We shall give our opinion on the the points of law, as we understand them; leaving the facts to be determined by a judicial decision, after a due investigation of the conflicting testimony.

The record of the district township meeting, properly signed by the secretary, must be taken as correct. The fact that Mr. Goodmiller, who was called to the chair in the absence of the president, vacated the chair, is admitted by all parties. Mr. Rosenkrans, the regular chairman being present, took the chair, and presided during the remainder of the meeting. This is in strict conformity with parliamentary law. See Cushing's large manual, paragraph 313: "The duties and functions of this temporary officer, if elected in the place of a presiding officer who is a member of the body over which he presides, are ordinarily the same with those of the permanent president; during his absence, and terminate with the return of the latter to the chair."

The board at its session previous to the third Monday in May, was obliged to cause the secretary to certify to the board of supervisors the amount voted for school house purposes, under section 1777, Code of 1873. If they had reason to doubt that the district meeting had voted \$1600 for sub-district No. 3, as claimed by some parties, they were obliged to certify the amount to the board of supervisors as a tax upon such district No. 3, subject to the limitations of section 1778. They have failed to certify either upon the district township or upon the sub-district, and have neglected their duty, no matter what their interpretation of the action of the district township meeting may have been.

The county superintendent having given only an opinion, we have nothing to reverse or to affirm, and therefore leave the case for final adjudication by the courts.

Shortly before his death the writer spoke to him of his trust, in Christ, he gave an earnest look (and referred to the words of Peter to the Saviour) and said to whom could I go but unto him, he alone hath eternal life, and when he felt the last struggle was at hand and we were bowing in prayer, he whispered to us, "ask for special aid." 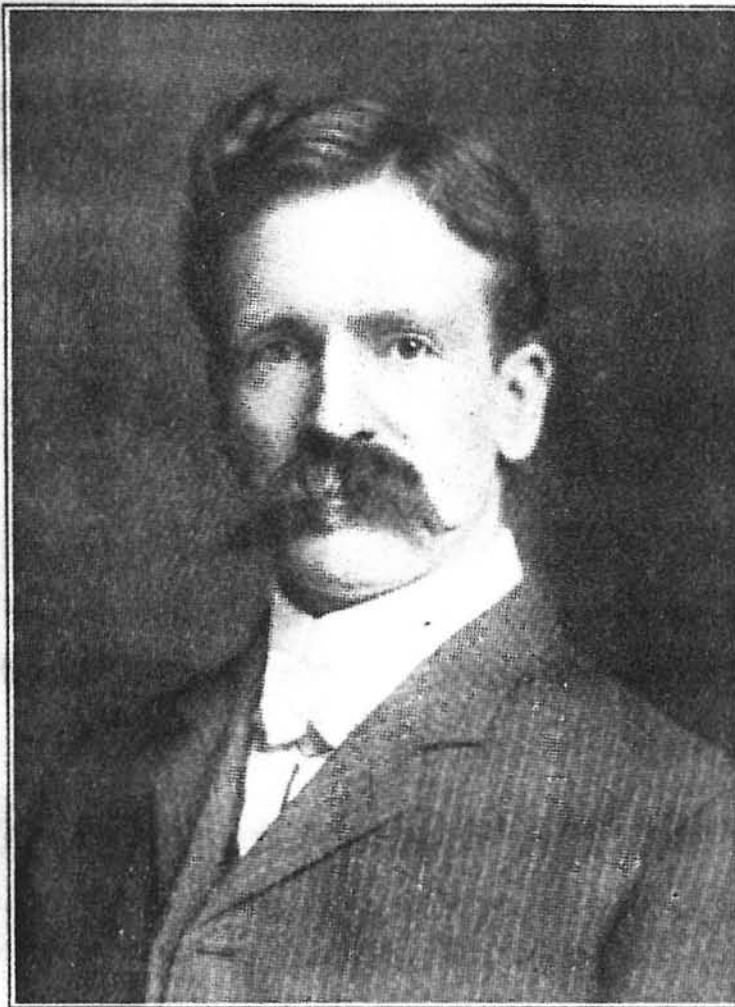

YOUTH BURNS UNDER AUTO

(By The Associated Press)
An 18-year-old Davenport, Ia., youth was burned to death in the wreckage of an automobile set afire Muscatine County Sheriff Fred Neper said by a would-be rescuer's match to bring Iowa's 1942 traffic toll to 27.

Vernon Mutt was pinned under the automobile when it left the road crashed through a bridge abutment, and overturned near Durant early Sunday.

Bursts Into Flames
The automobile, which Davenport police said had been stolen about a week ago, burst into flames when a spectator ignited gasoline on the car while trying to extract the youth from the machine.

Richard E. Borden, 18, also of Davenport, who said he was sleeping in the back seat of the automobile when the accident happened, was only slightly injured.

Dr. C. D. Phillips, county coroner, said no inquest will be held and that the death will be recorded as "accidental."

REV. INMAN DIES IN CHURCH AT MARBLE ROCK

Marble Rock, Ia., Jan. 26.—Rev. Loren W. Inman, aged 72, of Marble Rock died during the Sunday school hour, about 10:00 a. m., in the Baptist church of a heart attack. Rev. Inman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alonzo Inman, was born on a farm about two miles southwest of Marble Rock on July 24th, 1870. He graduated from the Marble Rock schools and also attended the Charles City College and the Iowa State Teachers college. He married Adelia V. Ciar in 1893. He taught school several years in the rural schools of Floyd county, and was superintendent of schools at Aurora, Ceggon and Marble Rock, Ia.

Mr. Inman served in the state legislature as representative from Floyd county from 1907 through 1911. He was ordained a minister of the Baptist church while superintendent of schools at Aurora, Iowa. He also preached in the Baptist church of Marble Rock and the Methodist church at Marble Rock. He served as pastor of the Coldwater - Rockwell churches for twenty years, the Baptist church at Charles City for 5 1/2 years, the Federated Baptist - Presbyterian Methodist churches of Shellburg for six years and the Baptist church of Marion for five years, resigning there last September because of ill health.

Rev. Inman leaves to mourn his death his widow three sons: Harold Inman of Fort Des Moines, Forrest Inman of Buffalo, N. Y., and Gordon Inman of Cedar Rapids; and one daughter, Mrs. Art Peterson of Fort Dodge, Ia. Funeral services will be held Wednesday afternoon at the house at 1:30 and at 2:00 p. m. from the Bethel Baptist church with the Rev. A. L. Osborne, pastor in charge, and assisted by the Rev. Milton Nordhardt of the Methodist church.

The Watterson Funeral Home of Greene has charge of the services. Interment will be in Hillside cemetery, Marble Rock.

The Rev. Inman had told the pastor that he was not feeling well when he came to the church and it was at the end of the following hymn, in which he took part, that he slumped over in his pew, dead.

A. Inman was born in Kane County, Ill., June 24, 1842. He was the third son of Lorain and Lucy (Carpenter) Inman, who came to this county in 1858, where most of the family still reside. Mr. A. Inman was married in October, 1869, in Charles City, by Elder Casbier to Miss C. E. Waist, a native of Vermont. They have two children—Lorain W. and Martha Esther, ages twelve and six respectively. Mr. Inman bought his farm of eighty acres, where he resides, about two miles southwest of Marble Rock, in 1870. He has recently made a purchase of eighty acres, adjoining his original farm. This is one of Floyd County's good farms. The natural fine drainage and good quality of the soil cannot be excelled anywhere. At the time of his marriage, Loren's residence was Ontrario, NY. According to family tradition he left college to go west. In 1836 Loren arrived in Sugar Grove Tp., Kane co., IL, where he settled. In 1858 he moved to Marble Rock, IA, becoming on of Floyd County's early settlers. He settled 1 1/2 miles SW of the village itself on part of Sec. 18, and at the time of his death also owned the E 1/2 of the NW 1/4 of Sec. 30. This latter parcel adjoined on the north land purchased by joseph Inman in 1856. Loren was interested in medicine, and since no professional doctors were available, people in his vivinity consulted him for medical advice. He was the first president of the Union Tp. school Board, filling that post in 1858-9 and 1860. Loren was elected county judge in 1864, although there is no record of his ever serving in that capacity. Known throughout Floyd County as "Elder Inman", Loren was the first pastor of the Marble Rock Free-Will Baptist Church, which was organized about 1858. He preached there about seven years. in the early 1860's he also preached occasionally in Benezette Tp., Butler Co., IA
