JOHN W. CAMPBELL, PROMINENT BANKER, CALLED FROM LIFE

CASHIER OF COMMERCIAL NA-TIONAL BANK SUCCUMBS TO GENERAL BREAKDOWN

HELD HE PUBLIC OFFICES

SERVED AS COUNTY AUDITOR AND TREASURER AND WAS STATE REPRESENTATIVE

John Wesley Campbell, cashier of the Commercial National Bank of Fort Dodge, died at his home on north Ninth street Sunday evening at 11:20. Death came to him when he was sixty three years of age, and was the result of a general breakdown from which he has been suffering for the last two years.

Just a week ago his condition was thought to be serious and his son 12. Raymond Campbell who was at Colfax for his health, and his daughter, Mrs. Almond Cochran of Okmulgee, Oklahoma, were summoned.



Mr. Campbell was man of original and impulsive char ities and kindnesses. He liked to be friend to man, his inspiration in this direction rising not from love of adulation and publicity, but from heart impulse.

Mr. Campbell will be missed also in lodge circles. He was a member of the Masons, Odd Fellows, Royal Arcanum and Elks. For many years he has been treasurer of the Odd Fellows Lodge.
