William R. Cooper --

William R. Cooper, 72, retired
attorney and abstractor and former
Jasper county representative to the
state legislature, died of a heart
ailment at 9:30 o'clock Sat. morn-
ing at his home here.

Mr. Cooper had been ill for two
days prior to his death.

A life-long resident of Jasper
county, Mr. Cooper had been in
business in Newton for more than
30 years, retiring from an abstract
and loan business five years ago.
In 1903, four years after he was ad-
mitted to the bar, he was elected
state representative from Jasper
county; he was the author of many
popular bills in the state legisla-
ture, and his efforts were always
directed toward the betterment of
the moral conditions of the state.

Born on Nov. 28, 1868, to Levi
and Eilen Cooper, who figured prom-
inently in the pioneer history of
the county, he was educated in ru-
ral schools near Lynnville, and at
Hazel Dell Academy in Newton. He
graduated from Iowa State college
in Ames in 1894, and for several
years was a successful teacher.
Tiring of the teaching profession,
he set up an abstract and loan busi-
ness in Newton in 1900.

He later turned his attention to
law, and in 1904 was admitted to
the bar, actively engaging in the
practice of an attorney along with
his extensive abstract and loan
business.

He was married on Oct. 26, 1898,
to Virginia Russell, the daughter of
S. G. Russell, prominent Newton
business man.

Mr. Cooper was an active mem-
ber of the Newton Methodist
church. A staunch republican, he
participated in county and state po-
litical affairs for many years.

Surviving relatives of the im-
mediate family are his wife and
four children, Florence, of New-
ton; Dr. Russell Cooper, of Mt. Ver-
non, Ia., and Richard and Robert
south of Los Angeles, Cal.
