"First in Iowa" was the honor awarded Miss Ruth Moyle, Maquoketa Junior college extemporaneous speaker and "third in Iowa" was the distinguished honor merited by the local debate teams, in the state tournament this week at the University of Iowa.

The local delegation returned Friday night following the banquet which awards were revealed. Dr. E. Bey of the Maquoketa speech department made the announcement here.

The debaters won four and lost two debates in which they competed in Iowa City. The affirmative team defeated Northwestern college of Ottumwa and Ft. Dodge Junior college. The negative team won from Burlington and Boone, and lost to Waldorf College of Waterloo. The local team won the tourney with six victories out of

Albert Washington Kendall, son of Richard and Mary Bowman Kendall, was born May 3, 1857, on South Otto street in Maquoketa, Iowa. At the age of five years, the family moved four miles east of Maquoketa to the Kendall quarry where he lived until 24 years of age, when he married Margaret Anna Kehn, daughter of Adam and Mary Eckard Kehn on January 25, 1882 at her father's home near Delmar, Iowa. On March 9, 1882 they moved to their own farm where they lived until 1917 when they moved to their present home in Maquoketa.

Mr. Kendall was state representative from Clinton county in the years 1907-1909, serving in the regular 32nd and 33rd Iowa assembly sessions and also the 32nd extra session. He was a member of the first board of the Delmar Consolidated school district. He had enjoyed excellent health until recently and maintained an active interest in community and political affairs.

Left to mourn his passing are his wife and ten children, namely, Howard, Mrs. Hattie Jacobsen, Bert, Olive and Alfred of Maquoketa; Ernest, Mrs. Blanche Poole and Mrs. Hazel Cassin of Delmar; Floyd of Los Angeles, Calif., and Mrs. Sylvia Witzke of Davenport; also nine grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Preceding him in death were a son, Rollie R. who passed away at Camp Oglethorpe, Georgia, October 26, 1918, and a daughter, Mrs. Ethel Ebersole, who passed away at Delmar, Iowa, on July 3, 1924; also one granddaughter, Mrs. Ernest Riffle, who passed away on October 29, 1937.

HONORABLE FRED W. JONES

MR. SPEAKER: Your committee, appointed to prepare suitable resolutions commemorating the life, character and public services of the Honorable Fred W. Jones, a former member of the General Assembly of Iowa, begs leave to submit the following:

Fred W. Jones was born in Mitchell, Mitchell county, Iowa, on January 10, 1868, and passed away at Spirit Lake, Iowa, on June 13, 1937, at the age of 69 years.

He came to Dickinson county with his parents and assisted his father on the farm in Milford township until he purchased a farm of his own adjoining the old home. He was married to Miss Cora Miller, of Bentley Creek, Pennsylvania, on December 12, 1893, and to this union two children were born: Lewis W. Jones, of Spirit Lake, and Beulah, now Mrs. Glen Rodger, of Maywood, Illinois.

Fred W. Jones served his township as assessor for six years and was elected sheriff in 1899, his administration of this office was so successful that he was re-elected five times, serving thirteen years. In 1913 he was elected to the state legislature, serving from 1913 to 1916. For years he served as director of the First National Bank of Spirit Lake, Iowa. He served as a member of the board of supervisors for twelve years. During all his life he was actively engaged in farming and cattle feeding.

Fred W. Jones was made a Master Mason in Gloaming Lodge, Milford, Iowa, in 1891, and at the time of his death held membership in Twilight Lodge at Spirit Lake, Iowa. He was also a member of Spirit Lake Chapter of Royal Arch Masons and of Twilight Chapter, O. E. S.

Therefore, Be It Resolved by the House of Representatives of the Forty-eighth General Assembly, That in the passing of the Honorable Fred W. Albert W. Kendall was born in Clinton county, Iowa, on May 3, 1857. He resided there with his parents.

He was married January 25, 1882, to Miss Anna Margaret Kehn. They established their home on a farm which they purchased near Delmar in Clinton county. They retired to Maquoketa in Jackson county in 1917, where he resided until his death. Mr. Kendall died in his eighty-first year, on Friday, March 31, 1939, after a brief illness. He leaves to mourn besides his wife, ten children, Howard, Mrs. Ben Jacobsen, Bert, Olive, Alfred, Ernest, Floyd, Mrs. A. L. Pool, Mrs. T. P. Cassin, and Mrs. Sylvia Witzke. A son and daughter preceded him in death.

Mr. Kendall was well informed on farm problems and a keen business man and until lately maintained his interest in community and political affairs. He was a member of the First Methodist Church.

He was elected Representative of Clinton county to the Thirty-second General Assembly and re-elected to the Thirty-third. He was one of the most sincere members of the legislature. His death was a great loss to his home community as well as his fellow legislators.

Mr. Kendall served his community and state well and Iowa has lost a most valuable citizen, therefore,

HONORABLE D. W. KIMBERLY

The hearts of the citizens of Iowa were saddened when they learned on November 11, 1937, of the death of Senator D. W. Kimberly. Despite the fact that it was generally known that Dee was ill, his friends and acquaintances were unprepared for the sad news of his death.

Senator Kimberly was born at Deadwood, South Dakota, on August 6, 1878. At the age of six his parents moved to West Liberty, Iowa, where he spent the early years of his life on a farm, before moving to Davenport. He graduated from the Springdale high school and Bryant and Stratton Business College in Chicago. His marriage to Elsie King took place on August 7, 1905.

Senator Kimberly was first elected to the legislature as Republican representative from Scott county in the year 1914, and he held the record for the longest continuous service of any member of the Iowa legislature, having been elected to the Iowa Senate in 1918, and serving in that capacity at the time of his death. However, the length of service was not as important as the fact that his record merited for him the honor and

Wilfred and Margaret were married October 7, 1937 in Minneapolis, Minnesota. They were the parents of one daughter Margaret "Jane" Keil born July 7, 1945 in Iowa City, Iowa.

My father Wilfred died when I was nineteen in 1965. He graduated from the University of Iowa dental school in the 1920's. He had dental offices in Iowa City, Davenport, and Bettendorf. His specialty was prosthodontia (reconstruction and replacement of missing teeth). He was a member of Psi Omega social fraternity for dental students and Omicron Kappa Upsilon honorary dental fraternity.

His brothers and sisters included: Lloyd John, A. Florence, Lorraine, and M. Orion. Florence's daughter, Mary (Kies) Beecher, is a cousin that I have been able to keep in touch with through the years. She has twelve children! Her oldest son is my age: 43. Lola Keil and I have the same birthday, July 7th. Her daughter, Gloria (Dottie) Sturm was such a kind and dear friend of my mother. I remember meeting Dottie's children when they were very young.

I graduated from the University of Iowa also. My field of interest is elementary education and administration. I have B.A., M.A., and Ed. S. degrees. I have taught in Iowa, Colorado, North Carolina and now Georgia. I became a mother at the age of 37! Sam is a great joy most days. He will be seven August 2nd. I have been married for ten years to Colonel Sealon R. Wentzel. He is from Pennsylvania. I have been able to trace his family back to the 1700's in Germany. My husband had been an Army officer for almost 22

PAUL EUGENE KEMPTER

Born March 18, 1910 in Bellevue, Iowa to Blandina (Kegler) and Paul Kempter, Paul Eugene was the couple's only child. He grew up in Bellevue and was educated by that city's public school system. His parents owned and managed the Kempter-Gallagher Furniture Store and the Kempter-Gallagher (now Kingery-Gallagher) Funeral Home in Bellevue. Although Paul helped with both businesses while growing up, he did not choose to follow in his parents' footsteps. In 1927 Paul entered Notre Dame School of Law in South Bend, Indiana and graduated in June 1934.

While a sophomore, Paul met Edna Loraine Schuster. She was a student at St. Mary's College, also in South Bend, and was an education major from Joliet, Illinois. She graduated in 1931, returned to Joliet, and taught freshman English until Paul's graduation from law school. They were married in the log chapel on the Notre Dame campus on August 11, 1934.

Paul began his law practice with the Internal Revenue Service in Des Moines but left after a year and a half to join the practice of a law firm in Clinton, Iowa. He moved to Bellevue and started his own law practice there in 1939.

At the onset of World War II, Paul enlisted in the Army and completed Officers Candidate School. He served overseas with the military police in England, France, and Germany. His knowledge of French and German were valuable both in procurement of housing and in the initial questioning of prisoners brought back from the front by supply convoys.

Paul returned to the states in 1946 and once again began his practice in Bellevue. The couple adopted two daughters, Mary Patricia in 1948 and Mary Jeanne in 1950.

The Korean conflict once again saw Paul called to active duty and in 1951 the family moved to Michigan where Paul was attached to the newly formed Air Force base near Oshtemo. The summer of 1952 saw the family transferred to Fairbanks, Alaska and a fighter-jet base newly built there. Paul mustered out of the service in 1952 in Seattle, Washington.

Edna inherited an interest in an oil field following her father's death, and problems with the management saw the Kempters move to Casper, Wyoming. From 1953 to 1959 Paul practiced there and worked to reorganize and stabilize the management of the lease. Ill health of his father brought Paul and family back to Bellevue. His shingle hung there until 1969 when he became the first director of the newly formed Legal Services in Dubuque, Iowa.

In 1964 Paul successfully ran for a seat in the Iowa State Legislature and served on the Ways and Means Committee. His bid for reelection in 1966 was unsuccessful, as was his try for the office of County Attorney in 1968. He was appointed Special Prosecutor during the 1969 trial of those involved in the murder of Bellevue Police Chief, Earl Berendes.

Paul moved to Dubuque in 1973 and retired in 1975. He and Edna enjoyed traveling to the warm climates of the Caribbean and Hawaii during the winter, until Edna's death in October of 1981. No longer enjoying travel by himself, ill health, and a desire to escape Iowa winters saw Paul move to Ottawa, Kansas in 1985. There he met and, on April 24, 1987, married Maria Wilkins.

Paul died July 22, 1988 at the University of Kansas Hospitals, Kansas City, Missouri at the age of 78. He is survived by his wife Maria, now living in Tulsa, Oklahoma, his daughters Patricia Dunne of Maquoketa, Iowa, and Jean (Mrs.

Larry) Rechtfertig of Ottawa, Kansas, and six grandchildren, Sean, Sarah, and Steven Dunne, and Brent, Brad, and Mark Rechtfertig. He is buried at the St. Joseph's Cemetery in Bellevue, Iowa next to his parents and his wife Edna. *Patty Dunne*

OLIVE LUCILLE KENDALL

Olive Lucille Kendall was born on the Kendall Farm adjoining Delmar, Clinton County, Iowa, on July 4, 1905, the eleventh child in a family of six boys and six girls, where she lived until her parents retired to a large home at 310 West Platt Street, Maquoketa, Iowa, where they lived until death, Mr. Kendall in 1939 and Mrs. Kendall in 1945.

Olive's father was Albert Washington Kendall, born May 3, 1857 in Maquoketa, Iowa; he attended his district schools until age twenty-one and worked with his father in the Kendall Stone Quarry until his marriage to Margaret Anna Kehn on January 25, 1882.

Olive's paternal grandparents were Richard Kendall, a cabinet maker, born April 17, 1830 at Grimby, Lincolnshire, England, and Mary Francis Bowman, born December 14, 1829 in Wheeling, West Virginia; she came up the Mississippi River to Bellevue, Iowa, and when the family tried to cross the Maquoketa River at Bridgeport on the ferry, the horses and wagon fell in and one horse drowned.

Olive's mother, Margaret Anna Kehn, was born near Delmar, Iowa on July 3, 1861, the fifth child in a family of eight. Olive's maternal grandparents were Adam Kehn, born March 30, 1830 near Darmstadt, Hesse County, Germany on the Rhine, and Mary Ellen Eckard, born March 27, 1832 in Dalton, Ohio; Adam Kehn came to Ohio by sailing vessel which took six weeks to cross the ocean; he was a carpenter and farmer.

Olive lived with her parents on West Platt Street until their death, and later bought the family home, where she still lives. Her father was a State Representative from Clinton County in the years 1907-1909, and became an insurance Agent after moving to Maquoketa; her mother spent many hours on work for the Red Cross during the War, and working on quilts for her church and other organizations.

Olive graduated from Maquoketa High School in 1922 as valedictorian, and soon started to work as secretary in the office of Frank T. Johnson; at his death in 1950, she continued as a Tax Accountant, Fire-Casualty Insurance Agent, and part-time agent for Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Company of Milwaukee, where she earned many honors, one of which was top woman agent in the Company; she was named Home Service Secretary of the Jackson County Chapter of American Red Cross in 1960; served as County Director of Iowa Association of Independent Insurance Agents; was a Charter Member of first recording secretary of Maquoketa Business and Professional Women's Club, member of the First

United Methodist Church, member and Gold Star Sister of American Legion Auxiliary, and was American Cancer Society Memorials chairwoman of Jackson County for twenty years and a member of their State Board of Directors for several years; she is presently a life member of the Historical Society and member of the Genealogical Chapter of Jackson County.

Of the family of twelve children, there are only four now living: Mrs. Blanche Poole, Mrs. Hazel Cassin and Olive, all of Maquoketa, and Mrs. Sylvia Witzke of Reno, Nevada; deceased are Howard, Ernest, Rollie, Floyd, Bert, Alfred, Mrs. Ethel Ebersole and Mrs. Hattie Jacobsen. *Olive L. Kendall*

DAVID ROBERT AND ALDA LOUISE (BEVAN) KENDELL

David Robert Kendell was born April 5, 1919 in Piqua, Ohio, the son of Herbert Weaver Kendell, M.D. (1876-1947) and Lora Wortley Kendell (1878-1971). Dr. Kendell (Ohio Medical University) practiced as a most respected physician and surgeon, having his own hospital, in Covington, Miami County, Ohio. Lora, a former Latin and music teacher (graduate of Earlham College), was a busy and compassionate mother of nine children. Both of them lived and died in Covington and were ever active in the Christian Church and community affairs.

Dave, after a busy childhood, working at many endeavors, graduated from Covington High School and General Motors Institute of Technology with a degree in Industrial Engineering. For he was employed by General Motors Corporation (Electro-Motive Division, LaGrange, Illinois — pioneer manufacturer of diesel locomotives). He retired, in 1980, as factory manager.

Despite a very active work schedule, he served on several school boards, the Episcopal Church Vestry and has had an ongoing interest in Architecture, building and farming. Since retiring, he has served on the boards of the Jackson County Zoning Commission and the Bellevue Golf Club, as well as being involved in the management of a farm in Paradise Valley, which he purchased in 1952.

On October 3, 1953, David and Alda Louise Bevan were married at the All Saints Episcopal Church, Western Springs, Illinois.

Alda Louise Bevan was born at Paradise Farm, four miles west of Bellevue, on August 11, 1928. She is the fourth child of Helen Potter Bevan and Godfrey Charles Bevan, married at Paradise, May 27, 1919. They met during World War I, in Asheville, N.C., when she was in the U.S. Army School of Nursing and he was an officer in the Army Remount Service. They also had four sons: Charles Potter, Thomas Marco, George Caple and Marco John.

Their mother, Helen Potter (1894-1970), was born at Paradise to Marco Polo Potter and Anna Weck Potter. She had one brother, Elbridge Gerry Potter II of Preston, Iowa. She graduated from Bellevue High School and the University of Chicago with a degree in Institutional Management.

Their father, Godfrey Charles Bevan, D.V.M. (1883-1945), was born at Grosmont, Herefordshire, England. He was the tenth child of William and Frances Elizabeth (George) Bevan. He was called John from an army nickname "Johnny Bull" meaning "Englishman".
