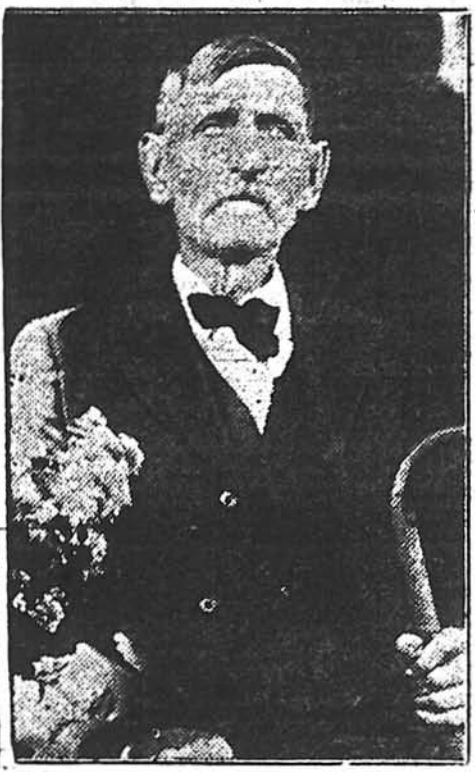

A Democratic Leader C. C. Cronbaugh, 84, Died at His Home Here on Monday



C. C. (Tip) Cronbaugh, prominent leader of the democratic party and a highly esteemed citizen. He died at his home here Monday. Mr. Cronbaugh was known among his friends as "president of the park senate," for he delighted in discussing current events with his pals in the city park.

Was Prominent Leader of Democratic Party For Many Years

A man of rare talents and intellect was C. C. (Tip) Cronbaugh, who passed away at his home here, Monday. He had been in poor health for some time but was confined to his bed only last week. On Saturday he suffered a slight stroke and failed rapidly. Infirmities of old age complicated by the stroke caused his death early Monday afternoon. He was over 84 years old.

Mr. Cronbaugh was born as Coldwater, Mich., Oct. 14, 1845, the fourth son of Mr. and Mrs. John Cronbaugh. When nine years old he moved with his parents and six brothers to a homestead in Honey Creek township, where they experienced all the hardships of pioneer life. They richly contributed to the upbuilding of the community which now is one of the most flourishing sections of Iowa county.

Attended Pioneer School

The children had only the meager educational advantages afforded by the primitive rural school that was later provided by the settlers. But Mr. Cronbaugh availed himself of the schooling of that time and together with his aggressive and ambitious character made himself a self-educated man.

He was united in marriage with Mary C. Norton on Dec. 23, 1877, and to this union four children were born: Bertha, who died in infancy; Mrs. J. M. Kiger of Marengo; Albert R. and Clifford C., of Honey Creek township.

Homesteaded Near Koszta

Mr. and Mrs. Cronbaugh lived at the old farm near Koszta until 20 years ago, when they retired to Marengo, where they both resided until claimed by death. Mrs. Cronbaugh died on April 14, 1928.

Mr. Cronbaugh was a member of the Church of God for many years.

Marengo-Homestead, Conroy Associations Hold Annual Meetings

Iowa county's five cooperative live stock shipping associations marketed \$1,544,976 worth of stock during 1929. Of this amount the shippers received a total net of \$1,483,638.37, which is 95.84 percent of the gross.

These figures were compiled by County Agent D. H. Zentmire from the yearly reports submitted to the annual meetings last week of the associations, Marengo-Homestead, Conroy, Williamsburg, North English and Victor. The average owner-net on all hogs shipped was 75 per cent.

During the year 815 1/2 decks of hogs were marketed for \$1,318,718 gross. Seventy and a half tons of cattle realized \$201,826, gross, and 20 decks of sheep sold for \$21,431, gross.

For the past 20 years Mr. Cronbaugh enjoyed meeting his friends in the city park of Marengo, where he talked freely about events of the day. He will be missed there.

He naturally attracted people to him because whether they differed or agreed with him, they liked him, and he liked people. One of his greatest enjoyments was to meet people. The secret of his sociability and number of friends was that he liked them and they liked him.

Funeral services were held in the Presbyterian church, Wednesday at 1:30 p. m., conducted by J. W. Williams of Gladbrook. Music was furnished by a quartet composed of Mrs. Geo. Bishop, Mrs. Geo. Fiser, A. H. Turner and the Rev. W. T. Martin.

Pallbearers were six nephews of Mr. Cronbaugh. They were: Warnie, Wylie, Ray, Martie, Johnnie and Harvey Cronbaugh.
