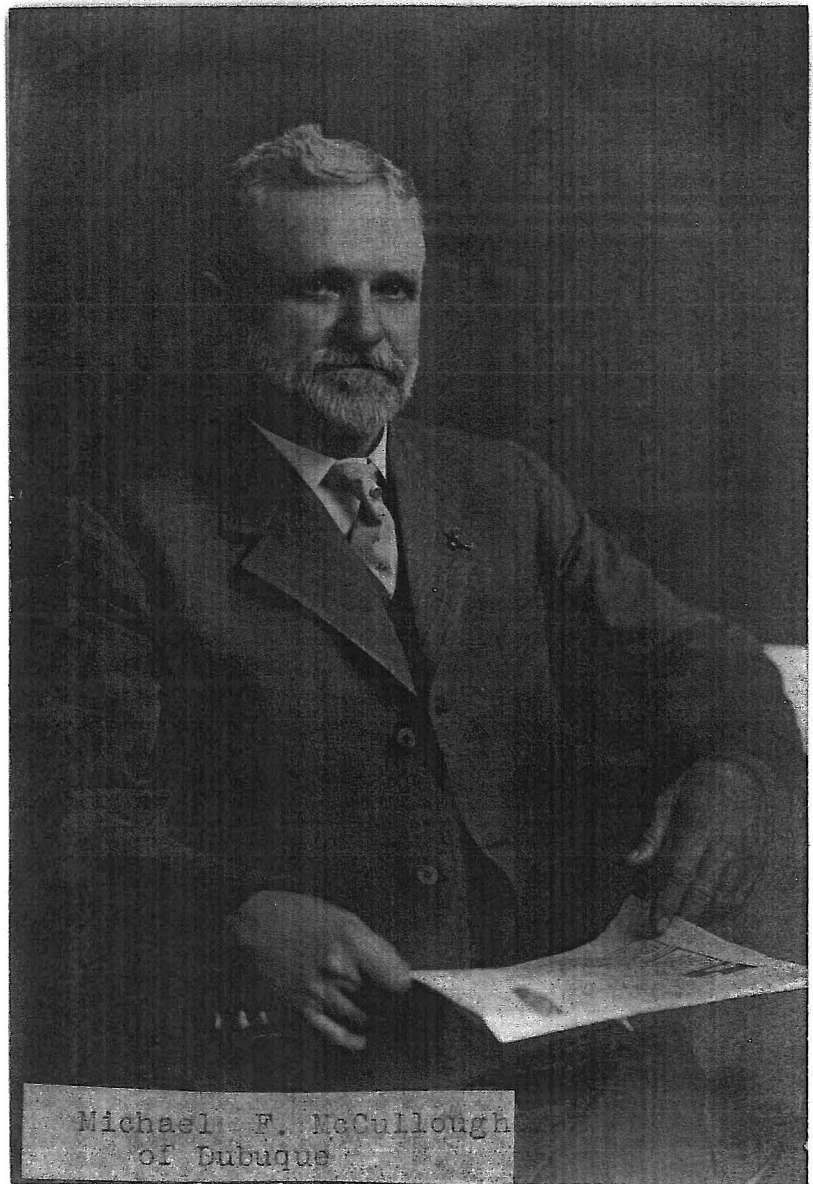

# REP. M'COLLOUGH HAS CROSSED DIVIDE

PROMINENT MEMBER OF IOWA  
LEGISLATURE DIES AT HIS  
HOME AT LAUDEVILLE.

END CAME EARLY SATURDAY

Deceased Was Born At Holy Cross  
and Had Spent All His Life in  
Dubuque County—Funeral  
on Monday Morning.

A circle of friends and acquaintances which might be described as almost without limit was saddened on Saturday morning by the news of the death of Representative M. F. McCullough, which occurred at 7 a. m. at his home in Laudeville. Mr. McCullough's last illness first manifested itself last spring, when he suffered repeated attacks of liver trouble. In July he submitted to an operation with little dread that no benefit would result. However, the complication proved more serious than conjectured and a gradual decline followed. For several months his condition was considered serious by family and friends, and many of the latter who called at his bedside left the home with a heavy heart, for it was apparent that the sands of life were slowly sifting towards the end. He realized better than those at his bedside that he would never resume active life, and fully resigned to the decree of Him Who called him hence, he died as he lived a Christian man. His final moments were attended by the consolations and ministrations of the Catholic church, of which he was a life-long member and stalwart defender.

BORN AT HOLY CROSS.

The deceased, who was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Matthew McCullough of Holy Cross, was born at that place fifty-nine years ago, and spent all his life in Dubuque county.

**PROMINENT IN POLITICS.**

Early in life Mr. McCullough be-  
came identified with politics and on  
account of his personal popularity, to-  
gether with his splendid intellectual  
equipment, he was persuaded by his  
friends to seek the office of representa-  
tive from Dubuque county, to which  
he was twice elected. In the legisla-  
ture he won the respect and esteem  
of every member of that body and it  
is safe to say that no man in Iowa  
had more warm friends and valued  
each one so much. His sympathies  
went out to every movement intend-  
ed for the betterment of humanity  
and his charity was as broad as the  
fertile fields of his native state, which  
he loved so well and served so faith-  
fully. As a legislator, citizen and  
friend his death is widely and pro-  
foundly regretted, while to his devoted  
family his passing means an irrepar-  
able loss, a loss, however, that is  
greatly mitigated in the priceless  
legacy he leaves to his loved ones—  
the memory of a blameless character.

morning at 9 o'clock from the family residence at Laundeville, to St. Joseph's Catholic church at Key West, and burial will be made in Mt. Olivet. It is expected that the funeral will be largely attended by Iowans prominent in political life.

**SPEAKER IS NOTIFIED.**

Representative Allen Kane, Mr. McCullough's Dubuque county colleague in the house, notified Hon. J. H. Cunningham, of Newell, speaker of the Iowa house during the last session, of

Mr. McCullough's death. At noon Saturday it was not known whether or not Speaker Cunningham would appoint a committee from the house to attend the funeral. This is customary when a member dies while the house is in session. In any event it is expected that many of Mr. McCullough's former colleagues will attend the funeral.

Expressions of condolence have been received in great numbers by members of the family of the deceased, many coming from his former colleagues in the assembly.

**SCHRUP'S APPRECIATION.**

Senator Schrup, who went to the Iowa senate at the same time that Mr. McCullough went to the house of representatives, said that being a intimate personal friend of the deceased it may appear that his judgment as to the value of Representative McCullough as a legislator was biased; nevertheless, it was the general opinion of the members of the house that he possessed the qualities of an ideal legislator beyond those of any member of the house from Dubuque county during recent years.

The personal popularity of "Uncle Mike," as he was familiarly addressed by the members, was such that a measure he advocated would be supported by many, if for no other reason than to show him a personal favor.

While a member of the opposite political party, Governor Clarke on several occasions showed his appreciation of Mr. McCullough's sturdy qualities, and only a few days before adjournment of the legislature expressed his intention of recognizing him when an appointment for a minority member to a suitable position was to be made.

**COLLEAGUE'S TRIBUTE.**

Representative Allen Kane said of the death of his colleague:

"By the death of Michael F. McCullough the state legislature has lost one of its ablest members. His career as a member of the house of representatives made him familiar with legislative procedure and as a representative of the thirty-fifth general as-

sembly he was regarded as one of the most able and influential. Being a man of splendid judgment his opinion on matters that came up for deliberation before the house was always regarded as worthy of the closest consideration. He was widely known throughout the state and his friends were numbered by his acquaintanceship. I feel that in the death of Michael F. McCullough I have lost a true friend and an able associate."
