**Milo Manning, Former Ames Assessor, Dies**

Milo A. Manning, 92, Ames resident for half a century, died Sunday at 2:30 p. m. in the Mary Greeley hospital where he had been a patient for two weeks. Death was due to a heart condition. His home was at 2039 Country Club boulevard.

Funeral services will be Wednesday at 10:30 a. m. in the Adams Chapel in charge of the Rev. W. Murray Allan. Burial will be in the Ames Municipal cemetery.

Manning was most widely known to Ames residents for the years he served the city as assessor. He retired from the post at the age of 85 after 30 years of continuous service.

**In 1903**

He came to Ames in 1903 and prior to that had worked as a train dispatcher for the Chicago North Western and Union Pacific railroads. In Ames he organized the Ames Savings bank in 1903 (it is now the Ames Trust and Savings bank) and in 1912 organized the Commercial Savings bank which later became the Union National bank and is now the Union Story Trust and Savings bank.

The longtime resident who saw Ames grow from a community of some 5,000 to its present size took the assessing job when it was only a parttime one and paid \$300 per year.

Manning was born Oct. 16, 1860, at Lanark, Ill. He began his railroading career at Clarence, Ia., in 1878 and worked at nearly every station between Clinton and Council Bluffs as relief agent and operator.

**Married**

Manning was married to Clara West April 6, 1887 in Ames.

He attended the Congregational church, was a 32nd degree Mason, a member of Eastern Star and of the Des Moines Consistory.

Surviving him are two sons, Truman of Ames and Merrill of Rayside, L. I., and a daughter, Mrs. Margaret Paustian of Ames. There are six grandchildren and 13 great grandchildren.

came sick and whose recovery would be speeded up by treatment in a neutral country.

The article goes into more detail, but basically, it lays open these possibilities:

1. The Reds may announce that a large number of Allied prisoners fall into that classification and should be removed to a neutral country.

2. Thus, the UN would be put in a position of almost having to agree in some form to interning in a neutral country a large number of Communist prisoners, more than would ordinarily be repatriated.

The joker is that under Article 110, prisoners thus "accommodated" in a neutral country may be later repatriated if their condition changes—either for the better or the worse.

In addition, the UN would be on a spot if the Reds demand that the article be adhered to. In today's meeting, the Allies specifically referred to Article 109 as the basis for the exchange of the sick and wounded.

If the UN wants to use one article, the Reds could argue, what excuse could they have for not using another article of the convention?

Then, too, if Article 110 was adhered to, long, drawn-out negotiations would be necessary to choose a neutral nation willing to accept the prisoners of war and to arrange for housing, clothing and feeding them.

However, use of Article 110 would not be a one-way affair. The Allies would also get more of their personnel freed from the Reds.

It might also tie in with Red China's proposal last week that prisoners who resist repatriation be turned over to a neutral nation.
