Thomas Speaks for Harrison Delegation

SIoux CITY. A Harrison county delegation told the Missouri river study committee Friday that it was unanimously agreed "the only place that we will ever stop Missouri river is by impounding our runoff from the hills and mountain ranges." The spokesman for the group was A. L. Thomas. He said that the group was also agreed that the water impounding program should be closely affiliated with an overall soil conservation and planned use program. Thomas added: "We further ask that all agencies connected with this Missouri river basin program be instructed to proceed to continue this work at an accelerated rate and complete it at the earliest possible date. "This does not mean to put in the dams and then stabilize the channel. It means that the overall plan should be put to work at once."

Mo. Valley Banker George Kellogg Dies

George A. Kellogg, 79-year-old retired president of the First National bank of Missouri Valley died Friday at his home in Omaha. He had been ill the past year.

Owner of more than 5,000 acres of land in the Missouri Valley area, he retired three years ago after some 40 years as head of the bank. In recent years he had divided his time between Omaha and Missouri Valley.

Kellogg is survived by his wife, Margaret.

Refuses to Grant Meldrum Rehearing

The Iowa supreme court refused Friday to grant a rehearing to Clarence B. Meldrum, Council Bluffs Attorney whose one-year suspension of license to practice was upheld by the court May 4. The Associated Press reported from Des Moines.

DES MOINES, AP— Secretary of State Melvin D. Synhorst said Friday he has been getting a lot of inquiries lately on whether a voter may change his party affiliation at the polls. The answer is yes.

The secretary of state explained that a voter can change his affiliation by making a statement to the county auditor not later than 10
