Between 25,000 and 30,000 Iowa men will be ordered to report before their local exemption boards for physical examination under the selective draft within the next three days. Of these 12,719 men will be called to service.

All board yesterday received their official lists of numbers drawn at Washington last week. The district boards have been organized, and local boards are now supposed to proceed with their work without further notification.

Something more than twice as many men were ordered to report in these districts than must be raised to fill the assigned quotas. Polk county outside of Des Moines must provide 170 men, and 260 were ordered to report. The second Des Moines district must furnish 71 men, but 165 were ordered to report. After the quota is filled, no further examinations will be held. If necessary more men will be called for examinations.

One-third of those to be examined for the first draft will report on July 31, another third on Aug. 1 and the final third on Aug. 2.

The filing of exemption claims will be the next big step after all notices are sent out. Exemption claims may be filed with the local board at any time after the notice of call is received up to a seven day limit. No exemption claim can be made after seven days from the date of mailing of the notice of call. Affidavits for use in filing exemption claims may be obtained at the office of the local boards.

It is believed that examinations will be commenced in every county in the state affected by the draft before next Wednesday. These examinations will be completed by Saturday of the same week and it is hoped to report to the war department that the Iowa quota has been selected by that time.

FORMER MAYOR DIES SUDDENLY

Was Picturesque Character in Early Days Here.

CIRCUS RING-MASTER

Union County's Representative in Legislature Once.

Union county's former representative in the legislature and Creston's one-time mayor and circus man died suddenly at his home here this morning at eight-thirty. He was F. J. Taylor, an old settler of Creston, who came here in 1879. Mr. Taylor, who was in the feed and grain business with his son, had been feeling ill for some time prior to his demise, but yesterday morning as he was going to his office was apparently in better health than ever. He has been one of the prominent men of the city for many years both socially and in business and up until about a year ago was still active in commercial activities of the city.

Mr. Taylor has been a picturesque figure in the early history of the district. At one time he owned a large wagon circus which went about over the country for several seasons. Mr. Taylor being ringmaster and having with him at the time the world-famous clowns, Montgomery and Stone. For several years Mr. Taylor was successful in the circus field, but later having sustained considerable losses, retired from that work and settled at Creston where he engaged in the grain and feed business.

He leaves to mourn his loss a wife and five children. They are: Charles Taylor of Erie, Pa., Bert Taylor of Elk City, Okla., Frank Taylor of Omaha, Neb., Ray Taylor of Creston and Mrs. Lottie Mather of Creston. Funeral services will be announced later.

Von Hoepfner Compares Aerial Fighting Forces

The Hague, Netherlands, July 27.—(Correspondence)—Interesting comparisons of British, French and German methods of air-fighting were made recently by General Von Hoepfner, commander of the German flying forces in an interview with the Berlin correspondent of the Holland News Bureau. General Von Hoepfner admitted that the air forces of the entente allies were superior on the western front and in the Balkans, but said that on the eastern front the German air-men outnumbered their adversaries. Here superiority in numbers, however, he professed to believe, meant nothing when compared with the quality of machines and of the men flying them. He added:

"The Frenchman is obviously not to be placed on a par with our air-men from the point of view of morale, but it is just in flying the Briton proves that he is of German race and therefore has a love of fighting. In general the Frenchman only attacks when he feels himself numerically superior. He avoids a fight under unfavorable conditions. The Briton seeks the combat. HE HELPED PUT CRESTON ON MAP

SUDDEN DEATH OF F. J. TAYLOR TOOK PLACE SATURDAY MORNING.

WAS VETERAN CIRCUS MAN

Deceased Had Also Represented Union County in Legislature and Was a Mayor of Creston.

One of the greatest shocks which can come to a community was that sustained by Creston and southwest Iowa Saturday morning, when word was passed about that F. J. Taylor died suddenly in his home in this city.

Frank J. Taylor was not only one of Creston's earliest pioneers, but he was a remarkable character in many ways. He was a man of intrepid courage, capable to the point of genius, and through his own efforts he amassed fortunes, lost them, and with tireless energy and unbroken spirit he would start in again, always providing for his family in a faultless manner. He was a man who made and retained life long friendships, and was always most interesting because of his personality and the experiences which he had in life.

Coming to Creston in 1879 Mr. Taylor had passed practically all the time since in this city, except for a number of years when he made Creston famous by placing her on the map as the headquarters of the F. J. Taylor Wagon Shows. At that time when wagon circusses were the vogue F. J. Taylor maintained one of the largest and best in the country. While there were larger circusses there were none employing better talent, and Mr. Taylor's shows introduced the world famous clowns, Montgomery and Stone, as well as other noted circus performers, who became celebrated later.

Owing to heavy financial losses sustained while in the show business Mr. Taylor retired from the road, and entered the feed and grain business in Creston, through which he became known throughout the state.

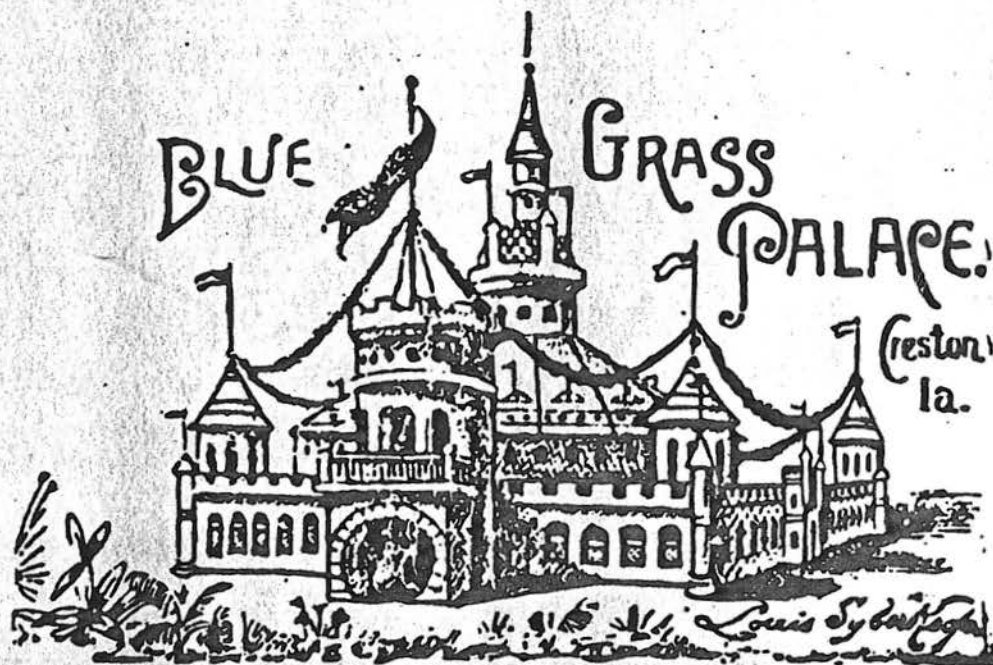

EXHIBITION OF TAYLOR'S CIRCUS.

No such bareback rider and tumbler has visited Creston this season, as the young man who did Taylor's bareback riding. It was really wonderful. The same may be said of the Bishop Bros., trapeze performers, the lady who holds the weight of three men while suspended from the trapeze, and her husband, the slack rope performer, sword walker, juggler, and every other member of the troupe.

Mr. Taylor returns after a fairly successful season's business considering it was his first year over the territory, though with not as much clear money ahead as was confidently expected. But he has made a reputation and can do a paying business over the same territory another year.

Mr. Taylor visited many different states while on his trip, where liquors are sold on recognition of law, and says that in all his rounds he did not meet with such tough crowds, hard to handle, and was not troubled with drunken ruffians as much as in Iowa, southeast and east of Creston. This does not speak well for prohibition.

It has not learned his intentions for another year, but wishes for him nothing but success should he take the road another year, or should he conclude to remain at home and conduct his business here.
