Mrs. B. H. Kehrberg Taken To Hospital—Man Has His Nose Broken

Cars driven by Mrs. B. H. Kehrberg, living 8 miles south of LeMars, and Adam Dorr, living in the east edge of this county, collided Tuesday morning, four miles south of highway No. 5, near the Cherokee county line.

Mrs. Kehrberg was alone in the car and was on her way to Cherokee to visit her mother. Mr. Dorr was on his way home, coming from the north. Both cars met at the intersection and the impact forced both vehicles into the ditch. Mrs. Kehrberg was driving a big Studebaker roadster and Dorr a 1930 Ford. Both were injured in the crash but managed to walk to the nearest farm home where Dr. Joynt of Marcus was summoned. Mrs. Kehrberg was brought to the Sacred Heart hospital where it was found that she suffered a leg injury and bruised quite badly. WELL KNOWN MAN STRICKEN BY DEATH

Henry N. Newell Dies
Thursday Following
Short Sickness

Henry N. Newell, prominent LeMars man was stricken by death Thursday morning at 6:30 a. m. following a sickness of a few hours. Deceased had been in apparent good health, although he had never completely regained his usual strength following a severe attack of the flu last March. On Wednesday afternoon, Mr. Newell complained of pain, and a doctor was summoned. He was taken to the Sacred Heart hospital, where an examination was made. It was then found that Mr. Newell was suffering from an intestinal melody, and was beyond medical help. He passed away quietly at 6:30 a. m. Thursday, retaining consciousness to the end.

Born in Canada
Henry N. Newell was born in Dorchester township, Middlesex county, Province of Ontario, Canada, Nov. 8, 1855, and at the time of his death was 76 years, 9 months and 13 days of age. At an early age he moved with his parents to Western Ontario, Canada, where he lived until he was 21 years of age. In 1876 he came to the United States, and settled in Minnesota, where he remained for two years working in Pipestone and other points.

Settled in Stanton Township
After 2 years he came to Plymouth county where he purchased a farm in Stanton township, living there until 1919. At that time he purchased the north half of the W. H. Perry lot on 1st Ave. S. E., where he built a new home, in which Mr. and Mrs. Newell have made their home to this time.

Married at Traer
On October 14, 1902, he was united in marriage with Miss Clemie White at Traer, Iowa.

Former Representative
Mr. Newell served two terms as state representative for this district. He was nominated and elected in 1908 on the republican ticket, and was re-elected by a big majority in the following election. For 25 years, he was a member of the Stanton township school board, and was active in the betterment of school conditions in his territory. At the present time Mr. Newell held the honor of Chaplain of the Old Fellows Lodge in LeMars. He was also a member of the Order of Rebekahs. For the past five years Mr. Newell has served the city of LeMars as cooperative weather observer.

STRUBLE GIRL HAS ACCIDENT

inadequacy of delay, uncertainty and inadequate relief, a group of leading farmers headed by Gustave Alesch, democratic candidate for state representative, quietly gathered in the center school house in Meadow township Tuesday night and laid plans of procedure. First plans were to organize a relief committee for the benefit of the Remsen territory, which they consider includes parts of Remsen, Union, Henry, Marion, Fredonia and Meadow townships.

Enthusiasm waxed warmer as the discussion went on, until it was decided all the farmers and business men of Plymouth county should be invited to rally to the cause and supply grains and other needs to all the farmers who were crippled by the disastrous hail storm two weeks ago, and this without the aid of government, Red Cross or any other agency purporting to offer help to those in distress.

But, as Mr. Alesch expressed himself, "let it be understood that we have no quarrel with the American Red Cross society. They have stood by in all matters of relief in the past and we know that this body is ready to help the storm stricken farmers of Plymouth county out of their present difficulty. It is not a matter of discrediting this worthy organization, but a matter of asking the people of Plymouth county to fight their own battle before asking for outside aid."

In his views on this subject Mr. Alesch and other leading farmers of this vicinity were upheld by the gathering in Meadow township Tuesday night. The farmers agreed unanimously that they would form a county-wide relief organization and urge support from farmers and business men alike.

Mr. Alesch was appointed temporary chairman of the organization, and Charles Treinen temporary secretary. They will act as a committee on arrangements for a county meeting to be held in Remsen immediately after the threshing is out of the way.

At this meeting complete details will be worked out, and it is planned to work through the board of trustees of the various townships.

"We feel that the farmers of Plymouth county, acting in a spirit of genuine brotherly cooperation, can still take care of themselves," was a statement

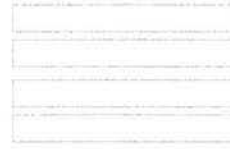
