Former Waldorf President Dead

L. W. Boe Died Sunday at Home in Northfield Minnesota

President Lars W. Boe, 67, of St. Olaf college died early Sunday. He was well-known in the Lutheran church, being a member of the National Lutheran council and the Lutheran world convention and had been active in Lutheran religious and educational activities since his ordination in 1901.

After serving as pastor of Lutheran congregations at Lawler, he was elected as the first president of Waldorf college in 1904. He served in the post 10 years resigning to become financial secretary to the board of trustees of the United Norwegian Lutheran church in America.

Following merger of three Norwegian Lutheran church synods in 1917, he was named executive secretary of the board of trustees and the board of education of the new

Ration Book Two

Residents of this territory who
have not yet received their war ra-
tion book number 1 must make
application for one at the county
rationing board before January 15.
Some persons were unable to get a
ration book because of an excess
supply of sugar or some other rea-
son. These persons must now ob-
tain one or they will not be able to
get war ration book number 2,
which will be issued some time in
the middle part of January. The lo-
cal rationing board announced that
war ration book number 2 will be
a master book for the rationing of
food and other items. If you do not
have ration book number 1, the
rationing board urges that you ob-
tain it now, irrespective of how
much sugar you have on hand.

No Special Gasoline

All applications for special gaso-
line rations for servicemen to use
in their father's or a friend's car
while home on furlough, must be
denied, according to announcement
made by the Chicago regional
office, and they advised that they
could find no interpretation in the
regulations that would allow such
a special ration. Therefore, all ap-
plications for special rations for
that purpose must be denied.
