today for those disabled by polio and other causes were unknown or unused as recently as 10 or even five years ago.
"The March of Dimes organization, having scored a tremendous victory in its war on polio. does not now propose to walk off and leave the wounded behind, so long as help for them is possible. We wish to find everyone who has had polio, whether paralytic or nonparalytic. We want to know what their special problems may be, so that they may be helped to regain useful lives, if humanly possible, even though it will take a considerable period of time."
