ENOCH BEERY

At his home one mile west of Salem, Iowa, on February 6, 1922 occurred the death of Enoch Beery, one of Henry County's most widely known and best loved citizens.

Mr. Beery was the son of Levi L. and Margaret (Short) Beery and was born at the old Beery homestead near New London, Iowa, on October 5, 1856. On November 22, 1883 he was married to Susan Raines, also of New London. To this union three children were born, who with their mother survive. They are Levi L. who is in the Aerial Service at San Antonio, Texas, Floyd R. living near Salem and Mary H. at home. There are also two grandchildren, Margaret and Harold Beery. Three sisters and three brothers preceded Mr. Beery in death, those remaining being two sisters, Mrs. Jane Beery Mikesell of Covington, Ohio and Miss Mary Beery of Mount Pleasant. Many nieces and nephews and other relatives also mourn the loss of this good man.

The deceased was for many years a prominent stock raiser and shipper. He was deeply interested in all public movements which made for the betterment of the community in which he lived and had served two terms as a Representative in the General Assembly of Iowa. He was a member of the Masonic lodge and of the Modern Woodmen of America and was a director of the Henry County Farmers' Mutual Insurance Association at the time of his death. He had previously served for a number of years as vice-president of the Henry County Farm Bureau and was one of the men who had done so much toward the upbuilding of that institution. In all of these walks of life his loss will be keenly felt.

For about three years his health had been gradually but steadily failing; he was last away from his home on Thanksgiving Day when he called at the home of a near neighbor. Since that time he has grown steadily weaker, in spite of all that medical assistance and loving hands could do until the end came Monday morning.

Funeral services which were in charge of Rev. F. E. Weston were held from the M. E. Church in Salem, Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. Burial was in the south cemetery at that place with the services at the cemetery in charge of the Masons.

Mrs. Lillian Walker of Clarion, Iowa, Mrs. Mary Robinson of Whiting, Iowa, Mrs. Clara Killips of Oskaloosa, Iowa and Ralph E. Hobart of Omaha. Six grandchildren likewise came to gladden the hearts of Mr. and Mrs. Hobart. For more than fifty-three years this worthy couple walked together, nearly fifty years of which have been upon the spot where a few days since release came to Father Hobart.

Early in life he became a carpenter, and, with a few breaks, spent his life in our midst as a carpenter and contractor. Time was when many of the best homes of our community bespoke his wormanship. As a toiler, he was diligent, faithful, conscientious, and a splendid employer.

He came under religious influences at the impressionable age of sixteen, and united with "New Light Church", at Industry, Illinois. He united with the Methodist Episcopal church in 1868. He loved the church and was always a faithful attendant upon its service. He believed in experimental religion; he was a practical christian, revival meetings he esteemed highly; and thru his life he carried a consciousness of his relation to his Lord. It was a great cross to him when failing powers deprived him of the privileges of the sanctuary.

He was raised to the sublime degree of a Master Mason in his 21st year, and exemplified its teachings in his daily life. A few years ago his brother Masons of this city honored him by bestowing upon him the degrees of the Chapter and Commandery. He had been a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows for many years. But no order made more of an appeal to him than the Grand Army of the Republic. Six brothers served in the Civil War, one was killed in battle. He loved the suit of blue, the bronze button was an open sesame to the treasures of his affection and memory, and every old soldier was a brother beloved. To him the G. A. R. was not an order, but an institution to perpetuate the great principles for which he and his comrades had offered their lives. For years his comrades had honored him by making him patriotic instructor for the public schools of the county, and he assisted many of the county schools in the purchase of flags.

The funeral services were held at the home on North White St. where he had lived so long, Sunday, February 12, 1922, at 2 o'clock, conducted by his pastor, the Rev. W. R. Keesey, who spoke from the text, Isa. 57:1-2, "The righteous perisheth, and no man layeth it to heart; merciful men are taken away, none considering that the righteous is taken away from the evil to come. He shall enter into his peace: they shall rest in their beds, each one walking in his uprightness." The male quartet, composed of Messrs. And the beautiful floral offerings testified to the esteem and love in which many held Brother King Hobart. ENOCH BEERY.

Enoch Beery is the owner of three hundred and twenty acres of valuable land in Salem township, located on section 22 and as a general agriculturist and stock-raiser he has become well known by reason of his practical enterprising methods and his enviable success. He was born in Baltimore township, Henry county, on the 6th of October, 1856, and is a son of Levi L. and Margaret (Short) Beery, both of whom were natives of Fairfield county, Ohio. The paternal grandfather was Isaac Beery. It was the year 1842 that Levi L. Beery came to this county and had located, after which his wife and two children joined him, he having been married in Fairfield county, Ohio. He purchased land in Baltimore township, securing a tract of timber situated on Big Creek. Only a few acres had been cleared and he at once began the difficult task of cutting away the timber, clearing out the brush and grubbing out the stumps. He cleared many acres and thus aided in subduing the wilderness and transforming a wild tract into a valuable possession. His first purchase comprised one hundred and sixty acres of land, but as he prospered in his undertakings and his financial resources were increased he also increased his acreage until he had about one thousand acres in Henry county. He also made judicious investments in real estate in Nebraska, having one thousand acres in Fillmore and Valley counties. He died in the year 1893, having for about two years survived his wife, who died in 1891.

Enoch Beery was the youngest in a family of seven children, three of whom

were sons. He pursued his early education in the district schools and afterward attended Howe's Academy at Mount Pleasant, thus acquiring a good English education which well equipped him for the performance of life's practical and responsible duties. He spent his boyhood days in Baltimore township, living with his parents until twenty-eight years of age, when he was married and established a home of his own. It was on the 27th of November, 1883, that he wedded Miss Susan Rains, who was born in New London township and was a student in the public schools in her girlhood days. Her parents were Zebbedee and Phebe (Hamell) Rains, both of whom were natives of Indiana and her paternal grandfather was Samuel Rains and her maternal grandmother Dorcas Hamell. Three children were born of the marriage of Mr. and Mrs. Beery; Levi L., born September 7, 1888; Floyd R., born November 26, 1891; and Mary H., August 27, 1894.

Following his marriage Enoch Beery took up his abode upon a farm of two hundred and twenty acres on section 22, Salem township. He came into possession of this tract at his father's death and later he added one hundred acres, so that he now has a valuable farm of three hundred and twenty acres. This tract, like much of Iowa's land, is very productive, responding readily to cultivation and he carries on general farming and stock-raising, keeping horses, cattle, hogs and sheep upon his place. Mr. Beery is an extensive and successful stock-dealer, his principal business being buying and selling stock cattle, selling to the feeders mainly. He raises only good grades and

he therefore finds a ready sale for his stock upon the market. In matters of business his judgment is rarely, if ever, at fault and in the control of his interests he has found that keen discrimination, capable management, close application and indefatigable energy form a splendid foundation upon which to rear the superstructure of success. In those relations of life which indicate personal views and tendencies of character. Mr. Beery is found on the side of improvement and progress. He is an exemplary representative of the Masonic fraternity, in which he has attained the degrees of the lodge, chapter and commandery at Mount Pleasant and he is also a member of the Knights of Pythias fraternity, while politically he is an earnest republican.

MARION McVEY.

Marion McVey, deceased, who for many years was identified with farming and stock-raising interests in this county, was born in Morgan county, Indiana, September 26, 1840, his parents being John and A. Eliza (Rhodes) McVey, who were likewise natives of Indiana. The former was a son of William McVey and the latter a daughter of Joseph Rhodes. In the year 1850 the parents came from Indiana to Iowa, settling in Jackson township, Henry county, near Salem, where John McVey purchased eighty acres of land. This was unimproved and he began its cultivation and development, transforming it into a pro-

ductive tract. He has since been a resident of the county, covering a period of fifty-six years and he now resides in Jackson township, being one of the venerable pioneer settlers of this part of the state, who has long witnessed the changes that have occurred here, bringing about the present advanced state of development.

Marion McVey was a youth of ten summers when brought by his parents to Iowa, and his youth was spent under the parental roof, while in the common schools he acquired his education. During the periods of vacation he worked in the fields and had thus gained practical knowledge of farming when he started out in life for himself. He traveled to some extent through the western states prior to his marriage, which important event in his life occurred on the 24th of September, 1879, the lady of his choice being Miss Charity Scarborough, who was born in Henry county, March 12, 1859. She, too, was indebted to the public school system for the educational privileges she received. Her parents were John L. and Eunice (Hiatt) Scarborough, natives of North Carolina, and of Ohio respectively and the latter was a daughter of Isom Hiatt, who was likewise born in the Buckeye state. Mr. and Mrs. McVey became the parents of seven children, three of whom died in infancy: Guy J., born July 30, 1881, married Mabel Flossie Jameson and now lives in Keokuk, he owning a farm in Missouri; Melvin M., September 9, 1883, at home; Forest L., December 13, 1889; and Eunice E., April 19, 1892, are still living.

At the time of his marriage Mr. McVey owned a farm of eighty acres in sec-
