### Death Of Former Representative From Allamakee County

The Wm. Henderson family received news Sunday of the sudden death of Edw. Fourt, brother-in-law of Mrs. Henderson, at his home at St. Paul Park, Minn., from a heart attack.

Deceased was born in Vernon county, Wis., about 70 years ago. His mother died when he was a child and he came to Waukon to make his home with his grandfather, Jas. Fourt, where he grew to manhood. On July 10, 1889, he was united in marriage with Miss Alice Spencer, the ceremony taking place at Decorah. They established their new home in this city, where they resided until 1913, when the family moved to St. Paul Park. Mr. Fourt was a carpenter by trade and also dealt in real estate.

He served two terms in the legislature from Allamakee county about 20 years ago.

Besides his widow he is survived by two sons, Earl and Leslie, both of Burlington, Wis. Also a brother and four sisters, namely: Frank Fourt, Fairfield, Iowa; Mrs. Vina Hammer, Seattle, Wash.; Mrs. Ella Gray of British Colum-

### Aged Resident Found Lifeless In Bed

Lars Haakinson, aged resident of Hanover township, was found lifeless in bed Thursday morning by his son Louis, who with his family resided on the old homestead. Coroner Bresnahan was summoned, but deemed it unnecessary to call a jury as Mr. Haakinson had been an invalid for six months and death was probably due to a stroke of apoplexy.

Mr. Haakinson was born in Norway, July 21, 1845, and was 89 years of age. When a child he came with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Haakinson, to this country and the greater part of his life was spent on a farm in Hanover township, where the log house and out buildings characteristic of pioneer days are still in use.

He was preceded in death four years ago by his wife. One son, Louis, lives at home and another son, Carl at Ferris Mills.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at the Big Canoe church in Waterloo township. Rev. J. B. Heltne conducting the services. Burial was in the family lot in the nearby cemetery.

## Edwin H. Fourt Called Suddenly

REPRESENTED ALLAMAKEE IN  
SESSIONS OF LEGISLATURE  
IN 1909 AND 1911

Word was received here Monday  
of the sudden death of Edwin H.  
Fourt, well known former resident  
of Waukon and vicinity. Mr. Fourt,  
formerly representative from Allama-  
makee county in the state legis-  
lature, left Waukon about twenty  
years ago and since then has made  
his home on a farm near St. Paul  
Park, Minn.

He was enjoying his usual health  
Monday morning when a motorist  
appealed to him to take a team  
and pull his car out of a mudhole  
in the highway. Mr. Fourt reluct-  
antly consented to do so. He har-  
nessed the team and drove to the  
scene. There he told the motorist  
to look after the team, as he was  
feeling sick. He sat down and a  
moment later was dead, from a  
heart attack.

Mr. Fourt was born in Vernon  
county, Wisconsin, son of Mr. and  
Mrs. Charles Fourt. When he was  
about 15 years of age his mother  
died and he came to Waukon to  
reside with his grandparents, Mr.  
and Mrs. James Fourt. He receiv-  
ed his education from that time  
in the Waukon schools and in 1889  
was married in Decorah to Miss  
Alice Spencer. They made their  
home on the present E. J. Schnei-  
der farm in Makee township for  
many years, and he was widely  
known as a successful farmer and  
an upright, progressive citizen. In  
1908 his constituents in Allama-  
kee county elected him to the Iowa  
legislature and he served them well  
as representative in the 33rd and  
34th general assemblies.

To Mr. and Mrs. Fourt were born  
two sons, Earl of Milwaukee, and  
Leslie of Burlington, Wisconsin,  
who are left to comfort their moth-  
er in her great sorrow.

Mr. Fourt's twin brother, Edgar  
Fourt, preceded him in death only  
13 days, he also passing suddenly  
from a heart attack at his late home  
at Lander, Wyoming. One brother
