A large crowd attended the funeral held at the Corydon Methodist church Monday afternoon.

WILLIAM PATTERSON ALLRED

William Patterson Allred, a retired citizen of Corydon, Wayne County, Iowa, was at the time of his death on March 4th, 1939, probably the oldest resident of the county in point of continuous years covering a period of almost 85 years.

He was born in Randolph county, North Carolina, April 26th, 1854 and died at his home in Corydon, Iowa, on March 4th, 1939, aged 92 years, 10 months and 8 days. He was a son of Mahlon and Eleanor (Patterson) Allred. Mahlon Allred, who was of English and Welch ancestry, was born in North Carolina, April 15, 1817. He was one of many western North Carolinians who came west in the early days, settling in Iowa in 1854, and was one of the early converts to the principals of the Republican party. He served in the office of Justice of the Peace for this locality. He was an active member of the United Brethren church. His wife was of the Patterson family of Scotch Irish lineage and a granddaughter of John Patterson, who with his brother, Robert, came from the north of Ireland and settled at Baltimore in 1767. John Patterson founded the North Carolina branch of the Patterson family, while his brother, remained in Ireland. Patterson married Jerome Bonaparte, brother of Napoleon Bonaparte, and their grandson, Jerome

Trifle Warmer This Year

Those who think this February was a great deal warmer than usual are due for a surprise. J. E. Davis, official observer, says the average temperature this February was 24.7 degrees; the maximum 53 degrees on the thirteenth, and the minimum eight below zero on the 10th. The average for the past 44 years is 26 degrees.

Precipitation for February was 1.11 inches of which 1.1 inches came February 28. The average the past 56 years is 1.29 inches.

Average temperature for the past three winter months was 28.9 degrees, compared to 25.6 degrees for the same period during the past 44 years. Precipitation these three months was 3.26 inches this year compared to the 44 year average of 3.69.

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William P. Allred was 7 years old when in the fall of 1853 the family left their home in North Carolina and started for the west. Their first settlement was in Carroll county, Arkansas, and from there they went to Lawrence county, Missouri and in October 1854 settled in Monroe township, Wayne county, Iowa.

Mahlon Allred built the first log cabin in Monroe township on the prairie west of Genoa in section 17, township 67, North, range 20, West. It was the first habitation in the district west to Genoa. In the environment of the pioneer activities of this community William P. Allred grew to manhood. He attended some of the first schools taught in that community and from boyhood he knew the arts of wood craft, swinging an ax with ease and precision and doing the hard work of breaking up and plowing and cultivating the virgin soil.

When he was 18 years old he enlisted on May 22, 1864, in Company H of the 46th Iowa Volunteers Infantry. He was discharged in a hospital at Keokuk in September 1864. His captain was W. W. Thomas of Corydon and his Colonel was David B. Henderson, later Speaker of the House of Representatives.

For many years he has been a member of the Grand Army of the Republic, affiliated with Robert Jackson Post No. 193. With his passing the last member of this Post has passed to the Great Beyond. He was for approximately twenty years chairman of the Soldiers Relief Commission of Wayne county, Iowa, rendering intelligent and patriotic service to the widows and orphans of deceased soldiers who were in need. After the war he engaged in farming, stock raising and continued active in the business until he retired, leaving the farm for a comfortable town home in Corydon. He has also been honored in a political way. His political affiliation has been with the Republican party. He held various township offices and for twelve years was secretary of his local school board. (Continued on Back Page)

### Farmers First Meat Packers

The first meat packers in the United States were farmers, according to a correspondent in the Wisconsin Agriculturist. More than 300 years ago these farmer packers began to salt down pork, beef, venison and bear meat. It wasn't long before the New Englanders began to take a share of the English trade in meats with the West Indies. Later, thousands of meat animals were driven in on foot to Boston, New York, Baltimore and other sea port towns, from the outlying farms and from adjoining colonies or states.

He served four years as County Recorder and nearly seven years as a deputy, putting in a total of eleven years in our local court house.

In 1908 he was elected to the House of Representatives from the 5th Iowa District and served two terms.

Mr. Allred for 38 years has been a member of the Masonic Fraternity, belongs to the Masonic Veterans Association, and the Order of Anointed High Priests. He and his family are all members and active workers in the Methodist Episcopal church. At the age of more than 92 years Mr. Allred had an abiding interest in people and affairs and rounded out a life of high ideals and splendid activities among friends of a life time.

For twenty years Mr. Allred was the head of the Corydon Drum Corps and at the last National G. A. R. Encampment at Des Moines was elected president of the National Association of Civil War and Sons of Union Veterans Musicians.

He married on December 12th, 1869, Miss Louisa C. Kellogg, who was born in Ohio and whose people came to Iowa as early as 1857. Mr. and Mrs. Allred were married for more than half a century. She was greatly beloved by her family and friends and was an active church woman and passed away on March 4th, 1921, just 18 years to the day prior to the death of her distinguished husband. A few days prior to his death he had expressed the hope that he might live until that date.

Of the nine children born to them, six are living. Gertie E. is the wife of J. H. Roof of Lawton, Oklahoma. Their four children are: Edward A., a World War Veteran; Jesse H., Maxine and Genevieve Garner. Mary Olive is the wife of W. B. Welch of Kansas City, Missouri; Ernest of Corydon, is married to Maude Seward and has three children, Myron K., Rolla S. and Ernestine. Henry L. Allred, a resident of Des Moines, married Mollie Jennison and their three children are: Howard W., Roxie Louise and Robert William P. Allred, Jr., of Corydon, is married to Alice Howard. Rilla May is married to W. G. Whiteley, and has a daughter, Mrs. Cleo Hercules. Two children died in infancy and a son, Clarence E. died on February 14, 1938 at Kansas City, leaving his wife, Lillie Campbell Allred and three children, Bennie, a veteran of the World War, Raymond and Clarice. He leaves surviving his six children, fourteen grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren, together with friends innumerable. This heroic figure has been a conspicuous character in our county for more than four score years. He has at all times manifested the highest citizenship, and a splendid character. As a tribute to his good name the listeners will have noticed that the flag by order of the District Court of Wayne county, has been at half

staff since the date of his death. No finer evidence of high regard could have been manifested. We shall not soon see his like again.

Rev. P. M. Conant had charge of the funeral services at the church. Music was furnished by N. C. Rew, Julius Nelson, F. B. Fry and Roy Barnes, with Mrs. Conant at the piano.
