I think I realize fully how difficult a matter you were confronted with in attempting to pass our bill over the heads of your appropriations committee. The bill itself was a hard thing to handle on general principles.

I am more than ever convinced that what Senator Newberry said to me a few months ago, namely that if anybody could get our bill through the senate, you could, very true, and I'm of the firm opinion that there is not another in the senate today who could have done for us what you did.

I don't know how you do it, De Wolf, but you certainly accomplish about everything you start in to pull off.

Following is some of the evidence Mr. De Wolf's friends submit to substantiate the opinion they all have of him:

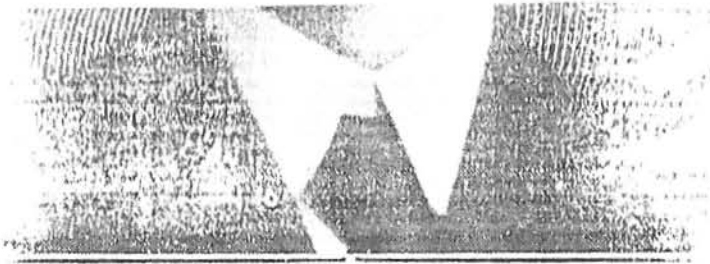
**As to General Standing.
Code Supplement.**

Lieut.-Governor Garst recognized his legal ability and industry by appointing him as one of a committee of six, of whom only three were from the Senate, who had entire charge of the revising, indexing and publishing of the 1907 supplement to the Code. This committee was appointed on February 25th, 1907 and on April 1st, 1909 Senator De Wolf, on behalf of the committee, presented the report of the committee. The Code Supplement issued under the supervision of this committee is a credit to the state of Iowa in every respect. The Committee served without pay and had entire charge of the spending of about \$25,000.

Hamberton-Ream Contest.

Lieut.-Governor Clarke recognized his legal ability and fairness of mind by appointing him one of the committee to act as judges in the contest which occurred in the county during the last four years. The decision was unanimous and was accepted by all as a fair decision of the case.

Sittings Committee.

introduced and had charge of what was known as the "Assumption of Risk" bill for the benefit of the the law that when an employee on a railroad or in a factory learned of any defect in the machinery or equipment, even although he notified the foreman in charge and asked to have it repaired, if it was not repaired and the employee was injured he could not recover damages. This was unfair to the working man as it put him up against the proposition that he must either give up his position if he did not, he was held to have assumed all risks of injury. The bill introduced by Senator De Wolf was passed and the law was so modified in favor of the working man that if he saw any defect in the machinery or appliances he could give written notice to his employer of such defect and then he had a right to continue in the employment without giving up his right to recover damages in case he was injured. This bill was considered by the labor leaders to be the most important measure passed for their benefit during the session.

At the same session Senator DeWolf introduced for the benefit of the railway employee a bill regulating the stringing of wires across the railway tracks. Many trainmen have been injured by being dragged from the tops of cars by wires hanging loose and this law was desired for their safety. It was passed and is now part of the law of the state.

Senator De Wolf also introduced what was known as the Boiler Inspection bill, which provided that all boilers should be regularly inspected for the purpose of avoiding accidents and saving the lives of the employees. Although he worked faithfully, he could not succeed in getting this measure adopted.

Senator De Wolf was in sincere sympathy with the working men and he was often seen in consultation with the labor leaders who often asked his advice in regard to the legal effect of pending measures.

His friendly relations with the working men is most clearly shown by the following extracts from a statement signed by President Erick of the State Federation of Labor, and by Mr. Lucas, who represented the Railway Trainmen.

"As in the former session DeWolf was looked upon as one of our particular friends. He was always

Senator De Wolf stood for home rule for the cities and towns and both spoke and voted against this bill.

Direct Election of U. S. Senators.

Senator De Wolf believed in the direct election of United States senators and he not only believed in doing it at some future time, but believed in doing it right now. He and Senator Moon together prepared a couple of bills, providing a plan whereby the people of the state of Iowa could elect their United States senators by direct vote and with practically no further expense. The plan proposed was to amend the present law so that the name of the candidate of each party for United States senator, who had been elected at the regular primary, as is already provided, should be placed upon the official ballot and this man voted for at the general election and a record kept of the vote.

In this way the people could express their preference regardless of party. Then a method was provided whereby the candidates for the legislature might pledge themselves in writing to vote for that man for United States senator who received the most votes at the general election regardless of party, and in this way the legislature would carry out the wish of the people and we would substantially elect our senators by direct vote without waiting for any amendment

He Stood for the State Normal School.

The only state institution in this district is the State Normal school, or what is now called the Iowa Teachers' College at Cedar Falls. Under the management of President H. H. Seerley, this school has grown until it now stands with the very highest institutions of its kind in the United States. Its welfare depends greatly upon the securing of proper appropriations and Senator De Wolf was always working faithfully and successfully toward this end. It seems that a great many minor institutions were springing up all over the country and calling themselves normal schools and the better class of such institutions throughout the United States were being designated as teachers' colleges in order to distinguish them from the smaller schools. This was done to such an extent that the graduates of the school at Cedar Falls were being seriously hampered in their work by reason of the old name and at their request Senator De Wolf at last managed to change the name of the school to the state teachers' college. This was bitterly opposed by a great many who all seemed to be jealous of the success of the school, but, after a long contest, the legislature adopted the change. The school is now officially known as the Iowa State Teachers' College and is free to stand both in name and in rank as one of the best institutions of its kind in the United States.

Testimony of President Seerley.

The following letter, written at the close of the 32nd General Assembly shows what President Seerley thought of the work of Senator DeWolf:
