SALTZMAN RITES WILL BE SUNDAY AT NEW HAMPTON

Representative of Chickasaw
in Thirty-seventh Assembly
Dies Thursday.

New Hampton, Ia.—Funeral services will be Sunday afternoon at St. Paul's Lutheran church here for Christian Saltzman, 80, former Chickasaw county state representative who died Thursday after a three week illness of pneumonia. Rev. William Engelke, pastor, will officiate.

Native of Alsace-Lorraine.

Christian Saltzman was born in Alsace-Lorraine, on April 25, 1855, the son of Mr. and Mrs. George Saltzman. When 16 years old, he came to this county alone settling near Chicago, Ill. Working on a nearby farm he saved enough funds to repay his parents in Germany. After working in Illinois for 10 years he purchased a 160 acre farm in Chickasaw county, moving here the next year.

He married Miss Magdalena Becker of Dupage county, Ill., who died in 1933. Mr. Saltzman served as township trustee for many years, he was a member of the Chickasaw county board of supervisors for six years.

Served in Thirty-Seventh Assembly.

In 1912 he served in the thirty-seventh general assembly as a Democrat. Mr. Saltzman held a substantial interest in banks at Lawler and New Hampton until 10 years ago. At the time of his death he owned more than a section of land in Chickasaw county.

Surviving are two daughters: Miss Sadie Saltzman and Mrs. J. O. Woodruff both of New Hampton; three sons: Leo, Leander and Ronald Saltzman all of Lawler. One sister, Mrs. George Denner of New Hampton; one brother, George Saltzman of Deer Lodge, Mont. Palbearers will be James G. Otteson, Albert Wachholz, Albert Pfenniger, William Wilkins, William J. 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Hon. Chris Saltzman Called To Eternity Thursday, Oct. 31

Funeral Services Held on Sunday. Burial Was Made in Graceland Cemetery. Survived by Five Children.

It is with deep regret that this community learned of the death of Christian Saltzman.

Mr. Saltzman passed away at his home in this city at 2:20 p. m. Thursday, October 31, 1935, at the age of 80 years and six months. He had been in poor health for some time. About three weeks ago his condition became serious. On Monday pneumonia developed from which he failed to rally.

Christian Saltzman was born in Oserlin, Alsace-Lorraine, April 25, 1855, a son of the late George and Selma Saltzman. He was educated in the public schools of his native country and in 1871, when sixteen years of age, came to the United States, settling at Naperville, Ill.

In 1877 he was united in marriage with Miss Magdalena Baker of DuPage county, Illinois. He purchased a farm in Chickasaw county near Lawler in 1880, moving the following year. They made their home on this farm until 1924 when they moved to New Hampton where Mrs. Saltzman passed away August 1, 1933.

Mr. Saltzman served as township trustee for several years, and also was a member of the board of county supervisors for six years. In 1912 he was elected on the democratic ticket to the Iowa State legislature in which he represented his district during the thirty-seventh general assembly.

Mr. and Mrs. Saltzman were parents of seven children. Two preceded him in death. He is survived by two daughters, Miss Sadie Saltzman and Mrs. J. O. Woodruff of New Hampton; three sons, Leo, Leander, and Ronald, of Lawler; one sister, Mrs. George Denner, of New Hampton; one brother, George Saltzman of Dec, Lodge, Montana; and one brother in Alsace-Lorraine; 9 grandchildren, and 2 great-grandchildren.

Mr. Saltzman was a faithful member of the Lutheran church.

Mr. Saltzman was a progressive farmer, active in church work, interested in civic affairs and other activities. He was not only public spirited but was deeply interested in his home and like a real man performed his part as husband and father. He conducted himself on a high level as friend and neighbor. Evidence of the respect and appreciation of Mr. Saltzman was shown by the large cortege at the final rites and by the beautiful floral bouquets given in his honor.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock at the St. Paul's Lutheran church in New Hampton. The Rev. William Engelke, pastor, officiated. Interment was made in Graceland cemetery beside his wife.

Mrs. Steensland Formerly of Saude Died at Calmar

Born Sept. 14, 1852; Died Oct. 23, 1935. Burial at Saude. Eight Children Survive.

Mrs. Mary Steensland passed away at her home in Calmar, Iowa, Wednesday, October 23, 1935, after a lingering illness, aged 83 years, 1 month and 9 days.

Mary Thronsdon, daughter of Johannes Thronsdon and Synerva Offerdahl-Thronsdon, was born in Lodal, Sogn, Norway, September 14, 1852. When three years of age she came with her parents to Racine County, Wisconsin, remaining there 4 years. It is impossible to get any further information on WPA projects in Chickasaw County than what appeared in news dispatches sent from Des Moines on October 30 as follows:

The federal works programs administration authorized Iowa Administrator L. S. Hill today to initiate work on a list of selected projects to cost \$3,491,022.

The three million and a half dollar program outline county projects in 60 Iowa counties, and state wide fish protection and propagation projects in 33 Iowa counties. The administration emphasized that under the available funds only those projects which Administrator Hill regards as "most adaptable to the speedy prosecution of his state program" can be undertaken.

For fish protection and propagation Chickasaw and Dallas counties were allotted the largest amount of funds—\$6,272 each—in the project outline.

In Chickasaw county: Improve 40 miles of farm-to-market secondary roads. Federal funds \$10,140.

Improve roads in Deerfield, Washington, Jacksonville, Chickasaw, Dayton, New Hampton and Stapleton townships. Federal funds \$16,790.

The protection and propagation of fish evidently is in the hands of the Conservation Commission and what their program will be in this county has not been announced.

Funds allotted for roads in Chickasaw county may be gravel and crushed rock projects, as it is very late in the season to undertake the grading of roads. Under the federal setup we will just have to wait and hope that work on these projects will be started in the near future.

From what we can learn these WPA projects will not even begin unless there is need to use employable men who cannot find other employment. The men to whom the employment is offered must actually work, and do an acceptable day's work, or they will be discharged. Once discharged a man will not be eligible for employment. Therefore, the will not be eligible for emergency relief from federal funds. Workmen given employment must support his dependents. WPA is strictly a business organization designed to employ those without employment, able to work, and willing to perform the tasks assigned them.

He has represented his district in the state legislature, is the vice president of the State Savings Bank of Lawler and follows farming on section 17, Stapleton township. He was born in Alsace-Lorraine, April 25, 1855, a son of George and Selma Saltzman, who were also natives of that district, in which they spent their entire lives. The son was educated in the public schools of his native country and in 1871, when sixteen years of age, came to the United States, making his way first to Naperville, Illinois, where he was employed as a farm hand. He afterward spent ten years in that state and in 1880 he bought one hundred and sixty acres of his present home farm and the following year removed to Chickasaw county, where for thirty-eight years he has continuously resided. He now owns four hundred and ninety-six acres of valuable land, constituting one of the best improved farms of the county.

In 1877 Mr. Saltzman was united in marriage to Miss Magdalena Becker, of Dupage county, Illinois, and they have become the parents of eight children, of whom five survive, namely: Sadie, Alma, Leo, Leander and Ronald, all of whom are residing at home with the exception of Leo, who owns and operates a farm in Stapleton township.

In politics Mr. Saltzman is a democrat and a recognized leader in party ranks. His opinions have carried weight in the party councils for many years. He has served as township trustee for several years and also filled the office of county supervisor for six years and in 1912 was elected to the Iowa state legislature, in which he represented his district during the thirty-seventh general assembly. In public office he has ever been loyal to the duties and responsibilities that have devolved upon him and has untiringly sought to promote the general good. He and his family are members of the Lutheran church and are most highly esteemed throughout the community in which they live.

While Mr. Saltzman has figured prominently in public affairs, he has been pre-eminently a business man. He has thoroughly acquainted himself with the science of farming and is one of the most progressive agriculturists of his section of the state. MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare resolutions commemorative of the life, character and public services of the Honorable Christian Saltzmann, of Chickasaw county, Iowa, beg leave to submit the following report:

Christian Saltzmann was born in Alsace, France, April 25, 1855. He came to America in 1870 and located in Dubage county, Illinois, engaging in farming. He moved to Iowa in 1880 locating on a farm near Lawler, Chickasaw county. He remained in Chickasaw county, Iowa, until the time of his death, which occurred on October 31, 1935.

He was united in marriage on June 27, 1878, to Miss Magdelina Baker, who preceded him in death. There are five children, Sadie, Alma, Leo, Leander, and Ronald who mourn the death of their beloved father.

In politics Mr. Saltzmann was a democrat and served as representative from Chickasaw county in the Thirty-fifth General Assembly. He served on the board of supervisors of Chickasaw county for six years and was chairman of that board for five years.

He took an active part in common welfare acting from time to time on school boards and cooperative organizations, and has always stood high in the confidence and esteem of his associates. He was a member of the German Lutheran church of New Hampton.

Therefore, Be It Resolved, That in the passing of the Honorable Christian Saltzmann, the state has lost a valuable and honored citizen, and the House would tender by this resolution, its sincere sympathy to the surviving members of his family in their sorrow, and

HONORABLE E. J. SANKEY

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee appointed to prepare a resolution commemorative of the life, character, and public service of the late Honorable E. J. Sankey of Decatur county, Iowa, former member of the Thirtieth, Thirty-first and Thirty-third General Assemblies of Iowa, begs leave to submit the following memorial:

Honorable E. J. Sankey, Civil War veteran, former county and state official, and a resident of Decatur County, died at Leon, Iowa, on September 29, 1936, at the advanced age of ninety-two years. He was born on August 2, 1843, at Potters Mills, Center county, Pennsylvania.

In 1849 Mr. Sankey, with his parents, came west to Burlington Iowa. Soon after their arrival in Burlington this family suffered the loss of their father and one son, who died of cholera which was then epidemic. Following these deaths Mr. Sankey and his mother joined some Pennsylvanians of their acquaintance, and settled in Louisa county, Iowa. From 1850 to 1851 our subject attended a subscription school, and later the public schools. In 1856 he moved with his mother to Decatur county, locating four miles north and one half mile east of Leon, where he resided
