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# H. C. LOUNSBERRY. LAWYER, FORMER LEGISLATOR, DIES

# Prominent in Republican Politics of County 25 Years Ago

H. C. Lounsberry, 63, Marshalltown attorney, former state legislator and prominent in republican politics of Marshall county a quarter of a century ago, died at 5 o'clock this morning in the university hospital at Iowa City. Mr. Lounsberry had been in failing health for several years and decided to enter the hospital at Iowa City after attending the graduation exercises at the state university June 7 when his daughter Irene was awarded her degree.

He submitted to an operation June 14 and last Friday Mrs. Lounsberry and children were called to Iowa City and were at his bedside when death came.

#### Two Terms in Assembly.

Mr. Lounsberry represented Marshall county as state representative in the 34th and 35th general assemblies which convened in 1911 and 1913. His previous political experience was gained as clerk of the district court in Marshall county, to which he was elected in 1905, retiring in 1909, and the following year was selected to the state legislature. While in the legislature he helped to codify the laws of the

After serving two terms he retired from politics for several years, but again sought public office in 1920 when he was a candidate for the republican nomination for state senator from this district upon the completion of the two terms served by W. H. Arney. He failed to gain the nomination, however, and again in 1928 was unsuccessful in seeking the republican senatorial nomina-

His legislative experience also included service as journal clerk of the house of representatives in the 27th assembly, journal clerk of the senate in the following term and assistant secretary of the senate in the 29th general assembly. In

#### HONORABLE J. E. McMILLAN

Mr. Speaker: Your committee appointed to prepare a resolution commemorating the life, character and public services of the late Hon. J. E. McMillan of Benton county, Iowa, begs leave to submit the following:

J. E. McMillan, the son of pioneers of Benton county, was born in Harrison township, Benton county, Iowa, November 16, 1860. He was educated in the country schools of that day. On November 2, 1882, he was united in marriage with Miss Nora I. Pitts. To them were born five children, Leslie, Lawrence, Nancy, Glen, and Wilhelmina. Mr. McMillan followed the occupation of farming all the active years of his life. He was a member of the board of directors and chairman of the Farm Bureau of Benton county for many years. He was also county chairman of the campaign to eradicate bovine tuberculosis. Mr. McMillan was always interested in and an advocate of good roads. He made a drag patterned after the one invented by Mr. King of Missouri and used it to drag the roads in front of his farm for several years before the road officials paid for dragging the roads. His was a deeply religious nature. As a young man he united with the Prairie Creek Church of Christ and was always active in the work of the church, being one of a group of people who made possible an active country church that has survived the inroads of the automobile and modern methods of communication on the country churches. He was always a very loyal republican and in 1926 was elected to the House of Representatives, serving in the Fortysecond, Forty-second Extra, and Forty-third General Assemblies. His wife preceded him in death several years and since that time he made his home with one or the other of his children. He had planned to spend the winter with his daughter in Arizona, but illness came upon him from which he never recovered and he passed away on the 11th day of January, 1938. His mortal remains were brought back to Iowa where they were interred besode those of his wife in the Bear Creek Cemetery which is in the same township in which Mr. McMillan was born and spent his entire life.

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

go to Philadelphia, on condition that the passengers be sold for the passage. His parents and sister were accordingly sold to serve four years each, and he to serve until he was 21 years old; he was in charge of a Quaker, and worked on a farm.
